

Extension Courses At RHS Scheduled To Begin Tonight

The spring term college credit program for adults will get an early start tonight with offerings of a physical education class, the General Extension Division of the state system of higher education announced today.

Slated for its first class session at 7 tonight at Roseburg High School is Physical Education in the Elementary School, taught by Dr. Willard E. Burke, supervisor of elementary school P. E. for Eugene Public Schools. Three hours credit is offered for the course.

Other courses will begin next week. Fees, as established by the state, are \$9 per credit hour. Students may take courses on an audit basis, but the same fee will prevail.

Registrations may be completed at the first or second class meeting, said the announcement.

The only other course slated for Douglas County, outside of those set for Roseburg, will begin March 30 at Canyonville High School. That course will be Curriculum Foundations, a three-hour credit course instructed by Dr. John D. O'Donnell, assistant professor of education for the General Extension Division.

All classes will begin at 7 p.m. and will cover two or three-hour class periods. Most classes will run for a 10-week term noted Kennedy.

Tuesday classes are Business Machines, Trailoring and Beginning Sewing course will start Wednesday night, as will one in Bishop Dreammaking. Conversational Spanish will begin Thursday.

Carriers Aid Spread Of TB

PORTLAND (AP) — A state Board of Health official said Saturday Oregon had 572 tuberculosis cases last year.

Dr. Ambrose S. Churchill said more cases can be expected to come from some of perhaps 300,000 residents who carry TB germs.

Dr. Churchill, the board's director of tuberculosis control, said the disease could be controlled almost immediately if every resident would take a tuberculin skin test within the next few months. But he added this would be impractical because it would cost about \$800,000 and would require 100 per cent participation.

Dr. Churchill explained that the large number of carriers resulted from exposure to active TB cases. He said about two more cases per thousand will develop from this each year.

The official added that as Oregon's older population dies off, the pool of latent cases will drop, if new cases are discovered in time to halt spread.

Oregon's 572 cases in 1958 compared with 578 the previous year. But more of the 1958 cases were in advanced stages of the illness and there was an increase in those of the active pulmonary type.

Preliminary information indicated 53 deaths from tuberculosis last year. There were 62 in 1957.

In an article in the Soviet magazine Nature quoted by Radio Moscow, Kozirev said he believes the moon got its craters from such eruptions.

Kozirev's previous report of the Alphonus eruption has been received with reserve by most Western scientists.

The broken hip occurred eight years ago — when she was "just a youngster" of 95.

Fireman Penalized For Phony Answer

CHARLOTTE, Mich. (AP) — "Where do you think you're going to a fire?" asked the policeman who stopped Phillip Snyder.

"Yes," replied the 35-year-old Charlotte volunteer fireman. "I'm on my way to a house fire."

However, the right answer to the classic question didn't do any good. Snyder was fined \$24.30 in Municipal Court Friday and also was suspended from the Fire Department.

Police Chief Bart Howe said Snyder had skidded 44 feet through a red light and almost hit a car before he was stopped.

"Snyder's violation was way out of line," Howe added.

News Barrier Blamed For Space Race Lag

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Dr. Fritz Zwicky, noted astrophysicist and jet propulsion expert, says the United States is trailing in the space race because scientific news is suppressed.

The California Institute of Technology scientist charged the government with "police state tactics" in its handling of scientific information.

Congress To Act This Week On Western Water Measures

WASHINGTON (AP) — Committee action is expected this week on important water bills before Congress.

The Senate Interior Committee is expected to approve Tuesday a bill calling for a two-year study of potential water demands and supplies. A subcommittee approved the measure after a brief hearing last week.

A Senate Interior subcommittee is scheduled to act this week on bills to authorize four water projects estimated to cost a total of \$81 million dollars.

The subcommittee held hearings last week on the projects: San Luis Irrigation, Calif., 290 million dollars; Navajo and San Juan-Chama Irrigation, N. M., 241 million; Burns Creek power dam, Idaho, 45 million; and Spokane, valley irrigation, 3 million.

All four bills got prompt approval by the full committee and the Senate in the last session of Congress.

Sponsors expect the same kind of treatment this year, and they are hopeful the House will follow Bill Strongly Supported.

The water study bill has powerful support in the Senate. Its cosponsors are Sen. James E. Murray (D-Mont), Interior committee

chairman, and Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont), assistant majority leader in the Senate.

They claim support has been promised by 23 other senators, including Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.).

Many of these same western senators are backing water rights legislation introduced recently.

