

Sudan's Leader Says Internal Matters To Come First

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Many Republicans Want To Keep Party As It Is, Gov.-elect Hatfield Finds

SALEM (AP)—Gov.-elect Mark Hatfield has found out that quite a number of his fellow Republicans don't want to be reorganized. After he was elected two weeks ago, Hatfield announced he had plans to reorganize the party in Oregon. He immediately was besieged with telephone calls and letters from Republicans who like things just as they are. A liberal himself, Hatfield wants the party reorganized along liberal lines. He wants the GOP to take on a new look so that it could attract support from labor. Hatfield knows now he faces considerable opposition in his own party, in which some conservatives have watched his rise to power with considerable alarm.

Wandering About Job

State party Chairman James F. Short is wandering whether he can keep his job. Hatfield probably will announce his candidate for the job next week. When Hatfield first started talking about party reorganization, some of his callers objected that he has no power to fire Short. Hatfield doesn't and never said he had.

The party chairman is elected by the Republican State Central Committee. Some conservative Republicans regard Hatfield as an upstart. Their candidate in the primary was State Treasurer Sig Unander, and Hatfield beat him.

He says Hatfield doesn't figure that he owes anything to the conservative wing of the party. Surprisingly enough, the conservatives tried hard to persuade Hatfield to appoint Unander as the new secretary of state. Hatfield said he received between 40 and 50 requests that he do this. Unander will be ineligible to succeed himself in two years. So naming him secretary of state would keep him in public office.

Face Crucial Test

The Republicans, who had been losing elections for several years before Hatfield was elected, face a crucial test in 1960. Among offices to be filled then are Democratic Sen. Richard

New Regime May Not Favor Nasser Deals

CAIRO (AP)—Sudan's new strong man said today his main interest now is in internal reorganization, and foreign policy decisions will have to wait. He hinted he will seek better relations with the United Arab Republic.

Gen. Ibrahim Abboud made his comment in a brief telephone interview with The Associated Press in Cairo.

This is believed to be the first interview since his bloodless coup d'etat Monday.

Abboud answered the phone while presiding over a meeting of his new 12-man cabinet.

Asked about the possibility of reaching an agreement with the U.A.R. on the division of Nile waters, long an issue between the two nations, Abboud replied: "My policy is very clear and I have emphasized it in my first declaration after taking over."

Doesn't Amplify Statement

Abboud declined to amplify this. In the declaration he referred to, Abboud promised to work for better relations with the U.A.R. and the elimination of dissension.

"We need two or three days to lay down the broad lines of our policy," Abboud said. "Our main interest is in internal reorganization. Later, we will study Sudan's foreign policy."

The 58-year-old general declined to answer any more questions.

President Nasser is making a strong bid to win the new Sudanese regime to his brand of Arab nationalism despite fears in Cairo that the coup was engineered by anti-Nasser elements.

2 Air National Guardsmen Hurt

MCGHORD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash. (AP)—Two Little Rock, Arkansas, Air National Guard officers were slightly injured Wednesday night when their B-57 bomber flipped over after landing here.

The pilot, 1st Lt. Luther Kilgough, suffered head lacerations and bruises. Copilot 1st Lt. Jack H. Lykes received minor bruises and scratches. Both were hospitalized.

A spokesman at this base just south of Tacoma, Wash., said the two-engine craft landed safely on the main runway, then veered off the concrete and flipped over. The aircraft was believed to be a total loss.

Kilgough and Lykes had radioed when eight minutes out of McGhord that their craft was low on fuel. The two were on a navigational and proficiency flight.

Survivors Tell Story

Frank Mays and Elmer Fleming, the survivors, were thrown from their 4x8-foot raft three times in Tuesday's ink-black night. But each time they managed to find it again and climb aboard again, clinging for their lives, hoping they could last until daylight.

Fleming and Mays told their stories from hospital beds here Wednesday night. They had been brought in by the Sundew, which also brought the bodies of eight of their fellow seamen.

Mays and Fleming told of the terror and confusion on the sinking of the freighter, the largest freighter on the Great Lakes, and of their praying and shivering on the tossing raft in near-freezing temperatures.

