Fly Nuisance Elimination Advice Given

Dr. R. R. Shoemaker, Douglas County health officer, today advised Douglas County residents of ways to limit mosquito and fly nuisances around the home.

His office also issued a warning to prospective picnickers who may suffer food poisoning through the improper handling of food as the warm weather approaches.

The health officer said a mere cupful of water and a week of warm weather will breed a crop of two or three hundred "hungry mosquitoes," and not much more is required for flies.

"Sometimes our cave troughs, an old tin can, a bird bath or a compost pile will keep us pretty well supplied with insects all summer long," Dr. Shoemaker said.

Hoover's Pension Donated To Charity

WASHINGTON (AP)—Herbert Hoover has drawn more government funds for office allowances as a former president than has Harry S. Truman, but has donated his personal pension to charity.

The law providing allowances and pensions for former presidents became effective last Aug. 25.

General Services Administrator Franklin G. Eloets and other GSA witnesses told the subcommittee: Through Jan. 31, each of the former presidents had drawn the proportionate share of his \$25,000 annual personal allowance.

Hoover had drawn \$17,910 for office staff, \$6,550 for office space and \$3,812 for office equipment. Truman had drawn \$16,825 for office staff and \$432 for office equipment.

Powers Recess A-Ban Parley

GENEVA (AP)—The three-power conference has adopted three draft treaty articles, including one providing for permanent suspension of nuclear weapons tests, and has recessed until April 13.

American, British and Soviet delegates also approved articles calling for periodic review of the operations of a test ban and for registering the treaty with the United Nations.

The actions today represented the first substantial move forward in the conference since before Christmas, when four draft treaty articles were adopted.

The articles approved today were not too controversial.

The basic difference between East and West still remains. This revolves around the refusal of the Soviets to accept an international inspection and control system to guarantee against violation of a test ban.

The department said Uncle Sam's gold hoard was lowered for the year by \$2,294,200,000—a record reduction.
