

Flower Show School Slated

The Umpqua District of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs has completed plans for a flower show school, reports press chairman Mrs. R. R. League of Roseburg.

The course will be given at the Roseburg Woman's Club building. Registration will start at 9 a. m. March 31. Anyone may take the course.

The examinations will be given at the Douglas County Fairgrounds Community Building, starting at 9:30 a. m. Persons taking the examinations must have attended all lectures and been a member of a federated garden club within the last six months.

Students have been requested to bring flowers and containers for the instructors' demonstrations. Further information may be secured by contacting Mrs. E. H. Card, general chairman.

A \$5.50 fee will be charged for the eight-hour course. Separate morning or afternoon sessions will be \$1.50 each.

The school will involve five courses spaced at about six-month intervals. Course 1 is scheduled at the Roseburg Woman's Club March 31 and April 1. Optional examinations will be given April 2. Tentative dates for the second course are Sept. 29-30 and Oct. 1.

For the first course, three experts have been called to direct different phases. Mrs. M. M. Roming of Coos Bay will instruct in flower show practice. Mrs. W. G. Stelmacher of Tangent will deal with horticulture. And Mrs. C. F. Gregg of Eugene will lecture on and demonstrate flower arrangements.

Weehawken Ferry Joins Bay Area Cousins In Drydock As Bygone Tradition By Boards

WEHAWKEN, N.J. (AP)—The New York Central Railroad erased a tradition from the New York metropolitan area Monday. That was the last day of the Weehawken Ferry, which was started in 1829 by a company using paddle-wheel boats and taken over by the Central in 1885.

The move has been prompted by economics, Central officials say.

Carries 45,000 Commuters

In the 1920s, ferries carried 45,000 commuters daily to two Manhattan terminals—Cortland Street, downtown; and 42nd Street, midtown.

The Central feels that the Holland Tunnel did much to woo away commuter business from the ferry.

The tunnel opened in 1927 and was followed by openings of the George Washington Bridge and Lincoln Tunnel. Buses and private cars whisked employees to their Manhattan offices.

The Central says that its losses in maintaining the ferries had amounted to \$1,200,000 annually.

At any rate, the ferries sign their swan song today. Wednesday they will be in that special place reserved for such institutions as New York's Third Avenue "El" and the Baltimore and Ohio's "Plush" Washington-to-New York train known as the Royal Blue.

Insect Dye In Comeback

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A dye made from cactus-fed insects is making a comeback after a century and a half.

It is cochineal, a crimson or carmine dye made from the bodies of females of an insect called coccus cacti.

Aztec Indians made it in Mexico long before the Spaniards arrived in 1519. For a long time Mexico was the world's major supplier of the dye—millions of dollars worth of it.

Then the aniline dyes knocked cochineal out of the textile industry. But lately requests have come from several countries, mainly Great Britain. It is wanted for foodstuffs as a colorant, and for a new textile which, for technical reasons, can not use anilines.

Dr. Rubin de la Borbolla, of the Museo de Artes Populares, has located Indians who inherited the technique of production. A new station has been set up in Oaxaca.

Portland Radio Station Withdraws TV Request

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland radio station KPOJ has withdrawn its application for Portland television channel 2.

General Manager Dick Brown said KPOJ has accepted the Federal Communications Commission to dismiss its application.

That leaves two other applicants, the Tribune Publishing Co. of Tacoma and Fisher Broadcasting Co., owner of station KOMO-TV in Seattle.

The FCC is expected to start taking testimony on the applications for the channel April 27 in Washington, D.C.

KPOJ also reported that it was severing its affiliation with the Mutual Broadcasting Co.

Actress Rejects Filmland For Quiet Hills Of Vermont

RENNINGTON, Vt. (AP)—Actress Diane Varsi apparently found today the solitude she wanted in her "escape" from the glamor of Hollywood.

A small knot of newsmen and photographers was the only reception committee when the 21-year-old actress arrived Monday with her 2½-year-old son, Shawn.

No one was there to show her to her modest four-room apartment, first floor rear of a three-story wood and stucco building.

Stoical Vermonters went about their own business.

After a 15-minute wait outside the house in chilly temperature, Mary Marshall, the landlady, arrived with the key and showed Miss Varsi to the sparsely furnished apartment.

Reporters carried in two canvas suitcases and a wicker basket, the only luggage the blonde actress brought with her. Shawn carried a tiny toy dog.

She said she decided to settle in this town of 15,000 population in Vermont's rolling hills because she knew some girls who attended Bennington College.

The startlet quit Hollywood last week because she thought it was destroying her. She flew to Chicago and then, Monday, to Albany, N.Y.

Miss Varsi had planned to take a bus for the 40-mile trip from Albany to Bennington, but an American Airlines representative volunteered to drive her in his car.

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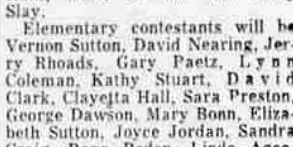