Fleming, the Bradley's first mate and a 43-year-old veteran of sailing the Great Lakes, did most of the talking.

"I was in the pilot house on watch with the captain," he said. "We heard a loud, then the alarm bell started ringing."

"Something spun us around," he said. "Then we looked down on the deck. It wasn't hard to see something was wrong. The stern was sagging."

Fleming managed to get off a distress signal on the Bradley's radio. Then he was in the cold water. It was almost sundown.

"We climbed on the raft and held on with all we had," he said. "At first there were four on the raft, a fully built orange-painted wooden structure with a low metal railing and metal pontoons."

"We lost one of them when the raft took a complete flip," Fleming said. "I swam until I got back to it. Then I helped the others get back on."

Twice more the waves whipped up by a 60-mile-an-hour wind lifted the raft and overturned it. "I've never been so cold in my life," Fleming said. "Ice was beginning to form on my jacket and in my hair."

Power's Body Is Returned To Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The body of motion picture star Tyrone Power was returned to Hollywood Wednesday night. The scene was filled with sadness for his widow, Deborah Ann.

Only a handful of newsmen and the late actor's close business associates were present when the canvas-covered casket was lowered from the cargo hold of a plane at International Airport.

Power, 44, died of a heart attack in Madrid Saturday.

Mrs. Power, 26, who accompanied the body from Spain, was escorted to a waiting limousine. She is expecting a child in February.

When flash bulbs started popping, she burst into tears and rushed into the arms of Power's business manager, A. Morgan Marlee.

As plans were completed for his funeral Friday noon in the Hollywood Cemetery chapel, a rift over protocol seemed over. Power's second wife, Linda Christian, announced she and her two daughters would not attend the rites.

Instead, Miss Christian said, they planned to pray for him in St. Martin of Tours Catholic church in Beverly Hills.

"Our children have a beautiful idea of death, and I wish to preserve that," she said.

Power's widow had been quoted earlier as saying, "A funeral is a private affair," and also that it was her wish that the actor's daughters—Romina, 8, and Taryn, 6—remember their father as he was in life.

Power's body will be interred near the crypt of Rudolph Valentino—movie idol of an earlier era.

Salesman Held After Threats To Man, Woman

YAKIMA (AP)—A Portland salesman arrested here early Thursday admitted in a signed statement, police said, that he held a Richmond couple at gunpoint for 30 minutes in their home Wednesday evening.

The salesman, Grant Paul Foster, 41, was held for Richmond authorities on a John Doe warrant. Police said when he was arrested he was carrying a .22 caliber revolver.

Mr. and Mrs. Roger Barbur of Richmond told officers there that a stranger knocked on their door about 6 p.m., gained entrance by mentioning a mutual friend, and then accused Barbur of dating a Portland woman.

Barbur said he tried to wrest the gun away when the man's attention was distracted, but failed. He added that blood most often is needed by people in hazardous occupations.

Judge Horn dismissed a curfew violation against 16-year-old Roseburg youth after reprimanding the boy. The judge said he was dismissing the complaint since it was the youth's first offense.

NLRB Reopens Kohler, UAW Dispute Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Labor Relations board today reopened the unfair labor practice case involving the Kohler Co. and the United Auto Workers Union.

The NLRB split 3-2 in deciding the union and then the company had requested further hearings on the basis of testimony given to the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee last February and March.

Chairman Boyd Leedom and member Stephen Bean dissented from the ruling reopening the case. They said: "This protracted litigation should not be further extended."

But a three-member board majority voted to have NLRB trial examiner George A. Downing hold further hearings in the five-year-old Wisconsin labor dispute.

The date will be fixed by the NLRB's Chicago regional office. The majority said the new hearings should be held for introduction of new evidence relative to the issues and to anything developed in the Senate investigation.

The case is one of the longest and most voluminous in NLRB history. There are several railcarloads of exhibits and recorded testimony.

The earlier NLRB hearings lasted more than a year. Downing recommended in October 1957 that the NLRB find the Kohler Co., a plumbing fixture manufacturing firm, guilty of unfair labor practices and require the firm to hire back several score discharged workers.

