Japan Ratifies Atomic Agreements With U. S.

TOKYO (AP)—Japanese ratification of atomic agreements with the United States and Britain became effective today. Under the agreement with the United States, Japan will obtain enriched uranium 235 to fuel nuclear research reactions. The agreement with Britain clears the way for Japan to buy a power reactor.

Report Says Soviet Union Flying Nuclear Bombers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense McElroy said today that he is highly skeptical of a report that the Russians are test-flying the world's first nuclear powered aircraft.

The magazine Aviation Week published the report Sunday, saying a Russian atomic plane was completed six months ago and that it has been flying in the Moscow area for at least two months. McElroy said if the magazine's report is true "it would be a surprise to us."

The defense boss conceded in talking to reporters that the Soviet Union might have a "slight lead" over the United States in the ultimate development of a nuclear aircraft. But, he said, there is no plan to change the aircraft program because of it.

A turbo-jet engine, designed by the General Electric Co. at Evendale, Ohio, was powered by heat from a nuclear reactor for the first time by the United States in January, 1956. That engine has been improved considerably and tested several times since then.

Working On Design
Two American firms, Convair and Lockheed, have been working

on suitable designs for an atomic airplane for several years. A decision is expected, possibly before the end of this year, as to which design will be adopted.

Aviation Week said the Russian test flights of a nuclear plane have been seen by observers from both Communist and non-Communist countries.

The nuclear power plant was described as the simplest kind of an atomic engine, a direct air cycle design similar to that being developed by this country. Such an engine is like the ordinary turbo-jet engine except that a nuclear reactor replaces the combustion chamber to provide the heat which furnished the power.

Nearly three years ago, in January 1956, this country first used a nuclear reactor to provide the heat for a turbojet engine. The Atomic Energy Commission said tests of the laboratory model at its eastern Idaho testing station demonstrated the feasibility of the engine, designed by the General Electric Co. at Evendale, Ohio.

No airplane has yet been built to go with the engine, although work on design studies have been under way for several years at

Convair's Fort Worth, Tex., plant and at Lockheed's facilities at Marietta, Ga.

Completion By Fall

The Idaho test station expects completion by next fall of facilities to test the engine in conjunction with an air frame on the ground. No date for flight testing a nuclear-powered plane has been announced.

Aviation Week said the Soviet plane is powered with two nuclear engines and two conventional jet engines. Speeds were estimated at just above or below the speed of sound.

The magazine said the plane weighs 300,000 pounds, is 195 feet long and has a wingspread of 78 feet. This country's eight-jet B52 bomber weighs about 400,000 pounds and is 156½ feet long.

A major advantage of a nuclear-powered plane is that it might be flown for days or weeks without refueling.

Among major obstacles to its development are the need for special metals able to withstand the intense heat of an atomic reactor, and the weight of the shielding now considered necessary to protect the crew from radiation.

Communists Hit Quemoy With Token Shelling

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Communists peppered Quemoy with a light token shelling today, resuming their odd-day firing.

Nationalist defense headquarters said 23 shells landed on the offshore island group before day-break and sporadic shelling continued after dawn.

The Nationalists took advantage of the silenced Communist guns Sunday to send a large supply convoy to Quemoy. The supply vessels unloaded their cargo without interruption.

In Taipei, the U.S. defense command said it had no knowledge of alleged intrusion by American jet planes into Red China's air space.

The Communists charged that two P-104 Starfighters trespassed three times Saturday over Fukien province. The Peiping Foreign Ministry issued its "43rd serious warning against continued U.S. military provocations."

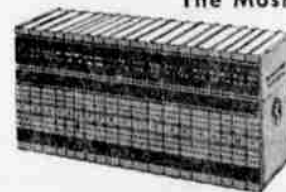
Sugar Consumers Urge Marketing Quota Boost

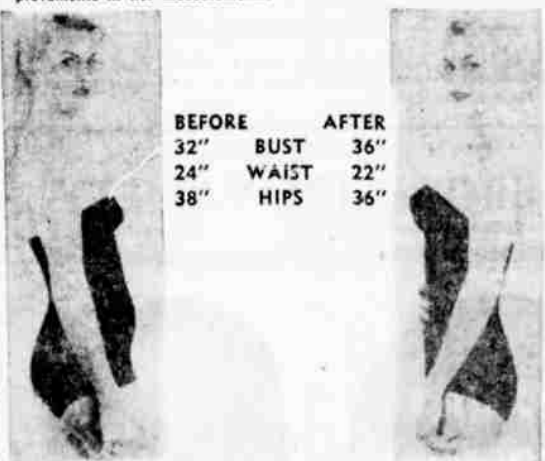

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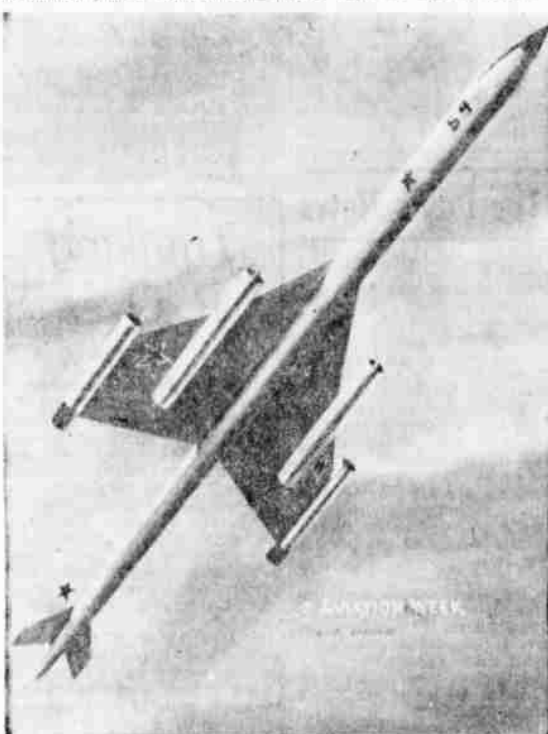

SOVIETS TEST NUCLEAR-POWERED BOMBER — A nuclear-powered bomber is being flight tested in the Soviet Union according to an article in the December issue of Aviation Week magazine. This is an Aviation Week artist's conception of the bomber, which shows large nuclear power plants suspended in pods midway under the delta wing. Conventional turbojets mounted on the wing tips and a 195-foot-long fuselage aid in radiation protection of the crew.

Earthquakes Jolt So. California

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Five earthquakes jolted Southern California Sunday night from Los Angeles to the Mexican border 180 miles away.

Only one of the quakes did any damage but the series of sharp jolts shook up thousands of residents in three counties.

Hardest hit was Calexico, on the Mexican border in Imperial County. Plaster fell from the ceiling of a market, windows were shattered and canned goods tumbled from the shelves. No one was injured.

Ten minutes later a much lighter quake was felt in Los Angeles. Over the next few hours three aftershocks from the border quake set the earth trembling along the geological faults running through the area. More aftershocks are expected.

Coastal communities from San Diego to San Clemente—a 60-mile stretch—felt the tremors.
