

Centennial Preparations Widespread In Douglas County

Construction Of Building At Exhibition Site Starts, Displays In Planning Stage

The Douglas County Centennial Committee, at a no-host luncheon in the Umpqua Hotel Friday was told of plans for the sale of various items at its exclusive exhibit building at the Centennial grounds in Portland. The group also was informed that work has been started on construction of the proposed building and that displays are being made ready.

Some of the major exhibitors have employed advertising companies to prepare their displays in allotted parts of the building. An advertising concern is preparing the general display.

Winchester Bay, is going "all out" to publicize its outstanding fishing resort, Salmon Harbor. It will have pictures, gifts of smoked salmon and cheese, and a charming hostess to entertain centennial visitors.

Hal Schiltz, editor of the Myrtle Creek Mail, said the southern part of the county is setting up information booths, will publicize numerous special events, will have myrtlewood souvenirs and myrtlewood coins, together with a brochure on Southern Douglas County.

Glide is working on a number of projects, one of which will be a recreation area.

Yoncalla Prepares Pageant

Yoncalla is preparing an historical pageant for July 3, to be followed by a rodeo and homecoming on July 4.

Vernon Murdoch Jr., Roseburg chief of police, said the city police department, together with sheriff's officers, reserve units and State Police have been studying to act as information agencies and to offer hospitality to visitors. The Roseburg police department, he said, will continue to wear existing uniforms, but all law enforcement officers will wear ten-gallon hats.

The Roseburg Fire Department, however, is having some difficulty with its gear. Firemen are planning old-fashioned clothing, uniforms and all, but can't find wide suspenders, according to chief William (Dutch) Mills.

The committee was given a report on the Oregon wagon train by Dr. Verner Anderson.

Persons brought to trial now have to be indicted by a grand jury.

Under the proposed amendment, which will be on the 1960 general election ballot, the district attorneys could refer any case to a grand jury.

St. Lawrence Seaway Opened To Traffic

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The power behind the seaway is the huge Saunders-Moses hydro-electric dam near Massena. The dam, reaching 3,200 feet across the St. Lawrence from New York to Ontario, backs up river waters to cover white-cap rapids that halted explorers hunting the legendary Northwest Passage centuries ago.

Small European ships have navigated the route as far west as Duluth, Minn., for years. But today, vessels drawing 22½ feet of water can traverse the seaway.
