

Gen. De Gaulle Wins Another Strong Endorsement

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Comic Parkyakarkas Dies Of Heart Attack During Dinner For Lucille Ball

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Harry Einstein, 54, who rose to radio fame as the Greek funnyman Parkyakarkas, died of a heart attack today backstage at a show business gathering.

Einstein had just finished an hilarious talk at a Friar's Club testimonial dinner for Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz when he collapsed.

He was carried backstage and while some of the nation's top entertainers kept the show going, doctors summoned from the audience made an incision in his chest and massaged his heart.

For two hours they kept his heart pumping by their manipulation but there was no answering response from the heart. Einstein was finally pronounced dead by Dr. Alfred Goldman.

Doctor Summoned

Goldman was one of five doctors in the audience of 1,200 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel who rushed forward when comedian Milton Berle suddenly sent a chill through the gay crowd with his cry: "Is there a doctor in the house?"

Berle was sitting next to Einstein on the speaker's platform. Just after taking his seat following his brief talk, Einstein slumped over, his head falling on Berle's shoulder.

As Parkyakarkas, as everyone called him, had drawn the biggest laughs of the evening during his appearance topping such well-known comedians as Berle, George Burns and Danny Thomas.

For awhile the others kept the entertainment going, but finally Arnaz stepped forward.

"This dinner is something I've looked forward to for a long time," he said, "but it doesn't mean anything now. They say the show must go on. But why must it?"

And he stopped.

Arnaz, Lucille Ball, Berle and others from the audience clustered behind the curtain backstage area where the dramatic fight to save Einstein's life was going on.

Leaves Wife, 3 Sons

Nearby, but not watching, was Parkyakarkas' wife, the former actress Thelma Leeds. She was comforted by her son Clifford, 18. Einstein leaves three other sons, including the novelist Charles Einstein.

Pope John Is 77, May Have To Be Told Of Birthday

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII is 77 Tuesday. He may have to be reminded it's his birthday, Vatican aides say.

He has been too busy in his first month as pontiff to make any personal plans for the day. He may, at the last minute, call in one or two friends for a quiet meal.

His three brothers and one sister, last of a family of 12 children, will not be here. They, and hundreds of townsmen from his native village of Sotto il Monte and his province of Bergamo, are coming down by special train Dec. 6, instead, to give him a golden crown.

John XXIII was older, at the time of his election Oct. 28, than any other newly elected pope since Clement XII in 1730. Clement was 78 when he became pontiff.

But with an energy that belies his years, sturdy Pope John was held to a work schedule that allows only six hours sleep a night, and already has set several precedents.

A week ago he called a consistory for Dec. 15 to create 23 new cardinals and increase the size of the Sacred College to 75. It had been fixed at 70 for nearly four centuries.

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Candidates Ride Coattails Of French Leaders

PARIS (AP) — Premier De Gaulle, without having lifted a finger in the campaign, won another strong endorsement from the French people in first-round voting Sunday for the new National Assembly.

With many candidates trying to ride De Gaulle's coattails, outright foes of the Premier made the poorest showing.

A strong rightist swing was accompanied by a Communist decline, though the anti-Gaullist Communists were still the strongest single party. Red chieftain Jacques Duclos faced a stiff fight in the runoff next Sunday.

The De Gaulle tide swamped such non-Communist foes as former Premier Pierre Mendes-France and Maurice Bourges-Maunoury. Both lost their Assembly seats on the first ballot.

It boomed to second rank—after the Communists—a brand new De-Gaullist party, the Union for the New Republic (UNR) headed by Information Minister Jacques Soustelle.

Clear Cut Trend

This was the clearest trend though only 41 of the 465 deputies from mainland France were elected by a majority vote over all opponents. The remainder will be chosen in runoffs next Sunday, when a winner will need only a plurality.

With only 39,947,27 of the 28 million eligible bothering to vote, the Interior Minister gave this breakdown of the results:

Communists, elected: 150,000; 3,882,204 popular votes, 18.94 per cent of the vote.

UNR, 8 deputies, 3,603,938 votes, 17.6 per cent.

Socialists, 2 deputies, 3,167,354 votes, 15.5 per cent.

Independents, mostly rightists, 15 deputies, 2,816,176 votes, 13.74 per cent.

The remaining votes were scattered among 14 other parties and groups.

The Communist percentage compared with 25.6 in the last general election of 1956, and the Red popular vote compared with their peak strength of 54 million votes in 1946. They held 142 seats in the old Assembly.

Projection of the trend could cut the Communists to below 30 seats.

