

Browns Clinch Tie, Face NY Giants In Pro Crucial

Coach Paul Brown, master manipulator of the Cleveland Browns, set out today to find the weapon capable of destroying the New York Giants' defensive bastion.

It's the Giants' defensive unit Brown has to beat Sunday in New York's Yankee Stadium if Cleveland is to add to its string of Eastern Conference titles in the National Football League.

Cleveland defeated Philadelphia 21-14 Sunday, clinching a tie for the championship, while the runner-up Giants stayed alive with a 19-17 victory at Detroit.

That leaves the Browns (9-2) with a one-game lead over New York (8-3). A tie or victory in the regular season finale Sunday gives Cleveland the title. The Giants can only hope for a playoff by winning.

If a playoff is needed it will be staged in New York Dec. 21. The Eastern winner meets the Baltimore Colts, Western Conference champions, for the NFL title the following Sunday in the Eastern city's park.

The Colts dropped a 30-28 decision at Los Angeles Saturday, although Baltimore's quarterback Johnny Unitas pitched three touchdown passes and set an NFL record. It was the 24th consecutive game in which Unitas had passed for a TD, breaking the mark set by Green Bay's Cecil Isbell in 1942 with 23.

In other games, the Chicago Bears beat the Chicago Cardinals 30-14, San Francisco ripped Green Bay 48-21 and Pittsburgh came off with a 14-14 tie against Washington.

Quarterback Milt Plum was the big man for the Browns, scoring twice and then throwing a 48-yard strike to Ray Renfro for the TD that broke a 14-14 tie in the third period.

While the Eagles were unable to mount any sort of running attack, Jimmy Brown padded his league-leading rushing yardage total with 138 yards in 21 carries for Cleveland. Lew Carpenter chipped in with 100 more for the Browns.

Van Is Threat
Norm Van Brocklin was the Eagles' only threat. He completed 15 of 27 passes for 154 yards and one touchdown.

Harland Sware blocked a last-minute field goal.

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Top Canada Gate Seen For Moore-Durelle Tiff
MONTREAL (AP)—The Archie Moore-Yvon Durelle fight Wednesday night for the world light-heavyweight championship may draw more money than Canadians ever have paid to see a boxing match.

Promoter Eddie Quinn says the advance sale has nearly reached the \$80,000 mark, already more than the record Montreal gate of \$76,000 drawn by middleweight Laurent Dauthuille and Johnny Greco in 1949.

Quinn figures the total will pass the Canadian record of \$120,000 grossed in Toronto for the Moore-James J. Parker fight two years ago.

The only thing left of the 1958 college football season today is the postseason bowls. The last six diehards wrote finis to the regular schedule Saturday.

The first of the larger bowls is on tap this Saturday when Oklahoma State and Florida State inaugurate the Blue Grass Bowl in Louisville before a national television audience.

The other 10 major bowl contestants finish a brief vacation and return to the practice field today for workouts ranging from one-day outdoor drills in full togs to limbering up conditioning inside a gymnasium.

LSU Ready
Coach Paul Dietzel, with a new five-year contract from Louisiana State, leads his national championship team back to the practice field to prepare for the Sugar Bowl with Clemson Jan. 1. All 33 members of his squad are reported in top shape.

Big Ten champ Iowa begins looking for a way to stop quarterback Joe Kapp of California in the Rose Bowl. Texas Christian Coach Abe Martin has warned his Horned Frogs that they must solve the passing of Richie Mayo if they want to beat Air Force in the Cotton Bowl.

Syracuse will work in his gym until it leaves for North Carolina State this weekend to continue drills for the Orange Bowl game against Oklahoma. Excessive snow on the upstate New York campus has brought unrealistic playing conditions.

Gator Foes Set
Gator Bowl foes Mississippi and Florida met for the first time, 27-21 battle at Jacksonville, the only one of the major bowl affairs before New Year's Day.

The University of Hawaii, which opened the regular season on Sept. 13 with a 51-0 loss to Kentucky, finished the campaign on a similar note, losing 47-20 to Utah Saturday.

Boston College Belled Holy Cross 26-8 while Miami won only its second in 10 starts with 2-0 upset of Oregon.

Arizona State (Flagstaff) defeated Gustavus Adolphus 41-12 and will meet Northeast Oklahoma in the Holiday Bowl Dec. 20 in St. Petersburg. The Okies qualified for the NAIA attraction by defeating St. Benedict's of Kansas 19-14.

At Natchitoches, La., Northwest Louisiana State won the Christmas Festival Bowl with an 18-11 victory over Sam Houston State.