Sixteen are cosponsoring a bill offered by Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.). The bill provides that existing water rights would not be affected by federal withdrawals or reservations of public lands.

The cosponsors include E. L. Bartlett (D-Alaska). None are from Washington or Oregon.

Four senators are cosponsoring a bill introduced last week by Frank E. Moss (D-Utah), who said it would "do the complete job of protecting state and individual water rights from federal preemption."

The cosponsors are Sens. Moss, Case, Wallace, F. Bennett (R-ID), Karl E. Mundt (R-SD).

The Moss bill spells out the authority of the states in the control, appropriation and use of water within their boundaries, including water on federal land.

It specifically prohibits federal officials from interfering with water rights acquired under state laws and recognized by state court decisions.

"The federal-state controversy over water rights arises chiefly when lands are withdrawn by the government for federal projects," Moss said in introducing his bill.

It has been greatly accelerated in the past few years, as more federal projects have been built in the west, and as court decisions have failed to recognize in full the traditional western doctrine of state authority and vested use water rights."

Skyscraper To Rise On Paris Left Bank

PARIS (AP) — The famed Paris Left Bank, which has always been considered an attic a decent height for anyone, is to be invaded by a 52-story skyscraper.

Tradition-minded officials fought it, but finally bowed to pressure and persuasion.

The skyscraper—tallest in Europe—planned as the centerpiece for an ultramodern development project that will root out many of the rickety but picturesque studios.

The main building will rise 600 feet, towering over the Paris skyline now limited to about 10 stories. But it still will play second fiddle to the Eiffel Tower's 985 feet.

A concession to the Left Bank will be 25 acres of new studios for painters, sculptors, artists and writers.

Oregon Centennial Offered River Boat

PORTLAND (AP) — A group of Portland area residents has purchased a sternwheeler that was used for Sacramento River cruises.

The group offered it to the Oregon Centennial as a possible river trips this summer.

Don Dority, Oswego, said the commission told it no money was available for such a project.

The sternwheeler is a 106-footer once known on the Sacramento as the Mission Belle.

Dority said that if some financial arrangement can be made, the boat can be used for voyages on the Columbia River to Astoria, Longview and The Dalles and on the Willamette as far south as Salem.

He said the sternwheeler has a second floor, restaurant facilities and a bar, and is licensed for 224 passengers. It still is in California.

Appraisers To Study Businesses, Ranches

CORVALLIS (AP) — The annual appraisal short course for county assessors, their deputies and real estate appraisers, opening here today and running through Friday, will emphasize problems of livestock ranches and city business districts.

There will be practice appraisals on both types of property in the course of the schooling which is sponsored jointly by the state Tax Commission and Oregon State College.

Martin D. Miller of Chicago, Illinois, former assessor of Cook County, Ill., is one of the course leaders.

Pope Reviving Custom Of Washing Poor's Feet

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII is reviving an ancient papal custom Thursday by washing the feet of 12 poor men. This is in emulation of Jesus Christ, who washed the feet of His disciples at the Last Supper.

The custom was one followed by popes in ancient times, when beggars were brought in from the streets of Rome for the ceremony.

The last Pope to perform the act of humility was Pius IX, who died in 1878.

FBI Holds 11 Persons In Puzzle Swindles Involving Newspapers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI today announced the arrests of 11 persons in what it described as a nationwide swindle involving newspaper puzzle contests.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the swindle operations crossed the U.S.-Canadian border. FBI agents today picked up four persons in Oregon, three in Michigan, two in Pennsylvania, and one each in Indiana and Wisconsin.

They were charged with conspiracy to violate the federal mail fraud and wire statutes.

Similar charges have been filed against two other persons in Canada and a resident of Minnesota.

Two Portland Ore., newspapers — The Oregonian and The Journal — announced several weeks ago they had heard reports of a "fix" on newspaper puzzle contests.

They dropped such contests from their papers and asked the FBI to investigate. The FBI in Portland joined in the request.

Hoover's announcement said the investigation showed that answers to puzzle contests conducted by two New York feature syndicates, obtained in advance by a devious and were used in winning more than \$45,000 between November 1958 and February of this year.

The FBI said the ringleaders in the operation established a base in Canada and subscribed to the puzzle feature services, using the name and address of a non-existent newspaper company which they called "Suburban Publishers, Ltd., 220 Epworth, London, Ontario, Canada."

The FBI said the feature services do not furnish contest answers to a subscribing newspaper, but to a bank to be held in confidence until the deadline has passed for submission of solutions.

