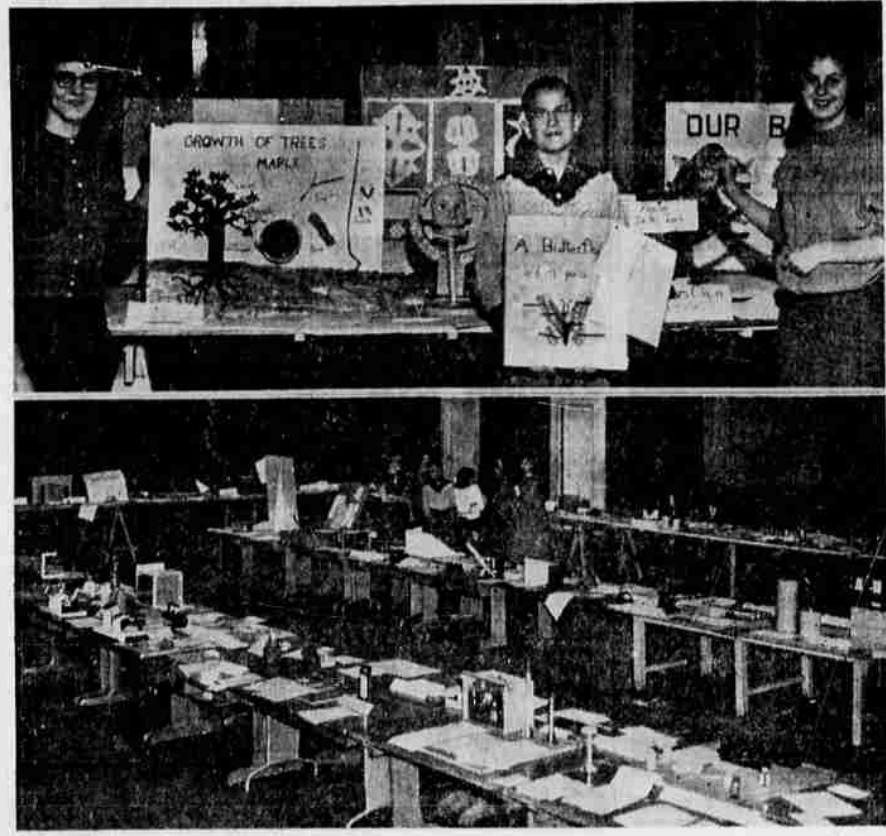


Foster Homes Program Dated

Rural Firemen Finish Tests Of New Pumper

The final test of the new 750-gallon pumper now in use by the Roseburg Rural Fire Department was made Tuesday, according to Cliff Thrasher, assistant chief. The pumper carries 1,000 gallons of water.

A run was made to the Consolidated Milling Corp., Highway 99 South, and all equipment was tested and performed satisfactorily, Thrasher said.

Originally driven from the home factory at Louisville, Ky., to Oregon by Thrasher, the engine developed valve trouble. This necessitated overhaul at company expense at Cornelius. The approximate cost of the machine is \$16,000.

Conventional Subs Travel Under Ice

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — The Navy reported Tuesday the return of the U.S.S. Trout and U.S.S. Harder from "one of the longest trips under the ice of any non-nuclear submarines."

The Navy said the Trout and Harder penetrated to a distance of 75 miles under the ice pack in northern waters and logged a total of 280 miles of under ice travel. The operation, under the tactical command of Cmdr. R. D. McWethy, commander Submarine Division 101, included vertical diving and surfacing.

Two nuclear-powered submarines, the Nautilus and the Skate have crossed the North Pole from the Pacific to the Atlantic submerged beneath the polar ice pack.

Yoncalla Pair Will Explain Juvenile Plan

The part a foster home plays in curbing juvenile delinquency will be spotlighted Tuesday night at the first general membership meeting of the Douglas County Juvenile Advisory Council.

The meeting is scheduled at 8 p.m. in the Roseburg Presbyterian Church social room. The principals on the program will be Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Wise of Yoncalla and one of their foster children, Harl Clark, now in the U. S. Army at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

The Wise home is considered one of the outstanding foster homes in the county and the only one available for youngsters who have become delinquent.

The program will be introduced by Mrs. Arthur Lamka of Roseburg, chairman of the advisory council. She will report on the activities which have been carried on by the council's executive committee since the last general meeting and the projects which have been planned for the council.

Her report will be followed by an explanation of the need for foster homes in the county. It will be given by Circuit Judge Charles Woodrich of the juvenile court.

