Semi-finals rounds of the Oregon high school football championships open Friday night with Jefferson of Portland, defending class A-1 champion, heavily favored.

Jefferson, A-1 titlist and No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, will meet tenth-place West Linn on the neutral Madison High School field at Portland.

Jefferson crushed Wy-East last weekend in a playoff opener for its tenth victory in as many starts this year. West Linn was hard pressed to get by Astoria.

The Jefferson-West Linn winner will meet the victor in a game between Medford, ranked No. 2 in the AP poll, and Pendleton at Medford, Medford and Pendleton, rated No. 9, play Saturday night.

In class A-2 Willamina, with a 10-0 record will host to Bandon, 8-2, Friday night. Vale, also 10-0 and defending A-2 titlist, will be at Eagle Point for a Saturday afternoon game.

The class B and six-man play-

off action is scheduled for Saturday.

In class B Umatilla (10-0) will play at Merrill (9-0) in the afternoon and Yoncalla (9-0) will be at Tillamook Catholic (9-2) in the evening.

Culver and Alsea will meet at Alsea Saturday afternoon for the six-man championship.

The class A-1 title game will be played at Portland's Multnomah Stadium next Friday night.

## Host Tillamook Catholic Tests Unbeaten Yoncalla As Weights, Point Marks Rate Foes Equal

The Yoncalla Eagles and the Tillamook Catholic Vikings meet at Tillamook Saturday night in a Class B semi final fray, with the winner headed for the state championship game next weekend.

The tilt on the VIK field is scheduled at 7 p.m. Kickoff is held at 7:15. The game will be broadcast on radio by KJZZ.

Undefeated Eagles try to record win No. 10 of the season and the Vikings take a 2-2 mark into the important state playoff game.

For the Eagles, the fray will be the first night contest they have played. In preparation for the night appearance under lights, Yoncalla has been working out under the arcs at the Drain Warrior field.

All Players Ready Ron Anderson's eleven will be at full strength for the tussle and left tackle Tom Haupt, center Kenny Ross and right tackle Ken Burkhardt.

The winner of the game will meet the winner of the other Class B semi final tilt, Merrill or Umatilla. That fray is set for Saturday afternoon at Merrill.

Scoring averages for the clubs are almost equal also. In the 10 games played by the VIKs, they have scored 245 points and given up 98 for 24.5 and 9.8 per game averages.

The Eagles have hit for 249 points in nine games and have allowed 39 points. Average-wise, Yoncalla has scored 27.6 points and given up 4.3 points per game.

In individual scoring, the Vikings are led by left half Buck Colknon with 117 points. Right half Joe Codd and fullback Jim Carver both have hit for 36 points. Quarterback Bob Durrer has scored 26 points and has passed for an additional four touchdowns. Colknon was the big gun for the Vikings last week in the quarter finals, as he ran 8, 18 and 33 yards for scores.

**Wiley Leads Attack**  
For the Eagles, fullback Orlan Wiley is leading the scoring chase. Wiley scored three times against Mapleton last week, to increase his total to 69 points. Right half Doug Holloman is in the second spot with 50 points and left half, Ken Bowman, has racked up 37 points.

Sophomore quarterback Ron Revelle has 33 points and has passed for six touchdowns and four PATs. Wiley was on the receiving end of a Revelle pass last week, from eight yards out, for one of his three TDs. Other scoring losses by Revelle have been to left end Jim Booth and right end Cliff Emery. Booth has 28 points on touchdowns and extra points, and Emery has scored one for six points.

Although both clubs have good passing attacks, both are primarily ground teams.

## OSC Is Pick By One TD In Traditional

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State College, still clutching to a slim hope for the Rose Bowl, will be a one-touchdown favorite over Oregon in their traditional football game here Saturday.

The Beavers, after a series of costly injuries throughout the season, have appeared to be just about 100 per cent physically fit in workouts here this week.

Oregon will be without regular halfback Charlie Tourville, who is hampered by an injury, at least as a starter, but the rest of the squad is in good condition. Tourville will be replaced either by Len Read or Don Laudenslager, both experienced and talented.