In the Senate hearings there was testimony the union had engaged in shooting, vandalism and coercion at the plant in Kohler, Wis., near Sheboygan, and the company had spent large sums to check on union officials and on one of the NLRB's own attorneys.

The UAW still is technically on strike against Kohler. But the firm has maintained production with new employees.

Big Steel Merger Plan Turned Down By District Judge

NEW YORK (AP)—Proposed merger of the Bethlehem Steel Corp. and the Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. was banned today by U.S. Dist. Judge Edward Weinfeld.

The proposed merger would have been the biggest in business history.

In an 88-page opinion, Judge Weinfeld concluded "there is reasonable probability that the merger of Bethlehem and Youngstown would be in violation of Section 7 of the Clayton Act, substantially lessen competition, and tend to create a monopoly in the iron and steel industry."

The corporations had sought through long and involved court proceedings for a merger which would have resulted in a company having assets totaling \$2,710,000,000.

In his decision Judge Weinfeld said: "The proposed merger would eliminate the present substantial competition between Bethlehem and Youngstown in substantial relevant markets."

"It would eliminate substantial potential competition between them. It would eliminate a substantial independent, alternative source of supply for all steel consumers. It would eliminate Youngstown as a vital source of supply for independent fabricators who are in competition with Bethlehem in the sale of certain fabricated steel products."

"It would eliminate Youngstown as a substantial buyer of certain fabricated steel products."

Judge Weinfeld said the merger "offers an incipient threat of setting into motion a chain reaction of further mergers by the other but less powerful companies in the steel industry."

Ministerial Assn. Backs Clinic Plan

The first of four groups necessary for the establishment of a family relations clinic in Roseburg has given its approval to the plan and pledged its support.

Members of the Roseburg Ministerial Assn. in a meeting Wednesday at the Swedish Dining Room unanimously accepted the plan for the family clinic. Twenty-two ministers were present.

The plan is being promoted by the Roseburg YMCA. Its purpose is to form a counseling service for couples with marital difficulties.

Wayne Schulz, secretary of the YMCA, says it is necessary to have support of a ministerial group, the Douglas County Bar Assn., Douglas County Medical Society and Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. Representatives of each of these groups would form panels for counseling. Each panel would be made up of a minister to help with spiritual problems, a doctor for physical or psychological problems, a lawyer for legal aspects and a businessman for financial problems.

In a meeting last week, all four organizations of the county were asked for their support of the program patterned after similar programs in Oklahoma City, Okla., and Salem, Ore. The Roseburg Ministerial Assn. is the first to announce action on the request.

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Improvements In Economy During Next Year Predicted

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Delegates attending the 49th national convention of the Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, opening today, predict an improvement in the nation's economy next year and better days for journalism 19 years from now.

Delegates questioned during an interview on subjects ranging from the recent November elections to secrecy in government, generally agreed that local conditions and good organization would be the key to success on Nov. 4. They also generally predicted that the nation's economy would continue to improve.

Making the predictions were: George W. Healy Jr., editor of the New Orleans Times-Picayune; Robert W. Richards, chief of the San Diego Union's Washington bureau; Neal Van Suoy, editor

and publisher of the Carson City (Nev.) Appeal; and William Ewing, managing editor of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin.

Hits At Secrecy

Another delegate, V. M. Newton Jr., managing editor of the Tampa (Fla.) Tribune, said federal bureaucrats keep secrets from Congress as well as from the American people who foot the bills.

"We've spent 80 billion dollars on foreign aid, for instance, and there never has been a report on where it went," Newton said. "Public records don't show whether this money was spent wisely, wasted, or stolen."

Newton said government secrecy is a bipartisan matter. Both parties have been guilty of keeping public business secret by marking it "classified," he said. More than 400 delegates representing newspaper, radio, and television journalists are attending the three-day convention. Robert J. Cavagnaro of San Francisco, general executive of The Associated Press and Sigma Delta Chi national president, will preside at the sessions.

Boys in Scout troops, however, will have an opportunity to remain in the troop.

Parents of teen-aged sons and school administrators and church and civic leaders also are invited to the meetings, Scarth said.