Hoover said "Suburban Publishers" supplied the syndicates with the name of a fictitious bank, the "Middlesex Trust Co." with the mailing address P.O. Box 689, Byron, Ontario, Canada.

The puzzle answers sent to this box were picked up by the ringleaders in Canada. Others living in the United States entered the contests with the benefit of solutions supplied by telephone from either Detroit or Canada. The individual winners, the FBI said, were allowed to keep a small share of the prize money, while the bulk of the cash was delivered to the ring's Canadian headquarters.

The offenses charged carry penalties of up to five years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

Harry Balk, 33, Detroit, described as a former Detroit theater manager who won a \$4,400 contest in the Chicago American last December.

Walter Rex Johnston III, 30, and his wife, Ann, of Detroit, Johnson is an auto salesman.

Myer Bloom, 27, of Harrisburg, Pa., who manages a clothing company in Lebanon, Pa., and who won \$250 on a Harrisburg Patriot contest in January of this year.

Lawrence A. Dyson, 32, of Philadelphia, Pa., won a Philadelphia Bulletin contest worth \$6,000 in November 1958. The FBI said his brother, Joseph Dyson, is one of the two persons in Canada named as members of the conspiracy.

Ralph Bass, Chicago, a record company employee who won \$1,100 on a Chicago American contest in January of this year.

James Francis Theodore, a Milwaukee dance studio operator, who collected \$2,710 on a Milwaukee Sentinel contest in November 1958.

Willie Ronald Taylor, Portland, Ore., employed in servicing juke boxes. His alleged involvement was not detailed.

Fitzgerald (Eager) Beaver, Portland, Ore., a radio disc jockey and co-owner of a Portland record shop, who won a Portland Oregonian contest worth \$1,700 last December.

Royce E. Hubert, 41, of Sherwood, Ore., who is in the mortgage financing business in Portland.

Birches Bird, 34, of Portland, a nurse club owner.

The FBI said the Minnesota state still being sought is Theron Luther Darling, 35, of Medicine Lake, Minn. He operates a dance studio in Minneapolis. Darling won \$1,825 on a St. Paul Sunday Pioneer Press contest in November last year.

The two men in Canada charged with conspiracy were named as Dyson, 30, of Ontario, and George G. Dingman Jr., 34, of Port Stanley, Ont.

The University of Oregon singers will present a concert at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Roseburg Senior High School auditorium.

The singers, a group of 50 selected voices from the University's School of Music, is sponsored by the Oregon Centennial Commission and is under the direction of Max Risinger, assistant professor of music at the University.

Robert Robins, Roseburg High School choral music director, reports the concert is being presented as part of a program designed to familiarize Oregon communities with the musical growth of Oregon.

Music to be presented will include selections appropriate to Holy Week, folk songs, spirituals and other well known tunes.

The group was recently honored by the Mutual Radio Network, having been selected as one of seven college musical groups in the nation for a special Christmas program on the network. One Roseburg man, Ed Winter, is a member of the singers.

The program will be free of charge.

Mother Kills Self; Son Dead Of Natural Causes

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A young mother who said in a note she was "so terribly mixed up" and unable to raise her son, took her own life Sunday as the child died of natural causes.

Bonnie Sevens, 25, a divorcee, was found in her auto parked in a garage below the living quarters of her home, Paul Danko, a medical examiner's office investigator, said she died of carbon monoxide poisoning and ruled her death a suicide.

Her son, Mark, 3, was found dead upstairs.

Police said a note left by Mrs. Sevens said she was sorry because she was not able to bring Mark up properly and "now he will have the right kind of life."

Danko said an autopsy showed the child died of unknown but apparently natural causes.

Japanese Coal Strike Knocks Out Production

TOKYO (AP) — A wage strike today knocked out 70 per cent of Japan's coal production. But stockpiles are nearly 70 per cent above normal.

In the country's 14 major collieries 165,000 miners walked out. The daily production loss was estimated at \$3,000 tons.

A spokesman for the Coal Miners Assn. estimated the stock at the mines at 4,200,000 tons, compared with a normal 2½ million tons.

The miners' pay now averages \$66.66 a month. They want a raise of \$5.55. The owners refused the raise and said they must cut production 20 per cent because of a drop in demand.

First returns indicated the Legislative Assembly will be in the hands of the Progressive Senegalese Union (UPS), headed by Leopold Senghor, a pro-French former French Cabinet minister.