Other starting Oregon backs will be Dave Frost at quarterback, Willie West at left half, and Marlan Holland at fullback.

In the line Oregon will have Ron Stover and Aiden Kimbrough at ends, Jim Linden and Darrell Aschbacher at tackles, Bob Protka and Will Reeve or Joe Schaffeld at guards, and Bob Peterson at center.

Grimm Mason has shaken off a knee injury and probably will start in the key tailback position in Oregon State's single wing offensive. He is backed up by Paul Lowe, a dangerous breakaway threat, and Dainard Paulson.

The rest of the secondary will be Sub Beamer, a star in last week's victory over Stanford, at fullback; Earnel Durden at back and either Derald Swift or Gary Luskhart at blocking back.

Coach Tommy Prothro expects to start a line made up of Don Biehl and Aaron Thomas at ends; Ted Bates and Ed Wohlschlag at tackles; Sonny Sanchez and Captain Jim Brackins at guards; and Bruce Hake at center.

Bates, a 215-pounder who is being boosted by Oregon State players for All America rating, will be closely watched by more than 21,000 fans expected to attend.

Last year Oregon State upset Oregon, which later represented the Pacific Coast Conference in the Rose Bowl, 10-7.

## Bowl Berths, Loop Crowns, Prestige Up For Grabs In College Grid Tilts Saturday

That college football grab-bag is just brimming over with bowl berths and conference championships this weekend.

Such delicacies as berths in the Rose, Sugar, Cotton and Orange Bowls, the Ivy, Southeastern, and Skyline Conference championships and a couple of really ancient rivalries promise to tempt the gridiron gourmets.

The program begins tonight with Iowa State visiting San Jose State and Houston traveling to Miami (Fla.) in intercollegiate games.

If California, rated No. 19 in this week's Associated Press poll of sportswriters and broadcasters, can knock off Stanford Saturday it will win the Pacific Coast Conference crown. All it needs then is five votes from PCC members and it will meet Iowa in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day in Pasadena.

If runners-up Washington State and Oregon State win, and Cal loses, then one of that duo will play for the roses.

**Buchholz Whips Aussie Anderson In Net Upset**  
SYDNEY (AP)—Hopes that the United States might regain the Davis Cup this year soared today as young Earl Buchholz whipped Mal Anderson, crack Australian Davis Cupper in the New South Wales Tennis Championships.

The 18-year-old from St. Louis played like a champion in downing Anderson 6-3, 6-2, 9-7 in a second round match.

Buchholz, who started playing tennis at the age of six, emerged as one of America's hopes to win back the Davis Cup from Australia when he won the Junior Championship at Wimbledon in England last July.

"I have lost my form," exclaimed the unhappy Anderson. "My concentration has gone, but Buchholz played well and deserved to win."

Buchholz later took the court with Chris Crawford, Piedmont, Calif., for doubles against Doug and Wayne Reid, Australian brothers. Darkfeet halted play with the Reids leading 5-7, 7-5, 6-3, 5-5.

Crawford was the only one of the 5-man U.S. Davis Cup squad to be eliminated in the singles. He lost in a quick 35 minutes to Roy Emerson, Aussie star, 6-2, 6-2, 6-1.

Barry MacKay, of Dayton, Ohio, beat Barry Phillips-Moore, Australia, 6-1, 6-0, 6-2.

Hamilton Richardson, of Arlington, Va., downed John Hillebrand, Australia, 6-1, 6-2, 6-1. Alex Almendarez, the Peruvian from Southern California, defeated Warren Woodcock 8-5, 6-3, 6-2.

## WSC Tabbed By 7 Points Over Huskies

SPOKANE (AP)—Washington State is favored by seven points to beat Washington here Saturday, but for the first time in 28 years a Cougar victory in this cross-state battle won't be quite enough for long suffering alumni.

To completely satisfy, Stanford must also beat California (now 5-1) and then the Pacific Coast Conference electorate must decide that WSC (currently 5-2) is the league's most representative team for the Rose Bowl.

