

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — An unorthodox baseball grip and a glass-shafted mallet putter are the trademarks of the new Masters golf champion — quiet, modest Art Wall, Jr., of Pocono Manor, Pa.

"When I first started playing I never knew there was another way to hold the club," Wall said today of his "Mickey" Mantis-style of swinging. The mallet putter is a recent addition to his bag, replacing an old wooden-shafted blade he had carried for 10 years.

Wall In Stirring Rally

The putter—with three dots on its head to warn against three putts — played a major part in the most dramatic last day comeback in all the 25 years of Masters Tournament play.

Stirring six strokes back and in a tie for 13th place, Wall fashioned a brilliant six-under-par 66 Sunday for a total of 284 which left the pace-setters scrambling for runnerup money.

Cary Middlecoff finished in second place at 285. Defending champion Arnold Palmer took a triple bogey six at the 12th hole, the key hole of his success in 1958, and wound up with a 74 for third place at 286.

The Old Canadian war horse, Stan Leonard, faltered with a 75 Sunday tie with Dick Mayer. Amateur champion Charlie Cox, three-putting five greens, fell back to 73 for 288.

Bobby Anderson, a towering 23-year-old right-hander who was something less than sensational last year, has developed into the key man in the Chicago Cubs' pitching staff — so much so that Manager Bob Scheffing today decided to give him the opening day starting assignment.

At such an age, the supposition would be that Anderson is pretty much of a novice in the pitching trade.

Guess again.

He has toiled for no fewer than five minor league clubs and now is coming to his fourth hitch with the Cubs.

Anderson, all 6-4 of him, spent most of last season with Fort Worth in the Texas League where he compiled a 17-9 record. He hung on with the Cubs for a while and pitched a 3-3 mark and a 3.95 ERA.

But Sunday, he capped a fine exhibition campaign, by holding the Boston Red Sox to three singles during a seven-inning stint in Fort Worth. The Cubs won the ball game, 3-0, and Anderson got Friar's 30-day assignment against Los Angeles.

During the spring, Anderson pitched 38 innings and allowed 12 earned runs.

PULLMAN (AP)—A 19 year old Pacific Coast Conference broad jump record was bettered here Saturday as 19 records tumbled in the second annual Northern Division PCC relays.

Darrell Horn of Oregon State leaped 25 feet, 5 1/4 inches to better the 25-foot broad jump PCC record set by UCLA's Jackie Robinson in 1940. Horn's jump broke the relays record of 23 feet, 9 inches set last year by Dave Edstrom of Oregon.

Defending champion Oregon again won the meet with 60 1/2 points. Washington State was second with 49 1/2 and Washington was third with 39. Oregon State finished with 36 points and Idaho with 9.

Oregon competitors won five of the 15 events and tied for first in another.

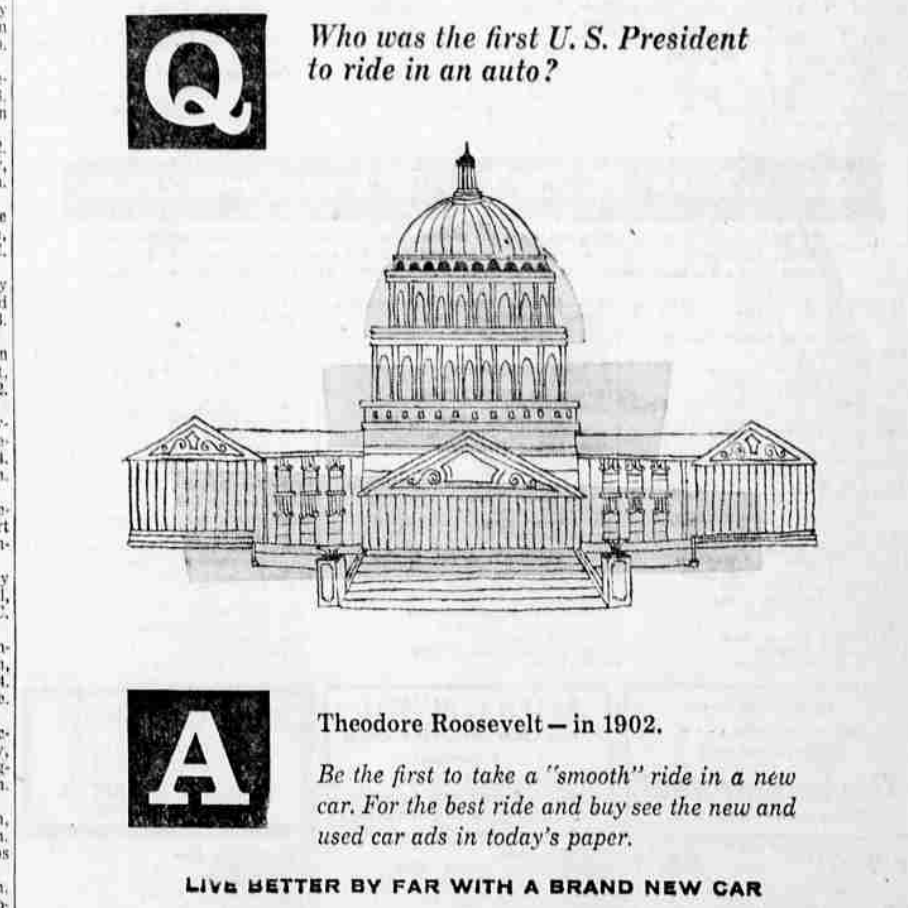