De Gaulle lent his name officially to none of the candidates. But with issues few, candidates of all stripes grabbed his coattails as the most attractive thing in sight.

Benefiting most was the empire-minded Soustelle, who helped De Gaulle back to power last May during the rightist rebellion in Algeria.

Catherine A. Booth Dies Here Sunday

Funeral services will be held Tuesday for Mrs. Catherine A. Booth, 82, widow of the late J. F. Booth and Roseburg resident since 1908. She died Saturday in a Roseburg hospital after a long illness.

Mrs. Booth was born at Grants Pass Aug. 13, 1876, the daughter of John Charles and Lucinda Dimmick Campbell, pioneers of Southern Oregon. Her father was a founder of the First National Bank of Southern Oregon at Grants Pass.

She was married at Grants Pass March 28, 1895, to James Henry Booth, shortly after their marriage, they moved to Saginaw, Mich., where they lived for two years later in 1908.

Her husband was founder and president of Douglas National Bank in Roseburg. It later was sold to the United States National Bank of Portland. He died in October, 1947.

Mrs. Booth was a member of the First Methodist Church in Roseburg.

Surviving are two sons, Harrie W. and Edwin S. Booth, both of Roseburg, three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Tuesday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. H. James Jenkins of the First Methodist Church officiating. Concluding services and vault interment will be in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Social Worker Charged With Hiring Man To Kill Wife Of Policeman She Loved

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — A 22-year-old social worker is charged with hiring a man to kill the wife of a state highway patrolman she loved. The man she allegedly hired for \$500 turned out to be a police detective.

The intended murder was not committed. The highway patrolman was not implicated.

Barbara Ann Massey, was released under \$1,000 bond after her arrest Saturday. She goes on trial Friday in Mecklenburg County Recorder's Court at Charlotte.

The warrant for her arrest charged that she solicited Richard Ruth "to murder one Frances Smith," mother of two children, for \$500.

Police gave this account: Massey asked a man in Charlotte about two weeks ago to suggest someone for the job of killing Mrs. Smith. The man she asked was a police informer who notified Detective Ruth.

Ruth met Miss Massey Nov. 15. He carried a hidden tape recorder. She gave him a \$500 check.

Police said Miss Massey was not arrested until Saturday, since officials had not decided on the charge to be placed against her.

Charge Misdemeanor
Charlotte Solicitor (prosecutor) W. H. Scarborough said the charge is a misdemeanor, carrying a maximum sentence of two years.

State Highway Patrol Lt. S. L. Willard said Mrs. Smith is the wife of Patrolman Ransom Smith of the Greensboro troop, who resigned from the force Saturday.

Patrol Col. James R. Smith (no relation) said at Raleigh that the trooper "had a splendid record and had been an outstanding member of the patrol."

Li. Willard said Miss Massey, an assistant case worker with the Guilford County Welfare Department, made a statement to police that cleared Trooper Smith of any implication in the case. Her lawyer Welch Jordan of Greensboro said he made an appointment for her with a psychiatrist after her release on bond.

Miss Massey's father D. F. Massey was a Greensboro policeman for 12 years. In 1948 he was arrested for breaking and entering a cafe and served a prison sentence. About three years ago he was found dead by a roadside in Sampson County.

As a high school student, Miss Massey won the national Knights of Columbus essay contest.

Canyonville Robbery Is Reported To Police
An O'Brien man informed state police at Eugene Saturday that he had been robbed of \$32 and a suitcase while sleeping in his car about 10 miles south of Canyonville on Highway 99.

James Harlan Acord, in making a belated report, said he had been robbed about 8 a.m. by three young men. He did not tell police of the incident until Saturday afternoon.

Acord said the robbers were driving a 1955 or 1956 car, either a Chevrolet or Oldsmobile, which he said was a red hardtop model. He told officers two of the men were about 23 years old and the third was 19 or 20.

the agreements. But if she pulls out there is nothing they can do about it.

Some observers felt that the Soviet silence on her next move was part of a double-barreled campaign to raise tension and suspense. West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer after a talk with the Soviet ambassador in Bonn, said the Soviet Union would tell what she was going to do in notes to be delivered last Saturday in Moscow. Nothing happened.

Situation Intolerable

The other barrel of the campaign was propaganda. The East German Communist paper Neues Deutschland declared the situation in West Berlin was intolerable and it was time for the Western powers to get out.

"West Berlin has become a Quagmire," it said, a reference to the Nationalist Chinese island off the China mainland.

U.S. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) made some propaganda for the West in Berlin. On a visit, he declared before television cameras that the United States was determined to keep West Berlin a "citadel of freedom."

negotiators to the airline's Kansas City headquarters to seek a settlement.