The limelight will then be shifted to Clark and the Wises. They will form a panel moderated by Julian Hellock, county juvenile officer. Questions will be directed at the panel by members of the audience and by Hellock himself.

The presentation will then be summarized by Gale Wegener, chief social worker at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

Theme Fits Project

This is the first of four general council meetings to be held during the year. The theme was selected to fit the council's primary project of recruiting foster homes.

Kenneth Knechtel of Wilbur, chairman of the program committee, said the church site for the March 24 meeting was selected in order to give it a more informal atmosphere than that to be found in the courthouse where juvenile cases are handled. A request for a church site was made to the Roseburg Ministerial Assn. and the Presbyterian Church was offered.

The general meeting will be preceded by a 7:30 executive committee meeting at the same place.

Directing the school for the people who will have contact with centennial visitors will be Mike Haggerty of Portland, assistant state coordinator for the Centennial Commission. The meeting is scheduled to start at 8 p.m. at the Douglas County Community Building at the Fairgrounds at Roseburg.

County Centennial Chairman Iris Hellewell said the meeting is for anyone in the county, with special emphasis on sales personnel and motel, hotel and service station operators and employees.

This meeting will be preceded in the afternoon by a similar school for city, county and state police officers in the county. It, too, will be designed to stress courtesy and cooperation with centennial visitors.

Roseburg Chief of Police Vernon Murdoch Jr. will be host for the event.

Satellite Out Of Its Orbit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department announced Tuesday that Discoverer I, the first satellite to achieve a circle around the earth's poles, is no longer in orbit.

Roy W. Johnson, director of the Advanced Research Projects Agency, said it must be assumed that the satellite launched from the Pacific missile range in California is no longer swinging around the earth.

Johnson based this assumption on the failure of tracking stations to pick up radio signals.

Five days after its launching, Discoverer was confirmed to have achieved an orbit, traveling southward from California over Antarctica, thence over the Indian Ocean and central Russia and across the north polar region.

Reds Lose French City, Start Riots

LE HAVRE, France (AP) — Communist rioters fought with police Tuesday night after losing control of the city administration in this big Atlantic port where they have governed for six years.

Non-Communist councilmen banded to elect Socialist Robert Monguillon mayor by a one-vote margin—giving him 19 votes to 18 for Communist incumbent Rene Cance.

The Communists, sensing defeat, first sought to block the election by sending 250 fanatics storming into the City Hall chamber where the voting was taking place.

Police threw the hecklers out and the fighting spread to the street with 1,000 demonstrators milling about. Four policemen were hurt. Windows were broken in several stores.

Ky. Coal Operator Asks Armed Aid, Refused

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A Pike County coal operator asked Gov. A. B. Chandler today to send National Guardsmen into the area to preserve order. The governor refused, claiming the situation in the struck coalfields is under control.

The operator, Robert Holcomb, sent the telegram claiming roving mobs of "United Mine Workers thugs" have taken over Pike County.

Holcomb said a crowd of 200-300 pickets shut down three ramps today; and at 7:30 a.m. took over trapping two men at the top of the tippie. He said city police had to be called to rescue the men, who were unharmed.

Legislators Go To Oregon City

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Legislature was to go to Oregon City this afternoon to reenact scenes from territorial legislatures.

An hour-long program was scheduled in Thora Gardner Junior High School. The lawmakers then were scheduled for tours of paper mills and historical sites. They will be guests at a dinner in the evening.

New Line Being Built By Co-op

E. pected to be in operation about June 1, is a high voltage line being installed between Lookingglass and Melrose by Douglas Electric Co-operative Inc. The line is being installed to improve service conditions now and to allow for future growth.

Robert Matthews, technical engineer for the company, said that over the past ten years, population growth in the Melrose area has increased to a point where additional facilities are needed. Lines in the area are approaching full capacity.

The new line will serve the Melrose, Cleveland Hill and Umpqua areas. The improvements being made at the present time have been in the planning stage for the past two years but because the situation is not a pressing thing there has not been a timetable established to complete the work, Matthews said.

Ground is expected to be broken in about two weeks for construction of the substation at Melrose. The co-operative will construct the open type substation which will be enclosed with a wire fence. The substation will be located about a mile west of Melrose.

New poles for the line were set last fall and during the past two weeks the company has been stringing wire. Mrs. Hazel S. Marsh, News-Review correspondent, reports.

Ashland To Ballot On School Building

ASHLAND (AP) — Ashland will vote April 22 on a proposed \$1,275,000 bond issue for a junior high school.

