

Nehru Forecasts Tibetan Victory

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru today predicted "ultimate victory" for Tibetans fighting Chinese Communists rule but urged them to be patient.

Nehru gave his soothing counsel to a delegation of refugees as Red China offered leniency to Tibetan rebels who surrender. Peiping warned that "those who stubbornly resist will be punished."

Unconfirmed reports reaching New Delhi and the border point of Kalimpong said the Red Chinese were using planes and possibly paratroopers in an effort to crush resistance by the warlike Khampa tribesmen, who have spearheaded the revolt.

The Khampa tribesmen are reported to dominate large sectors of the Kham and Amdo regions in the southeast and northeast.

The reports said the Dalai Lama, deposed by the Red Chinese as the spiritual and temporal ruler, was believed to have escaped safely to the Kham region with his aged mother, two sisters and four cabinet ministers.

Besides advising Tibetans to surrender, the Peiping People's Daily warned against foreign intervention, declaring the revolt was an internal matter.

Two groups of petitioners called on Nehru — Indian nationals of Tibetan origin and Tibetan nationalists who reside in India. Each group of about 100 presented the same requests:

1. India's active support of their demands for the safety of the Dalai Lama.

2. Dispatch of an Indian mercy mission of doctors and nurses to Lhasa to help those wounded in last week's fighting.

The clinic, Mrs. Morgan pointed out, functioned as an agency through which help could be given to emotionally disturbed children before their conditions developed into a serious and more difficult to treat mental illness.

The board also decided to have on hand at the coming PTA meeting, a petition form to be signed by parents and teachers, asking not only for reinstatement of the child guidance clinic but for the hiring of a full-time health officer for the county as well.

It was mentioned that some of the county's health services, such as the well-child clinics, have had to be discontinued since the county court put the health office on part-time operation.

Swift Accused Of Price-Cutting

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department has charged Swift & Co. of Chicago with violations of the Packers and Stockyards Act in meat sales in the Far West in 1956.

The act under which the charge was made is designed to help maintain fair practices in livestock and livestock products markets.

The complaint said the firm had furnished customers with beef through its sales units in Oregon, Washington, Nevada and California at less than cost to help increase business at the expense of competitors.

Swift & Co. later issued a statement saying it was certain there was no basis for the complaint. It said it had not reduced prices to eliminate competition.

Mentioned in the complaint were operations through the Gem State Packing Co. of Boise, Idaho, described as a division of Swift, and sales units at Klamath Falls, Ore., and Seattle, Wash.

A hearing before a referee was set for May 25 at Boise.

The firm will have the right to appear and show why an order should not be issued requiring it to stop such sales practices.

Alvin And Friends Coin Record Cash

LOS ANGELES (AP) — David Seville, a fellow who has done pretty well in the chipmunk and witch doctor business.

In the year which ended Monday, Seville—real name Ross Bagdasarian—figures he has sold \$6,700,000 in novelty records and tie-ins.

The chipmunks who helped him are named Alvin, Theodore and Simon. They are, of course, the singing chipmunks on the records "Chipmunk Song" and "Alvin's Harmonica."

The witch doctor? That was the title of the song which launched Seville's big-time career.

Seville cashed in on commercial tie-ins with the chipmunks, whose pictures appear on wallpaper, T-shirts, and cookies.

He saved money by not having to hire singers. Seville himself is the chipmunks. A tape recorder enables him to achieve the strange sound attributed to Alvin and his pals.

Weed Control Meeting Dated

Highway and county road crews, commercial operators and other interested parties will be told the latest weed control techniques during an all-day session slated for Wednesday in the Douglas County Courthouse.

The meeting is one of a series of sessions being conducted by the state Department of Agriculture. Assisting in the program are field representatives of the state highway department and the Oregon State College Extension service.

Among topics slated to be discussed are highway spraying, chemicals, equipment, spray damage problems and ragweed control.

Ray Kelso of the state Department of Agriculture will give examinations for commercial applicators at the session.

The meeting will get under way at 9:30 a.m. in the courthouse auditorium.

Bridge Painter Calls It Quits

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Peter Bann, who worked 22 years on the endless job of painting the Golden Gate Bridge, has retired.

Crews of two dozen painters, swab all year to preserve the bridge from wind, salt spray and other weather wear.

Bann, still surefooted and mentally sharp, has reached the retirement age, 70.

He painted on the George Washington and Bear Mountain bridges in New York and the Delaware span in Philadelphia before coming here.

Pacific Squadron Shifting Planned

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The Navy said here that 14 ships of amphibious squadron 1 would leave April 16 to replace squadron 7 with the 7th fleet in the Western Pacific.

The movement is routine.

Each squadron of the four in the Pacific Fleet Amphibious Command is composed of attack transports and landing ships.

Normally one is with the 7th Fleet, two are at their home bases here or at Long Beach and one is undergoing overhaul.

Squadron 7 will return to Long Beach.

State Cars Limited

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Texas legislators don't want state officials and employees driving around in high-powered, air-conditioned cars bought with tax money.

The fine print of the 308-page appropriations bill laid before the House includes a provision that state Highway Department cars may not have eight cylinders, automatic transmissions or air conditioning.

Families Of Blaze Disaster Financed

CHICAGO (AP) — More than half a million dollars has been received in donations by a committee set up to aid the families of the children who perished or were injured in the tragic fire at Our Lady of the Angels School.

