

Connie Firm In Denial Of Slaying Her Lover

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Nearly four hours of questioning failed to shake Connie Nicholas story that she didn't mean to kill her business partner, one of her lawyers said here.

"I thought she did very well on the stand," said attorney Charles W. Symmes. "The state couldn't get her to make any substantial change in her testimony."

Symmes said the 44-year-old divorcee's performance Friday "can't help but be to our benefit in the long run."

Mrs. Nicholas appeared exhausted when she left the witness stand after testifying that wealthy drug executive Forrest Teel was shot to death in a struggle over her pearl-handled pistol. Her version of the killing and her near-suicide wound up the trial's fourth week.

Castro Attacks U. S. On Sheltering Claim

HAVANA (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro attacked the United States today for "giving shelter" to Cuban fugitives who fled abroad after the downfall of the Fulgencio Batista dictatorship last January.

He told electrical plant workers it was "criminal and ignoble" for the United States to allow Cuban war criminals to use its soil as a base for anti-revolution campaigns. This is the act of a "bad neighbor," he said.

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Gangster, 17, Draws 'Indefinite' Term

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A 17-year-old boy has been sentenced for participating in a teen-age extortion ring that police said threatened its victims with such words as: "We'll carve your face so your own mother won't know you."

Judge Sydney J. Hoffman sentenced Melvin Dunson here to an indefinite term in the House of Correction. Dunson, police said, was a member of a North Philadelphia gang known as the "spaniels."

Police said victims of the gang were forced to pay tribute from wages earned by working after school hours.

Commission To Investigate Unemployment

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate has swung behind Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson's proposal to establish an 11-man commission to investigate unemployment. The vote was unanimous.

Johnson made his proposal Wednesday at a mass AFL-CIO rally here aimed at focusing attention on unemployment. The jobless still tops four million in spite of improvements during March.

Johnson's close liaison with fellow-Texas Sen. Rayburn, Democratic speaker of the House, indicates similar House approval. And it probably would be embarrassing for President Eisenhower to veto such a bill.

Johnson told the Senate his measure "seeks to bring before the Congress and public at the earliest possible moment the facts of unemployment. And since we must act upon those facts, there should be as little delay as possible in bringing them forth."

Johnson's resolution calls for three of the commission's 11 members to be named by the House speaker, three by the president of