As labor troubles also beset small airline companies, Capital Airlines resumed partial service after ending a 37-day strike by 2,600 machinists. Normal passenger traffic was expected to be resumed Wednesday.

Accept Pay Increase
Capital machinists accepted a 41-cent-an-hour increase over a three-year period, bringing their top pay to \$25.95 an hour. A TWA spokesman said the company's final wage offer was almost the same as accepted by machinists of Capital and Northwest Airlines.

The union's last contract with TWA provided for wages ranging from \$14.50 an hour for kitchen helpers to \$26.50 for machinists with 13 years experience.

At Indianapolis, 33 stewardesses of Lake Central Airlines struck at midnight in a dispute over wages. They hoped pickets would refuse to cross their picket lines and ground the line's aircraft in six Midwest and Eastern states. Picket lines were set up in Indianapolis, Chicago and Columbus, Ohio. The line also serves cities in Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York.

The machinists union, in dispute with three smaller airline companies, reached a tentative agreement early today on a new contract with West Coast Airlines. A union spokesman said the contract was subject to ratification of the 86 mechanics who struck the airline four days ago. The company serves 41 cities in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Other Strikes Listed
The union has authorized a strike against Pacific Airlines, which operates in California and Nevada, but no date was set. The union also is in dispute with North-east Airlines.

The auto industry, Studebaker-Packard production workers at South Bend, Ind., rejected a company wage increase proposal tied to new car sales and voted to strike today. The walkout, approved by the United Auto Workers Local 5, would idle 7,000 employees. Management and union representatives continued efforts to reach an agreement.

There was a bright spot in the labor picture too. A new three-year master contract was reached by Bendix Aviation Corp. and the United Auto Workers. It covered 13,500 workers in eight cities and ended a strike which started Tuesday.

The new pact is subject to ratification by local unions and the working out of supplemental local agreements. Terms roughly parallel those agreed upon between the union and the auto industry's Big Three—General Motors, Chrysler and Ford—in pattern-setting pacts reached earlier this year.

The UAW has strikes continuing against two big farm machinery firms, International Harvester Co. and Caterpillar Tractor Co. Wages are the chief issue in both disputes.

Operations at the Big Gary, Ind., works of the U.S. Steel Corp., were curtailed by a strike Sunday of 1,400 switchmen, brakemen and yardmen of the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern Railway. Pickets were withdrawn from the Gary works shortly before midnight. Full operation was not expected until midnight tonight.

The strike by members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen was termed by a union spokesman as unauthorized.

Night Operations Set At Riddle Lumber Mill
Night operations were slated to get under way tonight at the Monroe Lumber Co. mill in Riddle, reported correspondent Erma Best.

About 30 men will be working the shift. A night shift began at the company's peeler plant two weeks ago, said Mrs. Best.

The vehicle swerved across the highway, went over the left bank, rolled over and returned to its wheels.

Kutzner was brought to Sutherlin by passerby and checked by a physician. She was released.

Roseburg Rural Fireman Back From Long Journey

Cliff Thrasher, assistant chief of the Roseburg Rural Fire Department, arrived home late last week from a six-day trip in a fire engine chassis from Louisville, Ky., to Cornelius, Ore.

Fire equipment will be added to the chassis in the Oregon city. Thrasher said the department may be able to take delivery by the first of year.

It was a jolting trip for most of the distance across the continent. Thrasher said he barely missed last week's blizzards in the Midwest, catching only an edge of the great storm in Colorado.

After a good night's sleep, which soothed most of his aching bones, the fireman was back at work Saturday morning.

It calls for two major speeches, a dozen meetings and conferences with political and business leaders, lunch with Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip, host to the royal couple over a Thanksgiving bird, and a visit to Oxford University. He leaves Friday.

To represent Eisenhower

Nixon is coming to represent President Eisenhower at the dedication Wednesday of the American Chapel at St. Paul's Cathedral.

The chapel commemorates the 28,000 Americans who were killed during World War II either in Britain or during U.S. operations launched from British bases.

This being Nixon's first visit to Britain, several British newspapers have been trying to explain who and what he is. His record of voting for foreign aid while a senator and his pro-European stand while vice president have been heavily featured. Most articles have been favorable, but some have said Nixon is controversial to many Britons and to many more Americans.

One article said one of the aims of the visit to Britain was to give Nixon more of an aura of world statesman. Another article said the visit was the opening gun of Nixon's bid for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination.

The Communists are urging party stalwarts to boo and placard Nixon. But no violence is expected during the visit.
