Balancing Of State Budget Without Increasing Taxes Goal Fixed By Legislature

SALEM (AP)—With 13 weeks behind it and another two or three to go, Democratic leadership of the Legislature appears within sight of its goal.

That goal is to balance the budget with no new taxes — or only a small increase.

The Joint Ways and Means Committee may announce in another week a budget close to 300 million dollars.

At that figure, the House Taxation Committee might find it possible to recommend Oregon's income tax rates stay where they are.

If the committee finds it necessary to produce more revenue, it probably will reduce the \$600 personal exemptions to \$500.

Band Request Expected

Two big questions remain to be solved by the Ways and Means Committee. How much money to appropriate for public welfare; how much to spend on buildings for institutions and colleges out of the next biennial budget.

The committee is expected to recommend a 50 million dollar bond issue for buildings. It would be referred to the people.

The Senate will vote Tuesday on the bill to ask the people if they want a three per cent sales tax. The Senate is almost certain to pass it. The bill is headed for tough sledding in the House.

Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), chairman of the House Taxation Committee, does not want any part of a sales tax. He

New Zealander Knocks U. S. Standard Of Living

PORTLAND (AP)—Henry L. J. May of New Zealand does not think so much of the American standard of living.

"You may say you have the highest standard of living in the world, but we live miles better than you do," said May, a member of the New Zealand Parliament now touring this country under State Department auspices.

He said the wage-price comparison was better in New Zealand and cited some prices: butter 20 cents a pound, beefsteak 40 cents a pound.

He also said strikes were rare because of compulsory arbitration and there was no unemployment.

Bill Puts Subdistricts In Lane, Marion Areas

SALEM (AP)—A bill to divide Marion and Lane counties into subdistricts for election of state representatives was introduced Friday by Sen. William Grenfell (D-Portland).

Marion County would elect two representatives from Salem and its suburbs, and the other two from the rest of the county.

Lane County would elect two representatives from Eugene and Bethel precincts 1 to 8, College Crest, Friendly, and River Road precincts 1 to 7. The other three would represent the rest of the county.

Multnomah County now is the only county with subdistricts.

government enterprise is that we are convinced such policies are the best and surest ways for progress for the American people.

"The Republican party should be conservative in its economic policies. But if our conservatism is interpreted to the people as being merely stand-pat status-quo, hold-the-line, keep-things-as-they are, we will go down to defeat and deserve it."

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Inventory Exemption Voted

The Senate took a big step toward revising personal property tax when it voted to exempt inventories from the tax beginning in 1961. It will be up to the 1961 Legislature to find a substitute for that tax. The bill now is in the House.

Bills to increase income and property taxes on utilities appear to have died in committee. Each has been passed by one house.

The Legislature's second biggest item of business will be considered by the Senate Monday. This bill would increase payroll taxes on employers to increase the unemployment trust fund.

The increase would be achieved by raising from \$3,600 to \$3,800 the amount of a worker's taxable annual wage. The Senate is expected to approve it and send it to the House.

The House passed bill to let the governor submit reorganization plans for state agencies is slated for Senate action next week.

Housewives are expected to descend on the House State and Federal Affairs Committee at 8 a.m. Monday when it holds a hearing on the bill to curb the use of trading stamps.

Timber Tax Round Due

A move to reconsider the timber tax will be made Monday in the House, which defeated the bill Wednesday by a single vote. Its sponsors say the bill would discourage rapid cutting of timber by setting up cutting cycles by individual holdings. These cycles now are fixed on county-wide averages.

Proposals to increase basic school aid to local districts seem to be dead. Both houses are expected to pass a resolution to study the distribution of school aid.

In labor legislation, the Republican minority wants action on its bills to prevent coercion by employers or labor, make unions account for their funds, hold democratic elections of union officers, and have a two-year legislative study of labor-management problems.

The House will vote Monday on the bill to create a state power development commission. It's a bit doubtful whether the bill will pass. Some of the sponsors are not optimistic.

The bill would let the commission build federal power or generate its own. It would sell the power to private and public utilities, and to industry.

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chantable trees planted on southern slopes with any success.

Among the systems being incorporated in the Heussner ranch experiment is "scouting" of seedlings around the seedling rows. This was explained as cutting out a sod circle.

Fertilizers Added

In some cases various mixtures of fertilizer have been added. In other plots, fertilizer "simezone," a weed killer, has been tried without scalping.

Bradley said one great difficulty with weeds is that they rob the young tree or the seed of needed moisture in early stages of growth. This is the theory behind the scalping process.

The experiment has four different plots with 225 trees each. Eight different treatments are being tried to assist with growth plus the control row in natural, untreated soil for purposes of comparison.

The experiment will cost the county very little, Bradley reported. Crow - Zellerbach Co. and Rose Myers of Roseburg have contributed the various fertilizers; the Bureau of Land Management contributed the trees; and Heussner donated the land for the experiment.

Help Given

Bradley also is getting some assistance from Bill Stein of the Siskiyou Research Center, Roseburg, in setting out the plot and in checking results.

"We'll know something of the experiment's success yet this year. The first growing season is always critical in the life of a tree," said the county forestry agent.

However, a final report on the project will not be ready until the end of 1960, he added.

Killer Elephant Doomed To Bullet Death In Public

HUGO, Okla. (AP)—Dorothy the doomed circus elephant will give her last performance Sunday. She is to be executed before scores of curious onlookers.

Officials of the Carson and Barnes Circus say Dorothy is too dangerous to let live. She has killed one trainer and injured another by crushing them under her head.

Last November near Port Arthur, Tex., she killed James Lloyd, 28, of New York, a trainer with Hagen Bros. Circus. Then two weeks ago she slipped over on the first and fifth. Rogue River got a run in the second. Laws and Archer gave up 12 hits for the losers.

Dorothy's specialty is a headstand on a barrel. She has performed before countless thousands in circus tents across the nation. This talent was turned on Lloyd and Shipley.

After Dorothy did the headstand on Lloyd in Texas, she was sold to Carson and Barnes for \$5,000.

Joe Sullivan, circus spokesman, said his firm hoped to rehabilitate Dorothy and put her back in the ring. For three months the big 25-year-old beast behaved, he said.

Then two weeks ago she turned on Shipley at the circus' winter quarters here.

Shipley, who was employed only recently, knelt to adjust a leg band while on an inspection tour of the elephant barn.

Dorothy went into a nosedive, pinning the trainer, Freddie Logan, a handler, tried vainly to drive her away. Then he gave the signal for the end of her act and she rolled clear.

Shipley was hospitalized with a broken collar bone and broken ribs. Sullivan said the latest attack convinced the circus that Dorothy cannot be rehabilitated.

State highway patrolman Ed Vandergriff agreed to kill Dorothy star with a deer rifle. Circus officials said the execution will be open to the public.

Frontier Village, Boom Town Set For Big Fair

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's past is coming to life again in the form of a frontier village and sawmill boom town being built as part of "Adventureland," a part of the Centennial Exposition here this summer.

Adventureland will include replicas of 20 frontier buildings, including an old-time general store, blacksmith shop, Wells Fargo stage coach office and fire house.

A log foundation has been laid for the operating sawmill. A water-driven circular saw, shipped to Oregon around Cape Horn in 1828, has been restored for use at the sawmill.
