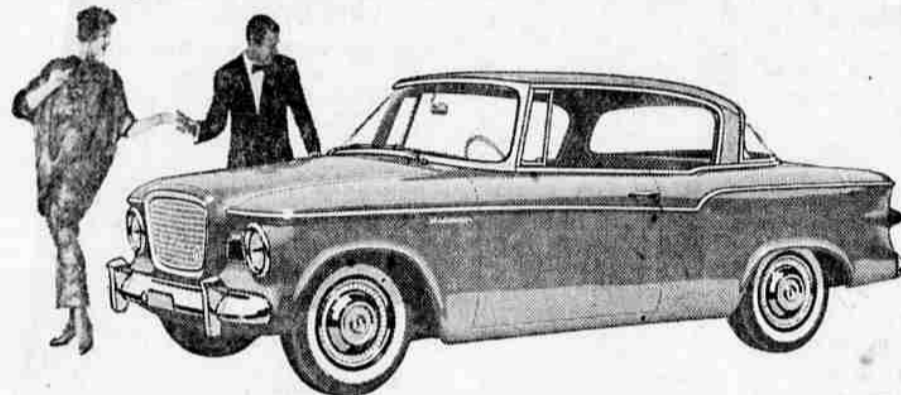
Boat Oar Firm Damaged By Fire
