

Illness Mystery Of 125 On Train Unsolved

WASHINGTON (AP)—The local health department continued food tests today to determine what caused the illness of 125 train travelers from Toledo Wednesday. Water samples from the three railroad cars used by the victims had shown high bacterial counts.

But Dr. John R. Pate, chief of the D. C. Health Department, said Friday that the water could not have caused the mass illness of the delegates to the AFL-CIO's unemployment conference. Doctors said none of the poisonings was serious.

Clues Fizzle In Martin Case

PORTLAND (AP)—The clothing found last weekend in Hood River County was not from the missing Ken Martin family, Multnomah County sheriff's deputies said. Members of another family told deputies they had discarded the clothing in Ruckell Creek on the Multnomah - Hood River County line last December. The clothing included a sweater, a hair ribbon, a girl's torn pedal pushers and a shirt.

Detectives Gene Niece and Walter Graven traced the family found on a slip of paper in the creek Wednesday. The two men said the area was rough with potholes large enough to hide a car or house. They said a child could be lost forever in the thick brush, not more than a quarter mile from the Columbia River expressway.

This was the latest of a long series of clues to fizzle in the search for Mr. and Mrs. Martin and their three young daughters, who vanished after leaving home Dec. 7 in search of Christmas greens.

Long Imprisoned Mother Found Daughter, Crazy

BOSTON (AP)—A widow and her daughter were held at separate hospitals today after a priest and police discovered them in a cluttered, foodless apartment. The mother had threatened suicide. Her emaciated 33-year-old daughter had been held prisoner in her own home, police said, for 16 years.

Police Lt. Chester A. Henchey said the situation was discovered by the Rev. Kenneth Murphy, a Catholic priest, who operates Res-

cue Inc., a nonsectarian service for potential suicides. Father Murphy accompanied by police went to the home of Catherine Stearns, 59, Friday night after neighbors said she had threatened suicide. After taking Mrs. Stearns in hand, police searched for half an hour before they found her daughter, Mary, 33, under a pile of debris and blankets.

Henchey said the daughter was in such a wild state she had to be

to City Hospital where doctors began the process of building her up. The mother was taken to State Hospital.

A doctor said the daughter's thighs were "no thicker than a man's wrist." She weighed less than 60 pounds.

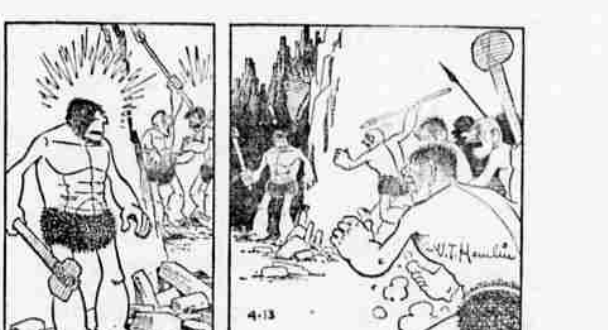

Morse Asks Publicity In Nepotism Disclosure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Names and salaries of all Senate employees would be published under a resolution introduced by Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore).

"I see nothing so special about senators' offices that justifies keeping a veil of secrecy over the salaries we pay," Morse told the Senate here.

The move to make payrolls public stems from a series of recent disclosures of nepotism in Congress—the hiring of relatives.
