Myrtle Creek Woman, 97, Remembers Talk Of Weather, Crops, Chicken Pox

The long-time resident of Myrtle Creek was born Sept. 1, 1861. She married Grant D. Smith at Myrtle Creek and the family line now includes 12 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. Smith is now dead.

Cottage Grove Wreck Hurts Wife, 2 Sons

Leroy Junior Dyer, 38, Roseburg, was killed outright late Saturday night in a two-car collision on U.S. Highway 99 near Cottage Grove, state police report.

Three members of Dyer's family, his wife Martha, 37, and two sons, Rex, 11, and John, 7, were taken to Cottage Grove Hospital where all three were reported to be in good condition today.

The state police office at Eugene told The News-Review today the Dyer car was southbound on the two-lane stretch of highway just south of the Cottage Grove interchange. An investigation is continuing on the accident, police added, to determine which direction the second car, driven by Jack Joe Davis, 21, Springfield, was headed.

The accident was reported about 11:40 p.m. Hospital authorities at Cottage Grove said Mrs. Dyer received a laceration on her forehead in the accident. Eleven-year-old Rex suffered an injury to his left thigh and John, 7, suffered bruises and shock.

The Dyer's two daughters, Zoe Ann, 17, and Tawna, 13, were at home in Roseburg at the time of the accident. Dyer was employed as an oiler at U. S. Plywood Corp. here.

Man Badly Hurt

One of the passengers in the Davis car, Shirley Mae Petersen, Junction City, was listed in poor condition by hospital authorities. The condition of Davis and a second passenger, Donald Huckins, Eugene, was reported as fairly good.

Three other persons died in Oregon weekend traffic, the Associated Press reported. And another accident belatedly discovered added three more to the state's growing list of traffic deaths.

The bodies of a Chiloquin rancher and his wife, Adlai Johnson, 72, and Arabella Johnson, 59, were recovered Saturday from the Williamson River 30 miles north of Chiloquin.

The bodies were in a submerged car not far from where the body of Edward Raymond Jones, 59, an employe on the Johnson ranch, had been found earlier on a riverbank road.

Sheriff's Deputy Alvie Youngblood said Jones was the driver of the pickup truck, which for some reason left a straight road and plunged into the river.

All Are Traffic Victims The Johnsons died in the cab of the truck. David Schuck, 22, Medford, killed in a crash south of Grants Pass; Jerry P. Thomas, 23, Portland, killed in a wreck southwest of Portland; and Charles W. Dugan, 21, Lexington, fatally injured in a one-car wreck near Heppner.

Three severe deaths raised Oregon's traffic toll for the year to 120 in the Associated Press tabulation. Twenty have perished so far this month.

The toll is about the same rate as 1957 when a record high of 494 persons were killed by the end of the year.
