

Nobel Winners Gather Today For Prize Awarding

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Winners of 1958 Nobel Prizes gathered today for the prize giving. The Russians sent the three winners of the physics prize but, as promised, literary winner Boris Pasternak stayed home.

Another blast was loosed at Pasternak, author of the novel "Dr. Zhivago," by Soviet writers at a Moscow meeting Sunday.

The prizes will be awarded at ceremonies Wednesday.

Pasternak's three countrymen arrived in the city in the physics prize of \$41,420. The Soviet scientists are P. A. Cherenkov, I. M. Frank and Igor Tamm.

Coming in early today from London were the British winner of the prize in chemistry, Frederick Sanger, and Dr. Joshua Lederberg, who shares the medicine and physiology prize with U.S. colleagues Dr. George Beadle and Dr. Edward L. Tatum.

Beadle arrived Sunday and Tatum was expected later today. Lederberg is from the University of Wisconsin. Tatum from the Rockefeller Institute in New York and Beadle from the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena.

Father Dominique Georges Pire, Belgian priest who won the peace prize, arrived in Oslo, Norway, to receive his prize there Wednesday. The peace prize is awarded by a five-man committee from the Norwegian Parliament. The other winners were picked by Swedish groups.

Pasternak at first accepted his literature prize, then turned it down under pressure at home. But the committee making the award said he would be listed as the 1958 winner, although the \$41,420 was put back in the Nobel fund. His diploma and gold medal are in a safe, to be given him if he ever comes to Sweden.

Farm Bureau President Wants Spending Curbed

Demo Advisory Council's Program May Not Get Much Attention From Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Democratic Advisory Council's broad legislative program appeared likely today to get only passing attention from a Congress which may be more interested in national security than social security.

In its first meeting since last month's elections bolstered Democratic majorities in both House and Senate, the policy-shaping council drafted a 24-point program of goals for the 86th Congress Sunday.

The pronouncement, the most comprehensive and far reaching ever issued by the 24-member council, called for action on a wide range of issues from expansion of Social Security to strengthening of civil rights.

It made no specific recommendations, however, on such things as outer space developments which Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas stressed last month—also in general terms—in a 12-point legislative program for the new Congress. Johnson omitted civil rights from his program.

The council's action put a fresh accent on the liberal views expressed by many of the new Democratic Senate and House members elected last month.

Despite the contention of National Chairman Paul M. Butler

that the council's program reflects the direction in which the party is moving in 1959, however, the proposals do not appear likely to command effective sponsorship in Congress.

The general opinion among politicians is that Johnson and House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas will, in practical effect, shape the final form of the legislative program that emerges from next year's session.

In the past, Johnson and Rayburn have not paid much attention to the council's recommendations. There is no reason to believe their attitude will change materially.

Idaho Groups Oppose Columbia River Proposal

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—Strong opposition to the proposed Columbia River Development Corp. is expected to be expressed by several Idaho groups at a hearing in Coeur d'Alene Wednesday.

The hearing record will emphatically prove the widespread and deep-seated resistance of Idaho citizens to the proposal or any other similar effort to take away the rights of Idaho people to control their own natural resources," L. A. Anderson, secretary of the Council said Saturday.

Scheduled to appear before the flood control and rivers and harbors subcommittee of the Senate Public Works Committee are representatives of the farm, mining and reclamation interests as well as local chambers of commerce and irrigation districts.

"Idaho people will oppose this thinly disguised Columbia Valley Authority which presents a direct threat to place ultimate control of our water rights in the hands of a five-man federal board with dictatorial authority," Anderson contended.

Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore) author of a similar proposal at the last session of Congress, is expected to conduct Wednesday's hearing.

Deaths Of Three At Truck Bunkhouse Puzzles Officials

LANCASTER, Mo. (AP)—Three truck drivers, weary from the long drive from central Arkansas to this north Missouri village, went to sleep in a truck stop bunkhouse. All three of them died there.

Why? At this stage, no one knows. Coroner Bryce Norman said the first victim apparently died of a heart attack. Autopsies on the bodies of the other two were inconclusive. Tissue samples will be tested by state police.

The chain of death began Friday, when 24-year-old Louis Lee Warden of Little Rock pulled into Lancaster with a truckload of farm tractors from Malvern, Ark. It was 1 a.m. and he had covered more than 600 miles.

Warden said he was ill and went to bed in the bunkhouse which Ed Judd maintains at his service station-restaurant on U.S. Highway 63. Late that afternoon, Warden was found dead.

He suffered from a heart ailment. His death was attributed to the disease and his body was sent back to Little Rock.

Warden's employer D. W. Hoskins of Malvern sent two drivers north with a load of lumber. They were John Parker, 26, Little Rock, and William Briner, 22, Malvern. One was to drive Warden's truck back to Malvern.

They went to bed about 1 a.m. Sunday. At 7 a.m., both men were found dead.

Coroner Norman said the 18-by-24-foot bunkhouse was heated by a stove which burns bottled gas.
