

Offensive Line Held Key To Success Of Baltimore

BALTIMORE (AP) — One secret to the success of the Baltimore Colts this season is the offensive line. The Colts have lost only 49 yards in the four other games.

That doesn't mean they go both ways. The Colts have plenty of good defensive specialists as attested to by two shutouts in their last three National Football League games.

But the offensive linemen, particularly between the ends, have to do a lot of defending of their passers.

"Nobody does a better job of protecting the passer than our line," praises Gino Marchetti. He's a defensive all-pro end for the Colts and one of the most feared pass rushers in the league.

"We have the best offensive guards and tackles in the league," adds Marchetti.

Don Joyce, the other end, agrees. "Gino and I have had the toughest time of the year in the intrasquad game, trying to beat Jim Parker and George Preas," he says.

Parker's ability to make good as a pro tackle as a rookie last year was the big difference in the Colts' offensive line. It permitted Coach Webb Edmunt to move Preas over to right tackle.

Preas is in his fourth pro year. Art Spinney has been at one guard for six seasons and Alex Sandusky is taking care of the other for the fifth year.

Between them is Madison (Buz) Nutter in his third year as a starting center.

The ends are both veterans, too. Jim Mutscheller for five years and Raymond Berry for four.

The Colt passers have been so protected they went through four of their games without being

dumped for a yard loss. In all, John Unitas and George Shaw have lost only 49 yards in the four other games.

By contrast, enemy passers have been thrown for a total loss of 178 yards by Marchetti, Joyce and their defensive mates.

UW Regents To Decide On Laker-Celtic Game

SEATTLE (AP) — Elgin Baylor fans will get their first opportunity to see the former All-American basketball player in person as a professional if University of Washington regents approve a proposed game between the Minneapolis Lakers and the Boston Celtics.

Greater Seattle Inc. said Tuesday it has asked the Board of Regents for permission to stage the National Basketball Assn. game in the University pavilion Jan. 18.

The former Seattle University star was second in the NBA list of scorers released Tuesday. Baylor ranks first in number of rebounds.

The regents are expected to consider the pavilion Friday at a meeting in Spokane Friday.
