The Roseburg Indian wrestling team moved into its second week of workouts Wednesday, preparing for the 1958-59 campaign which opens in 2 1/2 weeks.

Walt Payne's grapplers will travel to Marshfield for a match with the Pirates Friday, Dec. 5. The tribe has 13 lettermen returning from last year's team which was second to Springfield in league action and third in the district tournament. The Sutherland Buildings won the district tourney and South Eugene was second.

Two Return
Just two matmen placing in the district competition are back for action this year. Don Green, who was second in the heavyweight class and Frank Walter, who was second in the 105-pound class, lead the group of returning veterans.

The 11 other lettermen are Barry Serafin, Pat Wilson, Jim McGhee, Bob Eddy, John Antonen, Bill White, Bill Wenneberger, Bill Kelsner, Doug Frabie, Larry Totton and Steve Johns.

Payne welcomed a total of 70 candidates at the first turnout for the Indian club last week. The tribe mentor describes 27 grapplers as experienced and feels the club as a whole will be very inexperienced. "We hope to make up for this lack of experience with plenty of desire," says Payne.

Tough Matches Seen
The tribe coach looks for tough teams again this year from Springfield, Marshfield and South Eugene. Following the opening test at Marshfield, the tribe will try the Axemen at Eugene on Dec. 12 and will return home the following night for the initial match here.
