

Minimum Wage Bill Defeated

Batch Of Other Proposals Get Varied Action

Liquor, Tobacco, Dops Among Items Dealt With At Legislature

SALEM (AP)—A measure to establish a \$1 an hour minimum wage in Oregon, with time and a half after 40 hours a week, is dead in the Oregon Legislature. The Senate completed action Friday on a bill to make it illegal to sell or give away any tobacco to a child under 18 years old. It provides fines of \$5 to \$50 for violating that provision. Any child who smokes could be sentenced to two days in jail or fined \$5.

The purpose of the bill is to clear up several conflicting laws on smoking by minors.

The House sent to the governor a bill to adopt a new concept in dealing with narcotic addicts. It authorizes use of a chemical called naline to detect addiction, and provides for five years of probation for addicts so they can be treated.

An addict would not get probation unless he agreed to the naline tests.

The House sent to the Senate a bill to increase the size of the three-member parole board to five members.

Longer Terms Voted

A House-passed bill to increase the two-year terms of House members to four years was amended by the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee. The amendment would increase senators' terms from four years to six years. If the measure passes, it would go on the ballot.

The same committee approved the House measure to permit the governor to submit a reorganization plan for state agencies to the Legislature.

A bill to permit state departments to deduct union and employee association dues from their employees' pay checks was passed by the Senate and sent to the governor.

Other bills sent by the Senate to the governor would permit the voters of any county to adopt civil service for county employees, and permit adoption of a hospital and medical insurance plan for retired public employees.

A bill to provide a 14-day non-resident liquor permit for 25 cents was approved by the House and sent to the Senate. Its purpose is to make it easier for centennial visitors to buy a bottle. The bill would expire July 1, 1960.

Bills sent by the House to the governor would set up the Advisory Council on Unemployment Compensation on a permanent basis, let the Port of Portland acquire industrial sites, and let the governor name a board of visitors for Fairview Home for mentally retarded persons.

A guard was stabbed and later freed. Fifteen of the guards held hostage appeared in good condition. The 16th guard, identified only as Backman, was struck in the face by a rifle butt.

Held with them during the rebellion were five convicts described as "fool pigeons" because they had informed prison officials on their fellow convicts.

Their fate was not determined. Guard Laurence Cozens, one of the hostages, said they were concerned by convict threats to douse them with naphtha and turn them into human torches in the event an armed assault was attempted.

"We heard the convicts yell 'They're coming in' he said. 'We got mattresses and held them up to the bars of the cells to keep them from throwing in the naphtha. We heard the bazooka shots, then some running.'

"After their release, the hostages were still holding up a National Guardsman. He told us to get them out of the way. He opened the cell, and we left on the dead run. We ran through the main cellblock and out through the woman's quarters."

Rackets 'King' Genovese Given Rap Of 15 Years

NEW YORK (AP) — Rackets boss Vito Genovese was behind bars today, sentenced to 15 years as the mastermind of an international narcotics ring.

It took U.S. Dist. Court Judge Alexander Bicks just three minutes Friday to send Genovese to jail, revoke his \$150,000 bail and fine him \$20,000.

The 6-year-old Italian-born Genovese has further troubles. As a denaturalized alien, he faces automatic deportation for criminal activity.

While Genovese appeared calm as sentence was passed, the packed courtroom echoed to whistles of incredulity and groans. In a last-minute statement, Genovese had told the court: "All I can say, your honor, is I am innocent."

His lawyer, Anthony A. Calandra, filed an appeal and said he will go before the U.S. Court of Appeals Monday to ask for bail pending the appeal.

Genovese, who has been described as "king of the rackets," reputedly made 30 million dollars in racketeering.

14 Others Rapped

Fourteen others convicted with Genovese April 3 received at least a five-year prison term, required under a federal narcotics law passed by Congress in 1935. Trial began Jan. 5.

Among the sentenced was hen-haired Jean Capace, 30, Manhattan, mother of an 11-year-old boy. She bowed her head and cried softly as sentence was pronounced. She received the minimum five-year term.

The government had charged that the ring, headed by Genovese, of Atlantic Highlands, N.J., imported heroin from Cuba, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Europe in violation of the federal narcotics law. Genovese and Natale Evola, 52, sentenced to 10 years and fined \$20,000, were delegated to a gang-land convention at Apalachin, N.Y., in November, 1957.

Vincent L. (The Chin) Gigante, 30, Manhattan, drew a seven-year term. He was acquitted last May of the attempted murder of racketeer Frank Costello.

Julius H. Barnes Former Finance Notable, Passes

DULUTH, Minn. (AP) — Julius H. Barnes, 86, industrialist who amassed grain and shipping fortunes was found dead in his hotel room Friday.

Barnes' once great wealth virtually vanished in his later years through business losses and donations. He lived in modest retirement here for the past 10 years.

Barnes apparently died of a blockage of the main artery leading from the heart.

A man without a high school education, the Arkansas-born financier served as president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce from 1921 through 1924.

At one time he headed or helped direct nearly a dozen business enterprises including the Barnes-Ames grain brokerage firm and the Barnes Shipbuilding Co. in Duluth.

He worked with Herbert Hoover in the European relief program after World War I and was honored by many governments.

Barnes and his family came to Duluth from Little Rock, Ark., in 1883 when he was 10. The boy's father died in his first semester of high school and he was forced to leave school to help support the family.

He began as an office boy in a grain brokerage firm in which he later became a partner.

Surviving are a son, Robert L., Washington, D.C., and a daughter, Gertrude Fiertz, Long Island City, N.Y.

The arrest was made by a Southern Pacific detective and Oakland Police Chief C. W. Manning.

They said the switch apparently had been forced open by rocks and had been open for several hours before it was discovered. A maintenance man from Yoncalla closed the switch.

The officers commented that a serious accident could have occurred had a train passed over the switch, according to Mrs. Edith Dunn, News-Review correspondent.