Yost, Long-Time Nat, Goes To Detroit In 6-Player Deal

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Washington Senators Saturday traded veteran third baseman Eddie Yost, shortstop Rocky Bridges and outfielder Ned Christley to the Detroit Tigers for infielders Ren Bertoia and Ron Samford and centerfielder Jim Delsing.

Calvin Griffith, president of the Senators, announced the deal after long conferences with the Tigers that began during the major league baseball meeting here this week.

Yost has spent his entire baseball career with the Senators.

The 32-year-old third baseman came to Washington in 1944 and has remained with the Senators ever since, except for two years in the Navy.

Previously mentioned as trade material in the last few years as the grow older, Yost stayed on and was captain of the club as well as chief player representative of the American League in dealing with club owners.

Bertoia, who will replace Yost in the Washington infield, is nine years younger.

Neither player hit well last season. Yost averaged .224 and Bertoia .233.

Beavers Round Out Road Trip At Idaho State

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)—Idaho State College meets the Oregon State College basketball team here tonight.

It will be the last chance for the Beavers to show a scoring skill in their three-game trip to this region. Over the weekend they fell twice to the University of Utah, 70-41 and 62-38.

In Saturday night's game against Utah, Lee Harmon led the invaders with 10 points.

Assistant football coaches Sonny Grandelius and Carl Nystrom of Michigan State formerly starred in football for the Spartans.

Bridges, 31-year-old spark plug of the Senators' infield, batted .263 in 1958. Shortstop Samford, 28, led his team in hitting with .301 as Charleston won the American Association pennant.

Delsing was Charleston's second best hitter with a .287 average. The 33-year-old centerfielder, exchanged for the 26-year-old Christley, advanced to the majors with the Chicago White Sox in 1948. He shifted to the New York Yankees, the old St. Louis Browns, the Tigers and back to the White Sox before going to Indianapolis in the American Assn. in 1957.

Delsing, who bats left and throws right, rejoined the Tiger organization at Charleston last season. Christley batted .215 in 105 games with the Senators. He has been Washington property since 1955. The 6-foot-2 outfielder spent most of 1957 with Indianapolis, where he finished second in batting in the American Assn.

Bridges, whose tobacco chew is almost as well known as that of Nellie Fox of Chicago, has been in organized baseball since 1947. He came up to the majors from Montreal to Brooklyn in 1951 and went to Cincinnati in 1953.

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Richardson, Top U. S. Copper, Off For Australia Drills

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—Ham Richardson, regarded as the mainstay of the U. S. Davis Cup team although he never has won a match in the Challenge Round, left his teammates behind today and headed for Perth to get ready for the interzone final against Italy.

Richardson, as was to be expected, was the first named when Captain Perry Jones listed the four-man team to face the Italians at Perth Dec. 19-21. This is Richardson's fourth cup trip to Australia, and although he has played only in the interzone matches here, he is by far the most experienced by the Americans.

Others Tabbed
The others named were big Barry MacKay, Dayton, Ohio; Peruvian Alex Olmedo, Los Angeles; and youthful Earl Buchholz, St. Louis. Chris Crawford, 19, Piedmont, Calif., is the other member of the U. S. squad.

Jones immediately dispatched Richardson to Perth, in dry, hot western Australia, to get adjusted to the conditions there. He was accompanied by Dinny Pails, the Australian pro who has been a longtime coach of the American squad.

"I thought it best to get him out to Perth to see how he reacts to the climate," Jones explained. "The rest of the boys will remain here until the last of our team is eliminated from the Victorian Championships."

Buchholz Impressive
Buchholz performed sensationally at Sydney and Mackay and Olmedo are in the singles quarter-finals here. MacKay meets Spain's sensational Andres Gimeno Tuesday and Olmedo meets Australia's Mal Anderson, former U. S. champion.

Jones emphasized that his choice of players for the singles and doubles matches against Italy will be decided by head-to-head competition when the entire squad reaches western Australia.

It seems quite certain, however, that Jones will rely on the two most experienced players, Richardson and MacKay, for singles against the Italian team, which crushed the Philippines at Sydney this weekend. Olmedo and Richardson are a likely doubles combination.

Huskies Win Northern Division Swimming Meet

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Washington mermen captured six of 10 events to win the second annual Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division swimming meet here.

The Huskies piled up 76 points to nose out defending champion Oregon State, which took four firsts and finished with 66 points. Idaho was third with 26 and Washington State last with 20. Oregon did not enter.

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
