The Sacramento Solons, swinging happily from atop the Pacific Coast baseball league, hammered out 14 hits Tuesday night to defeat Portland 9-5 and stay a full game in front of the PCL pack.

Spokane moved into a third-place tie with Salt Lake City by beating the Bees 13-5. San Diego used extra-base blows to remain within a game of the leaders, whipping Seattle 4-1. Vancouver rattled 13 hits off four Phoenix pitchers for a 16-6 victory.

Noel Mickelson posted his second win in three starts for the Solons, but it took Terry Fox's relief in the eighth to protect the victory. George Freese, who had hit a home run earlier, rapped into a double play to end the Beaver rally.

Jack Littrell also got a solo homer for Portland and Bob Perry got one for Sacramento.

Opening home runs by Charles Williams and Norm Sherry shocked Salt Lake and Spokane followed up with a 14-hit attack. Maury Wills, Tony Roik and Steve Bilko all went 3 for 5. The Bees crammed four of their runs into the fifth, with Sam Miley's double the only extra-base blow in the series.

Bud Podbielan allowed only six hits to the Rainiers as he registered his second win and kept his earned run average down to 0.84. The Padres pushed across three runs in the fourth as Podbielan beat out an infield hit, Rod Graeber doubled, Steve Jankowski walked and Mitch June tripled.

Ted Tappe registered Seattle's only run with his fourth homer of the season in the first.

The Mounties tied up their tallies in three innings. Ray Barker started it with a three-run homer in the first. Joe Taylor and Marv Breeding connected on home runs in the fourth to put the game out of reach.

Benny Valenzuela and Owen Friend both got homers for the Giants.

If today's pennant race standings aren't enough to convince you that this is the most unusual year in the American League, take a stab at naming the three pitchers in the league who have won as many as three games so far.

The AL has more aces than a pinocle deck—Billy Pierce, Dick Donovan, Herb Score, Cal McLish, Bob Turley, Whitey Ford, Frank Lary, Jim Bunning and Jack Harshman, to name a few.

But the three who have won three are Washington's Pete Ramos and Russ Kemmerer and Kansas City's Bob Grim. Each is 3-1.

Ramos had a 14-18 record last season for the last place Senators. Kemmerer was 6-15. Grim had a 7-7 record, split between the New York Yankees and seventh place A's.

Kemmerer, who at 23 became a full-time starting pitcher for the first time last season, put away his third in a row Tuesday night at Kansas City, beating the A's 8-3 with an eight-hitter while the Senators skipped past Boston and New York into fifth place.

It was the only game played in the majors. Rain and cold iced New York at Chicago, Boston at Cleveland and Baltimore at Detroit in the American and Chicago at Milwaukee, San Francisco at Philadelphia and St. Louis at Cincinnati in the National. Los Angeles and Pittsburgh weren't scheduled.

Ike Displeased With Labor Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower told Republican congressional leaders here he wants a better labor regulation bill than the one approved by the Senate.

The leaders reported this after a 2 1/2-hour conference with the President.

House GOP Chief Charles A. Halleck of Indiana called the Senate measure "grossly inadequate."

The party's Senate leader, Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, referred to the measure as a watered-down version of what is needed to stamp out racketeering in the labor field.

Both Halleck and Dirksen predicted that Eisenhower at his news conference Wednesday will strengthen the Senate bill.

Action in the House is not likely before June.

Six Youths Held In Shooting Case

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Six white Richmond youths have been arrested in connection with the shotgun wounding of six Negro teen-agers which grew out of an inter-racial rock-throwing incident Sunday night.

Police said one of those arrested, 17-year-old Kenneth J. Kenney, was charged with felonious assault with a shotgun after he admitted firing the weapon from an automobile in a middle-class Negro residential section.

Two of the Negro victims, walking along the sidewalk when the shooting occurred, were hospitalized with serious wounds. Four companions received less serious wounds.

PORTLAND (AP) — Influenza and related diseases reached epidemic proportions in Oregon last week, the state Board of Health announced Tuesday.

The board said Oregon registered 31,204 to date this year, nearly seven times more than the total at this time last year.

The board said 5,553 cases reported last week was a sharp increase over the 4,363 cases the week before.

