Available to answer questions will be Councilmen and Budget Committee members Leslie West and Jack Davis, along with Mrs. Hill and Police Chief Vernon Murdoch Jr., Fire Chief W. E. (Dutch) Mills and Kenneth Meng, city engineer.

"We still are welcoming questions from the public that can be answered on the program," Mrs. Hill said. "They should be mailed to the television studio."

The April series of discussions of the proposed budget will end Monday, April 27, with a public hearing in council chambers above the downtown fire station. The time is 7:30 p.m.

Higher Payment Set For Salmon

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—The United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union is expected to ask a four-cent-a-pound increase for sockeye when negotiations with the Fisheries Assn. of British Columbia open soon.

It was reported Tuesday the union will seek 32 cents a pound for sockeye compared with last year's 28 cents; 13 cents for pinkies, up 3¢; 24 cents for coho, up 6¢; and 12 cents for all chums.

About 5,000 fishermen belong to the union.

Winston Man Sentenced For Deserting Family

Circuit Judge Robert G. Davis has sentenced a 25-year-old Winston mill worker to a year in the state penitentiary for desertion of his wife and two infant children.

Floyd William Niemi was found guilty of the state's charge which cited him for abandoning his family Jan. 27 of this year. Late last month Judge Davis tried Niemi and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

\$15,000 Lounge Move Voted By Assemblymen

SALEM (AP)—The House voted Tuesday to move its lounge from the fourth floor to the third floor of the capitol, because the elevator only goes as high as the third floor. It will cost \$15,000.

Rep. William Holmstrom (D-Gearhart) explained it is cheaper to move the lounge down one floor than to extend the elevator up a floor. Besides, he added, the capitol planning commission will not permit the elevator extension.

Welfare Board Bill Sent Back To Committee

SALEM (AP)—Legislation to abolish the Public Welfare Commission and transfer its powers to the governor was referred back to the House State and Federal Affairs Committee Tuesday after it struck a legal snag.

Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), author of the bill, said there is some doubt whether the federal government would continue to give Oregon welfare money if the bill were passed.

So he asked unanimous consent to adopt an amendment providing that the bill would not go into effect if the federal government protested.

Rep. Beulah Hand (D-Milwaukie) objected.

So Barton had to move to send the bill back to committee for consideration of the amendment.

Mrs. Neuberger Named

PORTLAND (AP)—Mrs. Richard Neuberger, wife of an Oregon senator, will be one of 139 U.S. representatives at the Atlantic Conference of NATO nations in London June 5-10.

The meeting, to be attended by 600 representatives of NATO nations, is being held to discuss expanded economic cooperation.
