Wool Prices Lead Industry Comeback

NEW YORK (AP)—Wool, long the weak sister of the depressed textile industry, led the pace Tuesday in the industry's comeback try.
 Latest industry figures show mill consumption of apparel wool in January and February up a whopping 37 per cent from a year ago. That compares with a 9 per cent gain in rayon and acetate shipments, and an increase of 3 per cent in cotton consumption by U.S. mills.
 Meanwhile, prices of wool cloth continue to move higher. Pacific Mills Worsted Co., a division of Burlington Industries Inc., raised prices 20 cents a yard for dactron-worsted blend fabrics for men's lightweight suits and slacks. These garments will go on sale in the spring and summer of 1960.

Hearing Dated On Glendale's School Budget

Glendale Schools Supt. Marlin Yoder told the Glendale School Board this week that the proposed tax levy based on the proposed 1959-60 school budget would be \$214,439.30, a sum which represents a slight increase from 1958-59.
 Yoder said the levy would amount to 58 mills, which is about the same as the 1957-58 figure but slightly higher than that for the current year, reported correspondent Mrs. Gerald Fox.
 A hearing on the budget is slated for 8 p. m. next Tuesday at the high school, noted the superintendent.
 School Clerk Vera L. Kemp told the board that the incumbent member, board Chairman William A. Vaughn, is the lone nominee for the board post which will be decided in the May 4 election. Today is the final day for nominees to file petitions.
 In school board action, the bid of Standard Oil Co. for the district's gasoline contract was accepted, along with the Shell Oil Co. bid on fuel oil.
 Yoder reported the state fire marshal has ordered that the metal fire chute at Glendale Elementary School be replaced or improved so that it reaches to the ground.
