

Eagles, Merrill Tangle For Class B Crown

Major Bowls To Be Filled Following Saturday Slate

Four major bowl berths will be filled and Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium will be packed for the Army-Navy game Saturday as college football fires its last blast of the season.

Army, shunning bowls, takes a 7-0 record against Navy, shunned by bowls in light of a 50-0 6-2 mark. It was Pitt, knocked out of the major bowl picture by Penn State's 25-21 upset Thursday, that marred the Cadets' record with a 14-1 tie, Tulane and Notre Dame beat Navy.

Notre Dame, which closes at Southern California Saturday, was the only common foe on the Army and Navy schedules, and the Cadets beat the Irish 14-2.

Half a dozen or so games will decide bowl bids.

Two Bowls Booked

Only two of the five major bowls are filled, Iowa and California will play in the Rose Bowl, and Oklahoma and Syracuse fill the Orange Bowl.

The Cotton Bowl needs a team to face Texas Christian, the Sugar Bowl needs an opponent for Louisiana State and the Gator Bowl has two berths to fill.

Iowa, California, Syracuse and LSU have completed their regular seasons. Oklahoma shuts down shop Saturday against Oklahoma State. TCU calls it quits against Southern Methodist.

COP's Bass Takes Three College Titles

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) College of the Pacific's Dick Bass, playing on a badly swollen big toe, hobbled off with three national football titles Thursday as the Tigers shattered Fresno State 52-6.

His teammates carried Bass from the field after he completed a season that hadn't been matched in 21 years.

The 188-pound, 5-foot-11 halfback from Vallejo, Calif., gained 130 yards in 39 carries, bucked for two touchdowns and caught a pass for a two-point conversion.

The performance gave him a 10-game total of 1,361 yards rushed in 205 carries; 1,440 yards in total offense in 217 plays; and 116 points scored — all three marks the best in the country.

Not since Byron (Whizzer) White of Colorado in 1937 has one player won all three titles in a single year.

"I really wasn't sure that I had won all those championships until the fellows picked me up after the game," said Bass. "I guess I was lucky to even get a chance to play."

"I hurt the toe in the second quarter against San Diego State and for a while we thought it was broken. I didn't run all week because I wanted to play against Fresno."

Bass grimaced as he eased his left foot into a street shoe. "They gave me a shot of novocaine and that helped," he said, "but even though I had good footing, I couldn't get good footing. That big toe really hurt."

Last year Bass missed the entire season with another leg injury. "Thus he has a year of eligibility remaining. He plans to come back to COP and use it."

Of the top 10 teams in the latest Associated Press poll, five already have been picked for bowls (LSU, No. 1; Oklahoma, No. 3; Iowa, No. 4; TCU, No. 7; and Syracuse, No. 10). Three are ineligible (Auburn, No. 2; Wisconsin, No. 6; and Ohio State, No. 9) and one (Army, No. 5) turns its back on such doings.

AF Likely Bet

That leaves Air Force (No. 8) as the only top 10 team still to be had. And the Cotton Bowl likely will get the Falcons (8-0-1) if they whip Colorado Saturday.

The Sugar Bowl reportedly is set to tap Clemson (7-2) to face unbeaten, untied LSU New Year's Day if the Atlantic Coast Conference champion beats Furman Saturday.

That leaves SMU, Mississippi, Georgia Tech, Florida, South Carolina, Vanderbilt and Rice on the prowl for the Gator Bowl bid — or the Sugar and Cotton berths should the Air Force and — or Clemson slip up.

SMU needs an upset over TCU to make it. Mississippi plays Mississippi State. Tech takes on Georgia. Florida finishes against Miami. Vanderbilt meets Tennessee and Rice plays Baylor.

Gamecock Wins

South Carolina (7-3) wrapped up its regular season Thursday by whipping Wake Forest 24-7. Mississippi Southern, also a bowl prospect, locked up a perfect 9-0 season, defeating Chattanooga 20-13.

Texas (7-3) took itself out of possible bowl consideration after rapping Texas A&M 27-0. Rutgers (8-1), which finished last weekend, got tired of waiting and also withdrew from the list of post-season prospects although under serious consideration by the Blue Grass bowl committee.

The Blue Grass, with Alabama a top choice, will name its pairing Monday. Pitt's still alive for this one, along with Tulsa and Florida State in addition to the clubs already listed by the major bowl groups. Alabama (5-3-1) closes Saturday against Auburn (8-0-1), which is looking for its second straight unbeaten season but is banned from bowl play by NCAA probation.