Ninety-one children and three nuns died in the fire last Dec. 1. More than 100 others were injured.

Dr. Karl A. Meyer, a member of the committee, reported that \$26,000 in contributions had been received.

Of the total, \$147,000 has been given to families of children killed or hospitalized from the blaze and \$4,100 has been expended for administration of the fund.

The balance, Dr. Meyer said, will be used to provide special training as needed for the injured children. Eight children still are confined to hospitals.

Social Security Men To Attend Conference

Lottery Ducat Ego-Builder In Southland

MEXICO CITY (AP) — "When a woman feels blue, she buys a new hat. When a man feels low, down here he buys a lottery ticket."

And, says a news editor of a leading newspaper, "you have no idea what a boost it gives you."

"You immediately begin to dream of what you can do with the big prize you convince yourself you're going to win," he continued.

"A poor man who doesn't know where his next meal is coming from often buys a two-peso ticket just to get a lift. He's buying hope."

"The odds, naturally, are heavily against winning that first prize, but it often goes to a poor man who reads about it all the time."

Federal Operation

The national lottery in Mexico is operated by the government. Profits go to such welfare institutions as the Children's Hospital, the Tuberculosis Hospital, or the National School for the Blind, maternity homes, and charity dining rooms. The lottery started in 1771.

There are three drawings a week, with prizes ranging from 250,000 to one million pesos. On national holidays the first prize runs up to 15 million pesos (\$1,200,000).

Other Games Forbidden

Mexico forbids such gambling as roulette, dice and blackjack.

But the lottery is a vital part of Mexican life. Tickets are sold on almost every street corner and in special booths.

After each Monday, Wednesday and Friday night drawing, the winning numbers are telegraphed to every corner of the country.

Payments are immediate and in cash, with small deductions for taxes.

Well over half of the money taken in goes to prizes, about 15 to 20 per cent to welfare groups and the rest to overhead and commissions to vendors.

Experts say that only one of every 50 to 80 tickets win a prize exceeding the value of the ticket. A small percentage more than double the investment. There's one chance in five of getting your money back.

Albany Voters Okay Two Special Levies

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — Albany voters Monday approved tax levies for swimming pool repairs and a mosquito control program.

But they rejected other proposed levies for a recreation program and a road improvement project.

The vote was 1,037 yes and 642 no on a special levy to provide \$2,700 for repairs to the city's swimming pool.

Also approved—1,186 to 504—was a \$4,200 five-year levy to finance mosquito control.

The voters turned down a 10-year, \$20,000 annual tax to finance a city park and recreation program. The vote was 899 no and 758 yes.

They also turned down, 882 to 766, a \$10,000 levy for the city's sewer improvement program.

Car Toll Upsets Safety Council

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Safety Council says it is disturbed at the upward trend in traffic deaths on the nation's highways in the first two months this year.

The council said here the death toll of 5,290 for January and February was 3 per cent more than the 5,130 reported in the same period last year. Last month's toll was 2,410, an increase of 2 per cent.

Disabling injuries in January and February were estimated by the council at 200,000.

No traffic deaths were reported in February by 524 cities. The three largest were Norfolk, Va., Richmond, Va., and Wichita, Kan.

Postal Agency Breaks Own Law In Exhibition

BALTIMORE (AP) — The post office display of three big colored postage stamps turned out to be too colorful.

The art department proudly exhibited them in the main lobby. They commemorated events in Alaska, the Arctic and Oregon.

But the spotlight display Monday caught the eye of John H. Hanly, head of the Secret Service office here. He reminded postal officials that federal regulations prohibit colored illustrations of postage stamps.

That canceled the stamps, which will be redone in black and white.

Police Agencies Ask Aid In Search For Fugitive

As police agencies in Douglas County and other sections of the state continue their search for Richard Allen Hunt today a request was made for stolen automobiles and breaks and entrances to be reported to the police immediately.

Hunt, 26, is wanted for wounding the Brownsville police chief and abducting the Harrisburg police chief in the Willamette valley last week. The Federal Bureau of Investigation is also after Hunt for transporting a stolen auto across a state line.

A stolen vehicle should be reported immediately to the state police, sheriff's office or city police, State Police Sgt. Robert J. Keefe said today. The immediate reporting of a stolen vehicle and a breaking and entering takes on added emphasis at the present time, Sgt. Keefe said.

Hunt is described as weighing 155 to 165 pounds, 5 feet 11 inches tall, medium build, having reddish blond hair, blue eyes, fair complexion. He has numerous moles on his face, a dim scar on the right side of his forehead and small scars on his right cheek.

Hunt's occupations have included farm hand, cowboy and camera shop employee. He has gone by the aliases of Ted R. Hoffman, Todd Shangle, Dick Stevens, Ted Stevens and Paul C. Stewart. Hunt reportedly has a violent temper, is armed and should be considered extremely dangerous, according to police and the FBI.

Coverage Provided For Mental Cases

NEW YORK (AP) — Group Health Insurance Inc. is going to offer coverage for mental illness to 30,000 subscribers as an experiment.

The two-year experiment is being made with a \$300,000 grant from the National Institute for Mental Health, according to an announcement here by Arthur H. Harlow Jr., president of the nonprofit insurance agency.

Most health insurance programs do not provide insurance against the cost of treatment for mental illness.

The 30,000 subscribers, selected from Group Health's regular subscribers, will be covered for 30 days of hospital care for mental illness, and for psychiatric treatment of various types in doctors' offices.
