Players Continue Campaign For Plan Despite Rejection

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Major League players appeared undismayed today by the owners' rebuff of their demands for a percentage of the clubs' gross income.

The players predicted ultimate victory in the financial tug-of-war. Acting on the final day of their winter meetings, the magnates flatly rejected the players' proposal for a 20 per cent cut of the over-all revenue.

The calm reaction of the players came as somewhat of a surprise because of their earlier threat of drastic action in the event of refusal.

"The players are far from discouraged by the owners' latest action," said J. Norman Lewis, the players' attorney and spokesman.

"The owners have made flat rejections of other player requests before and eventually reconsidered."

To Continue Requests

"They intend to continue to present their arguments with persistence and patient negotiations for a more equitable participation in the increased revenue which has accrued to the owners over the past decade."

Lewis said he planned to meet with league player representatives Robin Roberts of Philadelphia and Eddie Yost of Washington to discuss the players' next move. He said the players did not intend to be stubborn in their demands and would be amenable to a counter proposal.

In other windup action, the owners decided on a three-week free trading period from Nov. 21 through Dec. 15. In this period, players may be swapped from one league to the other without first obtaining waivers. The plan will go into effect next year.

Commissioner Ford Frick frowns on the idea and said he may ask the owners to reconsider this decision at their summer meetings.

The majors, as expected, adopted the watered-down version of the unrestricted-player draft passed by the minors at their convention earlier in the week.

Plan Explained

Under the plan, a minor league player who escapes the draft after his first year becomes ineligible for selection until he has completed the normal draft period. This period varies from two to four years, depending upon his league classification.

American League owners followed the league set by the National League and appointed a two-man committee to select an outside research organization to explore such baseball problems as expansion, realignment and television.

The two committees, to be headed by Phil Wrigley, president of the Chicago Cubs, will work in unison.

Other members are George Meindinger, Cleveland vice president; Arnold Johnson, Kansas City president; and Walter O'Malley, head of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Long Field Goal By WSC Downs Gonzaga, 68-67

SPOKANE (AP) — A 25-foot shot by Duane Ranniger found its mark as a field goal with only three seconds left to play Thursday night, giving Washington State College a 68-67 basketball victory over Gonzaga University.

Ranniger was a substitute and it was the only time during the five minutes he played that he had his hands on the ball. He came in to replace injured Dick Aselson.

Gonzaga was trailing by 20 points with 16 minutes left when the Bulldogs suddenly began finding the basket. They drove ahead until stopped by Ranniger.

Big Jean Lefebvre, Gonzaga's 7-3 pivot man from France, scored only two points. He sat out most of the contest after picking up five fouls in the first five minutes.

Haywire Clock Befuddles Pros

Are the Boston Celtics or the New York Knickerbockers in first place in the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Assn?

The answer is up to League President Maurice Podoloff. He has in his possession a letter protesting Cincinnati's 108-106 victory over New York Wednesday night.

It's being called the mysterious case of the "lost minute" because the Cincinnati timer told the referees the clock had not been functioning properly. He said that it had jumped from 2:00 left two play to 2:39 instead of 1:59. New York Coach Fuzzy Levane howled.

Officially, Boston's 116-114 victory over Syracuse Thursday night put the Celtics in the top spot with a 12-6 record for 257. The Knicks are a half length behind. But if the Cincinnati setback is thrown out, it would give New York an 11-5 record for 688.

Boston had to put on a last quarter rally to beat the Nationals, who dropped their eighth straight.

In the only other game, the St. Louis Hawks defeated the Philadelphia Warriors 107-92. The triumph increased the Hawks' Western Division lead to four and a half games over Detroit.

U. S. Hopes Decline With Buchholz Hurt

MELBOURNE (AP) — Earl Buchholz, the latest U. S. Davis Cup hope, suffered a pulled thigh muscle today. Fears immediately arose that his play might fall off and endanger any chance the U.S. might have of regaining the Davis Cup.

The mishap to the 18-year-old lad from St. Louis, whose play has been sensational so far in Australia, happened in the second set of his third round match against Alan Lane in the Victorian State Tennis Championships.

Although he was hobbling in the late stages of the match Buchholz still was good for Lane 6-1, 6-1, 6-4 as all four Americans in the tourney advanced.

Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, seemed headed for a surprise defeat when he lost the first set to Wayne Reid, but the Ohioan swept the next three sets to win 6-8, 6-3, 6-0. Peruvian Alex Olmedo of Southern California beat Doug Reid 12-10, 6-3, 6-4 while Chris Crawford, Piedmont, Calif., had to go five sets to down Brian Tobin 4-6, 6-1, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3.

The extent of the injury to Buchholz was not immediately known, but his play in the doubles later seemed affected. Reid and Crawford were beaten by Paul Hearn and Graeme Stewart 3-6, 8-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Top-seeded Ashley Cooper beat Fred Stolle 6-2, 6-3, 7-5 and now will play Crawford in the quarter-finals.

MacKay and Olmedo won their second round doubles match by beating Adrian Quast and Trevor Fancutt 3-6, 6-1, 3-8, 7-5, 6-2.
