Leonard Edward vs. Mary E. Payne on grounds of desertion, asking decree only. One child already emancipated. Married at Aztec, New Mex., on Oct. 15, 1939.

Claude T. vs. Flora Belle Riggs on cruelty grounds. Plaintiff asks that custody of three minor children be awarded defendant with \$100 a month support, and order establishing couple as tenants in common of real property; defendant to be awarded trailer house and 1954 car. Married Sept. 4, 1944, at Portland.

Cecil E. vs. Carol R. Lingenfelter on grounds of cruelty. Plaintiff seeks custody of five children, real property, household furnishings and automobile. Married at Reno, Nev., on Oct. 23, 1945.