So with nose to the grindstone, shoulder to the wheel and ear to the stadium announcer for progress reports on Cal, the 1958 Cougars make their big pitch for Pasadena, a place WSC last visited before any of them were yet alive.

If the Cougars win Saturday they will finish with a 7-3 record, the best since a similar 7-3 season in 1951 under Coach Forest Evashevski who takes Iowa to Pasadena this year as the Big Ten's best.

**Huskies Look For Aerials**  
Coach Jim Owens of Washington has drilled his Huskies this week against the WSC passing attack and, perhaps for psychological reasons, has proclaimed that "WSC has perhaps the best group of pass receivers ever assembled on a college team."

There are neutral observers who agree. End Gail Cogdill set an all-time single game passing reception record of 232 yards and two touchdowns on seven catches against Northwestern this year.

End Jack Fanning led the nation with nine scoring catches in 1957. End Don Ellingsen led the PCC with 45 receptions last year. End Bill Steiger was the league's best with 39 in 1956. All but Cogdill are among the 14 Cougar seniors who end their careers Saturday.

**Wilson Set**  
Reserve Davey Wilson will do most of the throwing for WSC Saturday although Bobby Newman, the nation's total offense leader last year, is ready for action after trouble with an injured knee.

The Huskies from Seattle have a fine passer in Bob Hivner and a crack runner in Luther Carr but don't have much experience in the line.

Four inches of snow fell here Tuesday but it was gone Friday. The Memorial Stadium turf is soggy and unlikely to dry out by game time.

The weather bureau forecast a dry day with temperatures in the 40's for an expected crowd of some 25,000 for the 1:30 p.m. (PST) kickoff.

## College Stars In Last Efforts Sat.

This Saturday is swan-song day for a lot of good football talent around the nation's college campuses and you can look for all-out efforts on the part of all concerned to leave the partisans—and some bowlers—with a favorable last impression.

Most of these stalwarts will be playing in post-season all star or major bowl games but this is their last partisan fling.

Rutgers bids good-bye to halfback Billy Austin, considered its greatest all-around back and one of the best ever to play in the East.

Princeton tailback Dan Sachs plays his last game for Princeton when it opposes Dartmouth for the Ivy League title.

There'll be plenty at stake at Chapel Hill, N. C., and Morgantown, W. Va. At Chapel Hill, North Carolina entertains arch-rival Duke and the Tar-Heels are still bowl-hoping. Senior quarterback Jack Cummings will have a lot to say. He went through a long passing drill Wednesday in preparation for the Blue Devils.

Duke, which will try to keep Cummings from setting a host of Atlantic Coast Conference and school records, has Wray Carlton, its backfield ace of the past two seasons, as the only healthy starting back.

At Morgantown, two quarterbacks play their final regular games. West Virginia's Dick Longfellow, the Southern Conference offense leader, tries to pitch his team to a 10-0 record in 10 games. His opponent, Syracuse's Chuck Zimmerman, will try to guide the Orange to a seventh straight victory, ninth in 10 games, and an Orange Bowl bid.

Maryland's guard Rod Breedlove will host out against Virginia. The Terps spent their final hard practice session prepping for an expected onslaught of passing from Cavalier quarterback Reece Whitley.

Iowa quarterback Randy Duncan, who will be seen again in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day,

plays his final game before the home folks when the Big Ten champs take on Notre Dame. Capt. John Nocera, another senior, will be at fullback in place of Don Horn.

Don Clark plays his final game for Ohio State when the Bucks meet Michigan.

**Kapp Seeks Bowl Berth**  
On the West Coast, Joe Kapp, California's all-everything quarterback, uses his last game with the hopes of taking the Bears to the Rose Bowl with a victory against Stanford. Up the coast, Bobby Newman, Washington State's passing ace, could do the same if he pitches WSC to a victory over Washington and Cal loses.

The Pacific Coast Conference bowl representative would be decided by a vote. In case of a tie, the last to go to the big affair gets the nod. Washington State went in 1931, the longest of any PCC eligible.
