U. S. Exhibit To Be Opened On July Date

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Nixon will visit Moscow in late July. His expected talks with high Soviet officials may help to set the stage for a summit conference.

His designation by President Eisenhower to make the trip also could promote Nixon's chances for the Republican presidential nomination next year.

A White House announcement at Augusta, Ga., said Nixon will make the trip to open an American exhibition in Moscow July 25. No other details were given but diplomatic officials were sure he would meet with Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

A six-week exhibition is designed to show Soviet citizens how Americans live. The Soviets will stage a similar exhibition in New York City.

Eisenhower said in a statement that the purpose of the exhibition is to develop broader understanding between the American and Soviet peoples — "the kind of mutual understanding upon which our peaceful future depends."

If Nixon demonstrates a capacity to deal effectively with Soviet leaders it could give him a boost in his unannounced quest for the presidency in 1960. At a minimum it will focus attention on him in the months leading up to selection of the Republican nominee.

Mikoyan Followed Up
Internationally, the trip means a new round of high-level contacts, following up the January visit here of Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan.

Presumably one of Nixon's purposes will be to demonstrate to the Soviet peoples a friendly American interest in them. He is expected to emphasize a United States desire for better relations.

Nixon now plans to remain in Moscow three or four days. He seems assured of red carpet treatment. His time in the country might be extended.

His trip is timed to fall between the scheduled Big Four foreign ministers meeting at Geneva and a probable summit conference in late summer, perhaps in August. He may have an opportunity to discuss pending questions in advance of the summit gathering.

Nixon will be the first high-ranking U.S. official to visit the Soviet Union in many years.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall was there for a foreign ministers meeting on German and Austrian problems in 1947.

Welfare Board End Proposed In House

SALEM (AP) — A revolt against the state Public Welfare Commission broke out in the House Thursday with the introduction of a bill to abolish the commission.

The bill, by Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), would put welfare activities under an administrator who would be appointed by the governor. It was referred quickly to the House State and Federal Affairs Committee.

Much dissatisfaction with the Welfare Commission has existed among legislators since the commission asked for \$1,900,000 in emergency funds for April, May and June. The Joint Ways and Means Committee, surprised by the request, wanted to know why the commission did not request this earlier.

The committee cut the request to \$1,200,000 and both houses approved it. But there is a move to restore at least part of the other \$700,000.

Barton is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, and also is chairman of the House Taxation Committee.

Capsule Hunt Set North Of Norway

BODOE AIR BASE, Northern Norway (AP) — A small fleet of U.S. Air Force planes was expected to start an arctic search today for the space capsule ejected from the satellite Discoverer II.

Lt. Col. J. C. B. Ebbesen of the Norwegian air force said the hunt would concentrate on the sea and ice around the Spitsbergen Archipelago 400 miles north of Norway.

Military authorities refused to let newsmen talk to the crews of the American planes arriving at this Norwegian base beyond the Arctic Circle. They came from U.S. bases in Germany and Britain.

Informed sources at the World Congress of Flight in Las Vegas, Nev., said the capsule apparently landed off a Norwegian island in the arctic — presumably Spitsbergen. The capsule was supposed to float.

Discoverer II, launched Monday from California, ejected the capsule Tuesday. Original plans to catch the cone in the air over the Hawaiian Islands failed.

Gear Shift Mystery To Elderly Driver

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP) — Here's what police said happened to Thomas Jaccarella when he started to drive his car out the driveway at his home:

He backed the car 29 feet until he saw he was going to hit his house. Then he shifted into forward, and a tree and clothes pole, started backing again, scraped the side of the house and struck two more trees.

The car continued backing until it ran into a car across the street, then the driver shifted into forward, traveled 45 feet, smashed a small wall, drove into a field, tore down a bush, traveled through a wooden fence, brushed a pine tree and steel wire fence and then hit a house.

Then Jaccarella put the car into reverse, backed across the two fences and a pine tree, hit another house and finally came to a stop against a tree.

Deputy Sheriff Cliff Gunn said Jaccarella is 82.

Lions Hear 'Y' Building Plans

Alaska Legislature Ends First Session

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — The first legislative session of the 31st-month-old state of Alaska ended Thursday night.

The 60 lawmakers, after 81 days in session, adjourned until next January.

Into the history of the new state, the lawmakers wrote:

A \$134-million-dollar spending program for the next fiscal year. This includes a balanced 27 1/2-million-dollar general budget, plus 3 1/4 million dollars for highways. The highway money comes from a special fund.

A powerful executive-type state government, with 12 appointed department heads operating directly under the elected governor. More than 100 territorial boards, commissions and agencies were incorporated into the 12 departments.

A controversial, and still unfinished, bill designed to cure the state's ailing jobless insurance fund. The bill would apply additional taxes on wages of workers covered under the employment security program.

Drain Treasurer Resigns, Takes Position On Council

Thomas Myers resigned as city treasurer this week and was sworn in as city councilman at Drain, according to Edith Bush, News-Review correspondent.

He replaces Calvin Peterson, who resigned in March. Forrest Johnson was appointed temporarily by the council to serve as city treasurer.

Discussion of granting a franchise to Eldon Letson for the construction and maintenance of a television cable system was held. Councilmen agreed that such an operation would be necessary when the TV reflector is removed from Mt. Baldy. City Recorder Verne Thomas said that the cable system seemed the most practical of several possible solutions to the video problem. Letson was instructed to present detailed plans, according to City Attorney Don Sanders.

Raise Granted
A \$10 raise was granted to all city employees, and progress on the sewer and water system is reported.

Agreement Noted
Councilmen agreed to continue Drain's participation in the county mosquito control program as in previous years.

City Recorder Thomas requested consideration of purchasing a billing machine, declaring other cities found such equipment necessary when more than 300 accounts were involved, and Drain now has over 900. A specially adjusted machine would be needed because the Drain city business office bills for sewer service and electricity in addition to the water bills that cities figure in their accounting. The billing machine would free the office staff for other necessary work.

The need of a sign on the City Hall was discussed and plans made for its construction.
