

Power's Body To Be Buried Near Valentino Crypt; His Mother Hasn't Been Told

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The body of Tyrone Power will be interred near the crypt of Rudolph Valentino, but Power's mother, 70 and ill, won't be told of her son's death.

"The news would kill her," a maid said Tuesday.

The disclosure recalls the benevolent family conspiracy that kept the mother of exonerated Russ Columbo ignorant of her son's death. She died in 1944 unaware the crooner accidentally had shot himself 10 years before while examining an old Civil War pistol.

Power's mother, who lives quietly in a Hollywood home with a nurse and a maid suffered a stroke several years ago. "We don't have a radio in the house and we only let her watch certain programs on television," the maid said.

Devoted Son

Power, who died Saturday of a heart attack on a movie location in Spain, was a devoted son. He visited his mother frequently while in Hollywood and sent her a constant flow of cards when away.

The body of the 41-year-old actor was scheduled to arrive by plane tonight accompanied by his widow, the former Debbie Ann Minardos. She expects a baby in February.

Funeral services were tentatively scheduled for Thursday noon. However, a Catholic source here said that it is doubtful Power can be buried in the Catholic faith. Although born and baptized a Catholic, a source said, Power automatically excommunicated himself when he married the former Mrs. Minardos, a divorcee and the actor's third wife.

Holds Marriage Valid

The church considers Power's marriage to his second wife, actress Linda Christian still a valid marriage. His first marriage to actress Annabella was not valid.

Accused Man Says Death Accident

THE DALLES (AP)—Douglas Jake said after his arrest that he might have killed his wife, a policeman testified Tuesday.

But Jake said that if he did kill his wife, Ethel, it was an accident, testified Woodrow Smith chief of the police force on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation.

Jake, 55, is a reservation rancher and it was near the reservation that the body of his wife was found trussed in blankets.

Smith said he arrived at the scene shortly after Jake's arrest and saw the rancher in a police car.

Smith testified that Jake shouted, "Woody—I'd like to have you help me out. If I did this it was an accident."

The prosecution said that Jake, on trial for second degree murder, beat his wife to death after a long drinking spree.

Jake has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity.

55-man crew from the little Lake Huron port of Rogers City.

The Bradley flew the flag of the Bradley Transportation Co., of Rogers City. The firm is a subsidiary of U.S. Steel Corp., and hauls iron-making limestone.

Never before had Bradley lost a ship and it claimed a world record for safety.

The Carl D. Bradley was on its 46th trip of the lakes shipping season in which it had covered 27,000 miles this year. At 31 it was relatively young as lakes freighters go.

Between them, the seamen who manned the ship had 32 children. Theodore Dahlberg of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., who shipped the Bradley from 1930 to 1940, said "Her rivets probably worked loose. It could happen in a storm like this one. The lake isn't like the ocean. On the lake storms build up waves in quick succession."

The last previous major disaster in the Great Lakes was in 1953. The American freighter Henry Steinbrenner went down in Lake Superior in heavy winds. Seventeen of its 31 crewmen died.

The Novadock and the Anna C. Munch went to the bottom in a Lake Michigan storm in November, 1950, with the loss of 57 lives.

A storm which hit Lake Huron Nov. 11, 1953 destroyed 18 ships and killed 253 persons.

Urban Renewal Expansion Poses Major Problem

EUGENE (AP)—Urban renewal and expansion poses the biggest problem for cities in the United States, San Francisco Mayor George Christopher told the League of Oregon Cities Tuesday.

"Cities have been aware of the problem posed by urbanization, but it is a phenomena which, in large measure, has received relatively little attention at the state and federal levels," he said.

When cities expand, he said, greater amounts of money must be spent in a short time for roads, schools and other necessities.

State and federal governments should share in the costs, said Christopher, who last week asked the White House to hold an immediate conference on expansion problems.

Christopher, president of the American Municipal Assn., was the main speaker Tuesday night at another examination but that he indicated to her he would rather not know.

WCA Mechanics Schedule Strike Friday Morning

SEATTLE (AP)—A strike has been set for 12:01 a. m. Friday by 60 mechanics of West Coast Airlines in Washington, Idaho and Oregon if agreement on a new contract has not been reached by then.

Donald Grundy, union negotiating committee chairman, said here Tuesday negotiations with the airline had been continuing since May 7 and through government mediation since Aug. 4.

The mechanics now receive \$25.50 an hour. Grundy said they are demanding the scale paid by major airlines. Agreement on a new contract was reached earlier in the day by Northwest Orient Airlines and its mechanics. It called for an hourly wage of \$22 by Oct. 1, 1959.

