Purple Heart Vet Refuses To Quit Hermit Existence

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (AP)—A Purple Heart veteran of World War II, bearded and in tatters, recalled here how he had renounced civilization five years ago to live alone in the wilds of Griffith Park.

Dennis Scott Farrell, 32, was questioned by officers who found him while searching for a prowler suspect on north Vermont Avenue at the fringe of the park.

Officers said Farrell had trembled at his first contact with humans in five years. Finally he related that he was an infantryman in the war and was shot through the lungs on Okinawa.

Then he tried to explain his retirement to the life of a hermit.

"At first I just wanted to die because I saw no future in anything. I tried starving to death. The first time I went without food for three days, then again for 11 days.

"But each time I gave up fast. I couldn't stand it any more."

Farrell said he had lived on the leavings of picnicers and spent the nights in caves or shelters built of lumber scraps.

He was not held. The officers, in fact, offered him money for food and new clothing. He declined it.

"I can get along by myself," he whispered. Then he faded back into the park's protective covering.

Glendale PTA Sees Centennial Play Staged By Seventh Grade

Highlight of the March PTA meeting at Glendale Grade School last week was the presentation of a centennial play by the students of the seventh grade, under the leadership of one of the seventh grade teachers, J. E. Bryan.

The play, which was done in costume, attempted to give the audience the feeling of having lived in the centennial period, for it included small-talk about stage travel, events of the time and problems of every day living.

Flag Presented

The evening's program was under the direction of Mrs. Riley Furlong, program chairman of the PTA. It was opened by presentation of the flag by the Bluebird group of the Blue Birds. After the play, five members of the grade school band played "All Star March," "Gloriana Waltz," "Mission Chorale," "Grandfather's Clock," and "Waltz Festival."

The program was concluded by a square dance presentation by 24 young people under the direction of Miss Ardis Meyers and Mrs. Betty Brady.

During the business meeting, it was announced that petitions were on hand for members to sign, asking the county court to restate the county child guidance clinic and to hire a full-time health officer.

Mrs. Polly Wright, chairman of the nominating committee, read the names of persons nominated for PTA officers. Voting followed, and Mrs. Scott Cleveland was announced president; Mrs. Loren Bartle, vice president; Mrs. Louis Price, secretary, and Mrs. Alvin Howard, treasurer. They will be installed at a later meeting.

A letter from the Douglas County Red Cross blood program chairman was read, pointing out that the county alone needs 2,400 pints of blood for hospital patients and that considerably less than that amount has been collected in this county.

It requested that persons able to do so, give blood when the blood bank comes to Roseburg in May, and that as many donations as possible be made when the blood bank visits Glendale in July or August.

In order to stimulate the giving of blood, a contest is being held between PTA groups of the county, and those giving blood in Roseburg or in Glendale are asked to indicate the name of their PTA so the local group can receive credit. A silver platter will be awarded the winning PTA.

A letter was also read from the county PTA chairman, outlining a request for copies of good magazines to be collected by the PTA and sent with others from the county for overseas distribution. A list of magazines which would give a true picture of American life and ideas was included in the letter, and it was explained the purpose of sending the magazines abroad is to facilitate giving members of other nations correct understanding of America.

Votes For Magazines

The Glendale group voted to collect magazines and to bring them to the April meeting. The organization will pay for shipping them to an Army Post Office address in San Francisco, and postage from that point will be taken care of otherwise. LANSING, Mich. (AP) — The television studio lights were dimmed and the audience drifted out as the entertainers quietly packed their instruments.

The performers exchanged their dinner jackets, formal, and white ties and tails for plain shirts and heavy gray woolen trousers.

Outside, eight husky men with guns carefully concealed under their jackets took their places in front of a big red bus.

They scanned faces and counted silently as the entertainers climbed aboard the bus.

The performers were numbers again—headed back to Southern Michigan State Prison.

It was one of the most unusual shows ever presented over station WJLM-TV. For 60 minutes convicts sang, danced, joked and performed like real troupers.

For the first time in 20 years inmates at Jackson Prison had been permitted to put on a show outside prison walls.

ISHPEMING, Mich. (AP) — Bing Crosby's wife has confirmed she is an expectant mother again.

The crooner's wife — Kathy Grant — made the announcement here after she arrived to begin work on a picture, "The Anatomy of a Murder." She said the baby is expected in September or October.

Crosby's marriage to the pretty brown-eyed actress Oct. 24, 1957, surprised friends and relatives although they had been dating four years. He was 53 and she was 25.

The singer's first wife, Dixie Lee, died in 1952 after a long illness.

Kathy gave birth to a son last August. He was named Harry Lillis Crosby III, but Bing nicknamed him "Tex" in honor of Kathy's home state.

Crosby has four other sons by his first wife. They are Gary, 26; twins Dennis and Phillip, 24; and Lindsay, 23.

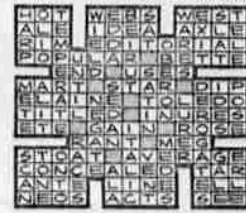

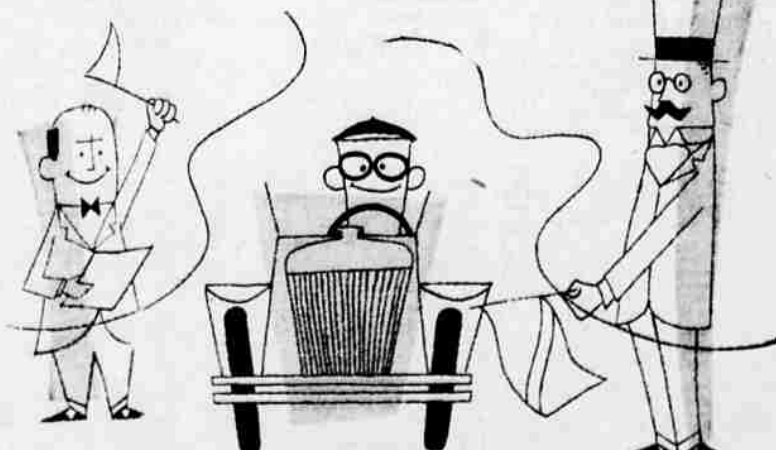
