

Elkton Woman Hurt In Wreck

Minor injuries were suffered about 5:20 p.m. Monday by Mrs. Orman R. Flanagan, Elkton, when a 1953 model car driven by her husband rolled over about five miles west of Dr. H.

Mrs. Flanagan suffered bruises on her legs, knees, hip and face and was taken by ambulance to the Drain Clinic, Flanagan, eastbound on state Highway 38, tried to pass a car and truck, met an oncoming vehicle and drove onto the left-hand highway shoulder where he lost control of the car and rolled over, according to state police. Flanagan was cited for passing with insufficient clearance.

In Roseburg, Arlene King Wachsmith, Portland, was cited by Roseburg police for violation of the basic rule after her 1955 model car collided with the side of a parked truck about 7:35 p.m. Monday on W. Harvard Ave., 40 feet west of W. Fairhaven St.

The truck, registered to Super Packing Co. of Klamath Falls, was parked and merchandise was being unloaded for the Fairhaven Market, 618 W. Fairhaven St. The accident occurred when apparently the Wachsmith vehicle made a wide turn and collided with the parked truck just behind the running board, police said.

State police arrived at the scene of a one car accident reported on Highway 99 north of the Alpine Lodge after the vehicle had been removed from the scene. The car was reportedly being towed by another car when it turned over. A truck driver reported seeing the upset car about 4:25 p.m. Monday.

Purchasing Differential Ruled Option Of State

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Monday that the state purchasing division does not have to grant Oregon manufacturers the 5 per cent differential in bidding on state purchases.

He said the state purchasing division can grant the differential if it wants to.

Under the differential, the state can give contracts to Oregon manufacturers as long as their low bids are not more than 5 per cent above the bids of out of state suppliers.

Mrs. Rosa Emily Ohman, 85, widow of the late Carl W. Ohman and pioneer resident of Douglas County, died this morning at a Roseburg hospital.

She was born at French Settlement, Ore., July 10, 1873, the daughter of John and Anna Margaret Long, Douglas County pioneers. For the past 50 years she had made her home in Roseburg. Mrs. Ohman was married Dec. 23, 1908, at Cleveland to Carl W. Ohman who preceded her in death on April 4, 1945.

Surviving are four children, Mrs. Mildred R. Simmons of Roseburg, Roy W. Ohman of Portland, Mrs. Fred P. (Gladys) Carls and Ralph L. Ohman, both of Roseburg; one brother, Will H. Long of Unquapa and seven grandchildren.

Funeral services are scheduled for 2 p.m. Friday in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary with the Rev. Dr. Eugene Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Roseburg IOOF cemetery.

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Lindell, Myers Rivals On School Ballot

Voters in School District No. 4, Roseburg, will go to the polls May 4 to decide whether Dr. H. Neils Lindell or Ross Myers will be the ablest replacement for Wayne Crooch, chairman of the Roseburg School Board.

Lindell has resided in Roseburg since 1948. He lived in Glendale from 1946 until that time, following a hitch in the U.S. Army Medical Corps.

He is a graduate of Hastings College in Hastings, Neb., and the University of Nebraska Medical School.

A native of Montana, he met his wife-to-be, Audrey, at Hastings. Dr. and Mrs. Lindell and their daughters, Judy, 14; Sue, 13, and Sherry, 10, reside at 839 SE Chadwick St.

Lindell is past vice president of the Douglas County Medical Society and currently is regional surgeon of the Second Battle Group of the 186th Infantry. Mrs. Lindell formerly taught school at Pavilion High School, Pavilion, Wyo., and Leigh High School, Leigh, Neb.

Myers, a Roseburg contractor, completed more than three years on the Roseburg City Council at the close of 1954. He was elected to a two-year term on that body in 1956 after serving out the unfinished term of Dr. Byron E. Woodruff beginning in 1955. He also served as a member of the city's budget committee prior to his council stint.

He is a member of the Oregon Wildlife Federation and the Roseburg Rod & Gun Club.

Both he and his wife, Marguerite, are Pennsylvania natives. Myers attended school in Hanover, Pa., coming to Roseburg in 1945.

He served in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers during World War II.

The Myers family, including sons William, 18; Ray, 15, and John, 13, reside at 1446 SE Main St.

Couples Found Safe From Chelan Storm

WENATCHEE, Wash. (AP)—Two young Wenatchee couples, missing in a 16-foot outboard boat on Lake Chelan since Sunday, were found safe Monday in a cove where rough weather had forced them to take shelter.

A search plane of the Chelan Airways radioed that Jim Johnson, news director for radio station KJEN, his wife, Marilyn; Robert Wines, and his wife, Donna, had spent the night at Safety Harbor.

The harbor is 12 miles above the landing ramp at 25-Mile Creek where the couples had left their car for a weekend outing by boat on the 55-mile long lake.

Strong winds, which sprang up Sunday soon after the four had left a Stehkin lodge at the upper end of the lake, had not subsided Monday.

Deputy Sheriff Tom Grancher said an excursion boat leaving here Monday would stop at the harbor to see if the two couples need assistance. They had spent Saturday night at the lodge and were unreported through the night on the 30-35 mile return trip to their automobile.

Drunken Driving Charge Denied

John Henry Swiney, 173 1/2 NE Malheur Ave., pleaded innocent in Roseburg Municipal Court Monday to a charge of operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor.

Trial was set for 9:30 a.m. May 14.

In another municipal court case Monday, Ardrie Wesson Scott, 2733 NE Hall Ave., pleaded guilty to being drunk in an automobile and was fined \$25.

Roseburg police said they arrested Scott about 11:30 p.m. Saturday in a 1955 model station wagon parked in the 700 block of SE Sheridan St. A half bottle of whiskey was found on the floorboards of the vehicle, police said.