West Coast mechanics also are demanding that the airline employ inspectors to watch over mechanics. Grundy said WCA is the only airline in the nation not having such inspectors.

Wage increases totaling 22 cents an hour to be given in three steps have been offered the mechanics by West Coast—12 cents effective July 1, 1958; 5 cents effective Dec. 1, 1958, and 5 cents on Jan. 1, 1959.

Policemen Again Chase Out Cattle

For the second day in succession Roseburg police were called upon Tuesday to herd cattle out of town.

The latest complaint came from Mrs. Roy Fent, 1067 NE Lincoln St., who reported livestock grazing in the vicinity of her home.

Police found several Jersey Bull calves grazing behind the First Presbyterian Church and chased them into the hills east of the city.

The animals were identified as belonging to Hugh Pritchard of Rile Range Rd. The owner was notified. Neighbors said someone had left the gate open to the Pritchard place.

On Monday officers rounded up eight cows reported grazing in the front yard of the John W. Wilton resident at 1314 NE Beulah Ave.

Brown Funeral Services Scheduled For Saturday

Funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. Mack E. Brown, well-known Glendale residents killed in a traffic crash Monday near Lancaster, Calif., are scheduled for Saturday in Roseburg.

The rites will be in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary at 2 p. m. with the Rev. H. James Jenkins of the First Methodist Church officiating. Burial will be in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Brown was born Jan. 7, 1892, at Matador, Texas. For many years he made his home at Spur, Texas, where he and Vinnie Mae Wilkins were married Nov. 26, 1924. They came to Roseburg from New Mexico in 1938 and in 1945 moved to Glendale. For the last two years, they made their home in California, except for the summer months when they returned to Glendale.

Brown was a veteran of World War I and served in the Army Air Corps. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Spur.

Mrs. Brown was born at Groveton, Texas, Aug. 7, 1893. They have a son, Mack Elbert Brown of Salem, and two grandchildren.

Mrs. Brown is also survived by four sisters, Mrs. Benita Stanley, Groveton, Mrs. Vera Walker, Baytown, Texas; Mrs. Florence Johnson, New Orleans; and Mrs. Dove Allen, Groveton. Two brothers, Ed Wilkins, Houston, and Johnathan Wilkins, Beaumont, Texas, also survive.

Contract Awarded

The state Highway Commission today awarded a \$199,720 contract to Tom Lillebo, Reedsport, for construction of a 475-foot structure to carry The Dalles - California highway over California Ave. in Klamath Falls. The bids were opened a week ago.

"I want to announce my decision by Friday," the governor said. "I'd like to see it all thrashed out before I take any action."

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riders "for purposes of the cold war" and the time has come for new negotiations on their use.

This article fits another piece into the pattern of the Soviet bloc's campaign—launched off by Premier Nikita Khrushchev last week to turn over control of supply lines to the East German Communists and force the Allies out of Berlin.

Soviet withdrawal from the four-power occupation of the old German capital is now conveyed with a certainty, although authorities here had no idea how soon it would come.

The Western Big Three were already getting set to cope with the impending transfer of control over surface supply across 110 miles of East German territory. These were cut in the 1948-49 blockade that was broken by airlift.

that law applies to constitutional officers, such as the secretary of state.

In the past, the Supreme Court has held that the Legislature can not add any qualifications to offices created by the Constitution. Thompson is studying whether the 1953 law adds such an illegal qualification.

The issue as to whether Holmes or Hatfield can make the appointment centers on the question of whether Hatfield has to resign before he becomes governor, or if taking the oath as a governor constitutes a resignation.

If he has to resign first, then Holmes could make the appointment before Hatfield is inaugurated.

If Hatfield doesn't have to resign first, then Hatfield could make the appointment after he becomes governor.

Thornhill Not Asked

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornhill said nobody has asked him for an opinion on the subject. It is possible that the state Supreme Court might be asked to decide.

The only state Supreme Court decision that might bear on the matter was a 1947 case holding that former state Rep. Earl Hill of Lane County, should have resigned from the Legislature before becoming a member of the state Fish Commission. Merely going on the commission, the court said, doesn't vacate the legislative position.

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Caril Fugate's Trial At End; Fate Up To Jury

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—Prosecutors and defense lawyers squared off in final arguments today preparatory to placing in a jury's hands the fate of murder defendant Caril Ann Fugate.

The entire day was set aside for closing pleas.

The 15-year-old brunette schoolgirl is charged with aiding and abetting her ex-boy friend, condemned killer Charles Starkweather, in one of 11 killings attributed to him.
