

## Lumber Producers Schedule Review Of New Association

Independent lumber producers from a seven-county area will meet Friday night in Roseburg for the second in a series of sessions aimed at furnishing independent firms with "more effective representation," a spokesman for the group announced today.

The session will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Umpqua Hotel. Participating will be lumbermen from Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Lake Counties, all members of the recently formed Associated Independent Lumber Producers, Inc.

The first meeting of the series is slated for Thursday in Eugene.

"We are convinced the small independent lumber producer does not have effective representation," said Ellerd L. Larkins, president of the group, in explaining reasons for the state-wide meetings.

He said the goal of AILP is "relief from problems pressing the independent producer." Included on the association's agenda are such items as availability of timber, access roads, equitable taxation, maximum allowable cuts and smaller timber parcels for bidding, he noted.

"Our board of directors feels our programs cannot represent the individual independent producer, nor can the AILP gain its objectives, unless we meet directly with producers throughout the state," he continued. The meetings are designed to "discuss individual problems and inform everyone of the reasons for AILP's existence," stressed Larkins.

He said the group is organized so that "no one segment of the industry or membership can ever dominate our programs. We are designed on a democratic basis with a grass roots approach to everyone's problems," he concluded.

## Yoncalla Area Votes Slated

Yoncalla and Scotts Valley voters will vote on three budgets and elect school board members May 4.

The Yoncalla Union High School district budget totals \$106,888, News-Review correspondent Mrs. George Edes reports. Of this amount \$61,718 is outside the six per cent limitation and must be voted by the people to put the budget into effect.

Incumbent board member Paul Reeves is challenged by Darrell Payne and Nellie Phillips in his bid for re-election to a five-year term. A one-year term on the board is being vacated by Wayne Rice, Bob Smith and Paul Allen are candidates for the post.

Yoncalla voters will vote on a grade school budget totaling \$139,753 and calling for a tax levy of \$75.091 outside the six per cent limitation.

Three candidates — Wayne Phillips, Everett Curtis and Thomas Ellis are seeking the five-year school board term being vacated by Quentin Rychard the retiring board member.

In Scotts Valley, the elementary school district budget levy totals \$39,065 with \$27,890 of this amount outside the six per cent limitation.

In the school board race, Fred Booth is unopposed in his bid for re-election.

## Sunshine Returns To Oregon Scene

Sunshine came back to most of Oregon today. The Weather Bureau said it was the prelude to a rainy weekend.

It was cloudy in northwestern Oregon, but sunshine was general elsewhere today, weather observers said.

Scattered clouds are expected over much of the state Friday. There probably will be a few showers over the southern Cascade Mountains.

Forecasters said the clouds should clear away by Saturday. Temperatures again remained above freezing early today. The coldest was Baker's 38 degrees.

A high ranging from 60-70 is expected throughout the state Friday.

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## Senate Votes To End Multnomah Subdistricts

SALEM (AP)—The Senate passed 16-14 and sent to the House Wednesday a bill to abolish Multnomah County's subdistricts for electing state representatives.

All 11 Republicans plus three Democrats voted against the bill. The effect of the bill probably would be to increase the county's Democratic representation in the House.

The Democrats opposing the bill were Ward Cook, Alfred H. Corbett and Jean L. Lewis, all of Portland.

Multnomah is the only county to have subdistricts. It has had them for four years.

## Bessie Mathews

Bessie Mathews, 72, died Wednesday in a Roseburg hospital.

Miss Mathews was well known in the Roseburg area, having lived here for the past 50 years. She was a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and had been suffering from a prolonged illness at the time of her death.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later and are being handled by Wilson's Chapel of the Roses.

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## Troopers Quell Prison Uprising

CONCORD, Mass. (AP)—Five desperate inmates of the Concord Reformatory held 15 hostages for four hours Wednesday night until a wave of state troopers ended their bid for freedom with tear gas and acetylene torches.

One of the quietest, identified as kidnaper Charles (Bull) Martin, 36, held a smuggled gun to the head of a hostage while demanding "We want out."

Correction Commissioner George McGrath said Martin mistakenly "thought he could make it out of there through the front door with the revolver and hostages."

"This was an escape attempt, pure and simple," said Edward S. Grennan, superintendent of the reformatory, which once housed only youthful offenders but now is used for long-term adult prisoners.