Portland Dead Get Metal Sign

PORTLAND (AP)—A metal signboard will replace the old wooden war memorial signboard in Portland's south Park Blocks.

The old one, which cost the city some \$17,000 in maintenance during the past 12 years, was torn down Monday because of complaints that it was not a fitting memorial and that it was rotting.

As on the old signboard, the new one will list the names of Portland's dead in World War II.

The new sign will serve until the building of the Exposition-Recreation Center, which will include a memorial.

Pendleton Doctor Wins Silver Beaver Award

PENDLETON (AP)—The high scouting honor, the Silver Beaver award, has been given a Pendleton man.

Dr. J. M. Cornelison, 82, who has served youths in this area more than 60 years, received the award at the annual meeting and recognition banquet of the Blue Mountain Council, Boy Scouts of America, at Walla Walla.

The award was presented by Roscoe Lee, Milton-Freewater, for William Temple, Pendleton, of Oregon's Centennial Committee.

Army Reserve To Lay Centennial Train Track

PORTLAND (AP)—A mile of track will be laid here soon for a steam locomotive at the Oregon Centennial grounds.

It will be one of the features of the Centennial Exposition and Trade Fair.

Some 200 men of the 104th Army Infantry Reserve division will begin laying track Saturday. They hope to have the job done Sunday.

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Report Reveals County Payroll

Oregon's Unemployment Compensation Commission reported today 15,832 Douglas County workers were covered under the state's program during the peak employment period last year.

This was the total for August, middle of the third quarter work period. In July 15,588 were blanketed by the program, and for September the agency reported a figure of 15,753.

Total payrolls for the third quarter among covered employees amounted to more than 18.8 million dollars, the commission noted.

The largest group of covered employees were found in some form of manufacturing work. Last September this number reached 9,708, well over half the total listed on agency rolls. These people earned some 12.4 million dollars during the third quarter period of 1958.

Largest single group in manufacturing endeavors were employed by lumber and wood products companies. Last September lumber firms paid contributions for 8,894 workers.

In mid-summer last year 2,321 persons covered by commission funds were working in wholesale and retail trades, earning more than two million dollars in that quarter. Government payrolls, both state and federal, came to 1.2 million dollars for 1,162 persons in public service.

Personal services, including motels, hotels, medical and health services, amusement companies, auto repair and miscellaneous businesses employed 854 covered workers in the third quarter period last year.

Only 146 persons in agriculture, forestry and fishing pursuits were covered by the Unemployment Compensation program the peak work month of September last year, the agency reported.

Skiers Spend Night In Rainier Cave

LONGMIRE, Wash. (AP)—Three lost skiers who huddled in a snow cave, slapping each other to keep warm and singing to keep up spirits, survived a frigid night high on Mt. Rainier.

Ulla Samvik, 31, Bo Ryfelt, 35, and Einer Storakers, 30, all of Seattle, had worked their way down to the 6,500-foot level before they were found Monday afternoon. They were hungry but unhurt.

Storakers, member of a mountain rescue team at Jantland Fjall, Sweden, before coming to the United States two years ago, was credited with devising the survival shelter.

"We think his experience is what saved our lives," said Miss Samvik. "He showed us how to dig a cave with our skis in the snow, where we crawled in and spent the night."

The party became lost on a Sunday skiing trip.

Court Backs Father In Spanking Case

SHEPHERDSVILLE, Ky. (AP)—A man who maintained school officials had no right to paddle his son won court permission to keep the boy out of classes.

C. L. Troutwine Sr. conducted his own defense here on a charge of permitting 15-year-old Billy Troutwine to stay away from school.

A former truancy officer told the Bullitt County Court jury Billy came to school the first day of the term in September and didn't return.

Troutwine said he kept Billy home because a principal paddled him last year. "I don't want the flesh of my son whipped," he said.

Kentucky law requires school attendance until age 16.

Willis Willis, principal of Shepherdsville High School, testified he paddled Billy, a ninth-grader, along with nine other boys after they ignored repeated warnings to bring books to class.

Public Works Jobs Subjects Of Roseburg Council Action

Improvement costs for Roseburg's largest sewer improvement districts to date were given the City Council Monday night by Mrs. Willma Hill, acting city manager.

The Council also approved the widening of W. Stanton St. near St. Joseph's School.

Mrs. Hill announced costs to property owners of the Cloakes Ferry Addition for their sewer improvement project can be figured approximately 4.7-cents a square foot.

A few more homes north of Filbert Ave. were added to the district last night, but will not effect the overall cost of the project which is to be started early this summer.

The estimated \$165,000 job is the largest single sewer improvement project ever undertaken by the city of Roseburg. Nearly 300 service connections will be installed in the heavily populated west side residential district.

Millers Addition plans and specifications were accepted by the Council as prepared by City Engineer Ken Meng. In that area 110 parcels of land will be provided with sanitary sewage connections in another large improvement project to be completed this year.

Mrs. Hill said engineer's estimates run to about six cents a square foot for this project, or around \$305 assessment for a person with a 50 by 100 foot lot.

Hearing Set May 11
A May 11 date was set for a public hearing in Council chambers on the Miller Addition assessment roll. The project will cost property owners around \$48,000. It is estimated, St. Joseph's Catholic Church was granted permission by the council to go ahead with plans for a street widening and sidewalk project on the west side of W. Stanton St. in front of church property.

An 18-foot widening plan has been proposed to provide for angle parking from the school property to a point in front of the rectory. Along this "indented area" will be placed a cement sidewalk.

Councilmen approved a resolution authorizing California Oregon Power Co. to transfer about four utility poles to the east side of the street to facilitate the project. The company does not want to install poles on private property, it was reported.