Tulsa Beats Shockers

Tulsa (7-3) finished with a 25-6 victory over Wichita Thursday. Virginia Tech eliminated Virginia Military from the postseason hopefuls 21-16. Cincinnati defeated Miami (Ohio) 18-7 in a battle of minor bowl prospects.

Cornell gained a second-place tie with Princeton in the Ivy League behind champ Dartmouth by defeating Penn 19-7.

Middies Bank Upset Hopes On Soph Crop

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — "Operation Upset," Navy's plan to wreck an unbeaten football season for Army, hinges on the work of sophomores Saturday. The cadets can find no solace in the fact that yearlings annually have played a vital role in the service classic since 1923.

Halfback Joe Bellino of Winchester, Mass., and fullback Joe Matalavage from Mahanoy City, Pa., spearhead the "Middies' sophomores primed for an assault on the veteran Cadet squad.

Navy To Pass

From Coach Eddie Erdelatz, down the word at Navy is that quarterback Joe Tranchini must click on his passes if the Middies are to pull their biggest surprise since their 1950 shocker which snapped a 28-game Cadet unbeaten string.

But without Bellino's breakaway threat and speed as a pass re-

ceiver and without the rugged Matalavage to share the line-busting chores with Ray Weiborn, Army could strangle the Navy aerial game by concentrating on it.

Army is a one touchdown favorite for this 59th meeting which will unfold before the usual capacity crowd of 102,000 plus a national television audience.

The Cadets have perhaps the finest halfback tandem in the nation in Capt. Pete Dawkins and Bob Anderson, their celebrated "lonesome end" offense with the defensive problems it creates and a quick, hard-hitting line.

Seniors Seek Vengeance

In addition to the goal of the first, undefeated Army season since 1949, seven Cadet senior starters have added incentive. They are eager to square matters with a Navy club they've never beaten as varsity performers. It was a 7-7 tie in 1956 and Navy won 14-0 last year.

But don't forget those sophomores. Remember . . .

1953 — Army won 20-7 when sophomore Pat Uebel scored three touchdowns while sophomores Ralph Chesnauskas and Bob Farrier led a grudging defense.

1954 — Navy won 27-20 as Middle sophomore Earl Smith caught two touchdown passes from George Welsh.

1955 — Army sophomore guard Stan Slater recovered a fumble on his 20 to half a 63 yard Middle March that threatened a slim 7-6 Cadet lead. Army upset Navy 14-6.

1956 — Navy sophomore, Dick Dagampat carried on five of seven plays for a touchdown after sophomore end John Kanuch recovered a fumble on the Army 27 as Navy rallied for a 7-7 tie.

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Sutherlin Gridiron Is Battle Site As Unbeatens Clash

Grid fans have an opportunity of witnessing prep football at its best Saturday afternoon at Sutherlin as the 1958 Oregon Class B football title is determined.

Two undefeated eleven meet in the final contest of the year as the Merrill Huskies and the Yoncalla Eagles battle for the crown. Kick-off time for the fray is 1:30 p.m.

The Huskies rallied to the District 5 title and a berth in the playoffs and go into the final game with a 10-0 record. For the Eagles, District 4 title, an identical 10-0 mark is taken into the championship game.

An overflow crowd is expected at the Sutherlin gridiron, with a large group of Husky backers making the journey via two chartered buses and numerous private automobiles.

Both Clear Hurdles

Both teams won their berths in the final game last week with wins in semifinal action. Al Keck's Huskies rolled over the Umatilla Vikings 31-0. A 7-0 victory at Tillamook Catholic gave Ron Anderson's Eagles their spot in the final round.

The clubs will be very close in team weight averages. The Huskies hit the 166 mark and the Eagles 169. Offensive weights in the line give the Eagles a 16 pounds-per-man advantage but the Huskies have the backfield edge 176 to 153. The line edge held by the Eagles is deceptive, however, as the Huskies have a much heavier defensive unit.

The Klamath County eleven has been a high scoring club, hitting 393 points for a per game average of 39.3. This compares with the Eagles' mark of 256 points or an average of 25.6 points scored.

Eagle Defense Tops

Defensively, the Eagles have the better mark, allowing opponents 39 points for a 3.9 per-game average. The Huskies have given up 104 points for an average of 10.4.

Leading the Merrill scoring is right half Bud Maupin, a 170-pounder who has hit for 146 points. Left halfback John Haskins has hit paydirt for 85 points and Husky fullback, a 210-pounder, Troy Patterson, has 65 points.