If the bond issue is approved, the money will be used to buy a new school site, build a new building and buy some new equipment, although usable equipment from the old building will be kept.

The Ashland board set the election date at a meeting Monday night. The board has been considering a new junior high school for some time. On Dec. 16, 1957, voters defeated a bond issue to build one.

The need for the new junior high was intensified recently when the state fire marshal closed a portion of the present building.

The proposed new building would handle 800 seventh, eighth and ninth graders. It would, if approved, be ready in September, 1960.

Mother Misses 10th Little Indian

THE DALLES (AP) — Mrs. Velma Underwood of Celilo set out for Portland with her children in a station wagon.

At Gresham, near Portland, she counted no more than 10. But there were supposed to be 19.

A hurried trip back to a service station at The Dalles turned up the missing 4-year-old daughter, Ann, who had been in the station rest room when Mrs. Underwood drove off after refueling.

New Trial Asked By Lane Lawyer

EUGENE (AP) — William Huey, who won a slander suit against former Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn, has asked that the verdict be set aside.

In a motion filed here, Huey, a Eugene attorney, also asked that he be granted a new trial. In the trial earlier this month, Circuit Judge P. K. Hammond directed the jury to return a verdict for Huey.

Huey contended in the motion filed here that the judge ordered the jury to return a judgment to him "in such an amount that will adequately compensate."

Huey said that the jury did not follow the judge's instructions in awarding him only \$1.

In his original suit, Huey said he was slandered in a speech made about the administration of justice in Lane County.

NEW YORK (AP) — Vice probers arrested a young woman today for allegedly allowing prostitutes "to entertain male adults while children were present."

Five boys and five girls, between the ages of 10 and 15, were picked up in the investigation and taken to Children's Court on juvenile delinquency charges.

The woman, Elenore Diblin, 20, a slim brunette, was charged with impairing the morals of a minor and with assisting in the operation

3 Satellites Set In 1 Shot

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is planning something new in satellites—a three-in-one job. It will be part of the Vanguard series and will include a balloon to study friction in space.

Dr. John P. Hagen announced plans for it Tuesday and said it will be launched soon from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

In effect, Hagen said, the new Vanguard will provide three separate satellites:

1. The empty case of the launching vehicle's third-stage rocket, a metal tube weighing about 52 pounds.

2. A 13-inch plastic sphere with an arm extending about two feet. There will be a magnetometer at the end of the arm to measure the earth's magnetic fields. This satellite will weigh about 22 pounds.

3. A 30-inch expandable balloon weighing 1½ to 2 pounds. Before launching, the balloon will be folded into a small tray at the base of the plastic sphere. When the nose of the launching vehicle separates from the final stage rocket, a gas cartridge will inflate the balloon—if all goes as planned.

The balloon, because of its larger area and lighter weight, will slow down more rapidly than the two companion satellites and thus provide a more precise measurement of drag and friction in space.

Senator Decries Attack On Hatfield

SALEM (AP) — Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton) said Tuesday on the floor of the Senate that the repeated attacks against Gov. Mark Hatfield's appointments are undignified.

Francis' remarks came after Sen. William Grenfell (D-Portland) said acting Adjutant General Robert Irving has failed to pass his physical examination. He said Irving is holding the office illegally.

Francis said the attacks are based on "fiction and fancy."

Sen. Melvin Goode (R-Albany) told the Senate that the Democrats have resorted to name-calling. Sen. Anthony Yarrri of Ontario, Senate Republican leader, said the charges against Hatfield have not been in good taste.

William Ernest Voorhies, 730 SE Flint St., Roseburg, was cited for failure to signal and Garland Elzer Rainville, Rt. 3 Box 1641, Roseburg, for violation of the basic rule.

The accident happened when Voorhies, west bound, made a left turn and collided with the Rainville vehicle which was east bound, police said. Voorhies told police his vision was obscured by a car in front of him.

The five boys taken to court were from 11 to 14 years old and the five girls from 10 to 15.

Mrs. Diblin gave her address as 52 W. 70th St. Police said she helped operate an apartment at 400 W. 58th St., where her husband was seized last month.

They accused him of heading, a ring of \$100 call girls.

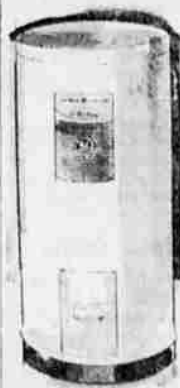