This is threatening to surpass the 1960 record of 6,585 cases in a single week, at the height of the 1957 Asian flu epidemic.

London Right Gives Him Title Chance

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Does Britain's Brian London have any kind of a chance to take away Floyd Patterson's heavyweight title Friday night?

The odds makers (10 to 1) say no. The experts from Britain and the United States say no. But London's right hand booms out a yes.

We had our first look at the six-foot, 205-pound British husky in action Tuesday. We were surprised by his style and the speed of his punching, especially with right uppercuts and straight rights.

The former British champion is supposed to be a brawling, American-type brawler with little finesse. That's not what we saw, although you can't go by a two-round boxing workout.

London fights mostly from a stand-up, flat-footed stance. He does very little crouching. He doesn't bore in but he moves in swiftness. He has a fair jab but unloads his rights to the jaw with more than average ability for a big man.

Must Nail Him
He is fully aware that Pete Rademacher and Roy Harris dumped the champion with rights to the head and hopes to do the same.

"I'm a good finisher," said Brian, "and if I get him down I think I can keep him there. But of course I'll have to nail him first."

The 24-year-old Blackpool native finished up his hand training in the two-round drill with Dusty Rhodes of New York. Rhodes, a one-time sparring partner for Patterson, did very little but offer a target.

London's punching impressed Al Weill, who guided Rocky Marciano to the world championships.

"London is better than Don Cockell was when he fought Marciano (Marciano stopped Cockell in nine in 1955) and he's got a real good chance," said Weill.

"He must be a pretty good puncher to score 19 knockouts in 26 fights and I don't care what kind of guys he fought."

Patterson looked real sharp in his final three-round boxing practice, especially in the first round with Ike Thomas, another slow-moving human punching bag. The 6-foot, 182-pound champ stung Ike with left jabs, jarred his head with two, three, and four punch combinations, and then dropped him with a left hook to the jaw.

Reporter Barred By Senate Leader

SALEM (AP) — Senate President Walter J. Pearson told the Senate Tuesday he no longer will allow in his office a certain news reporter.

Ken David, an Oregonian reporter, said he is the one meant by Pearson.

Pearson, without naming anyone, said the reporter had falsely claimed the Senate and Federal Affairs Committee met secretly last Friday in Pearson's office.

David replied he had tried to get in to the meeting but was waved out by Pearson.

The meeting was to consider the 55-million-dollar higher education budget, which Pearson thought too big.

Pearson also told the Senate there was nothing unusual in his sending an appropriation bill to a committee other than the Joint Ways and Means Committee. The referral to the State and Federal Affairs Committee was called almost unprecedented by newspapers.

Pearson told the committee the budget should be cut, but the committee voted 4-2 to approve it.

Wagon Greeter Dies In Kansas

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — Hurley Fellows, 67, a U.S. Department of Agriculture plant pathologist, died Tuesday at his home here.

He was a native of Oregon City, Ore., and followed closely the progress of the Oregon Trail Caravan now crossing Kansas.

Fellows Monday met the wagon train at Louisville, Kan., and helped present a program for the caravan Monday night. He complained of feeling ill later in the evening.

Survivors include a brother, Lester Fellows of Portland, Ore.

Proposed Amendment Slated For '60 Ballot

SALEM (AP) — The House approved Tuesday a proposed constitutional amendment to require retirement of supreme and circuit judges at the age of 75. It previously had been passed by the Senate.

The measure, which will be on the 1960 general election ballot, also provides that the Legislature could lower the retirement age to 70.

Retired judges could be recalled for temporary duty.

Dworshak Lone Holdout On Vote To Override

WASHINGTON (AP) — All Pacific Northwest and Alaska senators, excepting Republican Sen. Henry Dworshak of Idaho, voted Tuesday to override President Eisenhower's veto of the bill to strip the secretary of agriculture of authority over rural electrification loans.

The veto was overridden by a 64-29 vote.

Old Double X Scrapes Bottom Of Barrel Once Again -- Broke And Jobless At 51

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Jimmy Foxx leaned back in a frayed chair and said, "I'm broke and guess I always will be. When you get 51 years old nobody wants you."

"There's nothing tougher than doing nothing. I've had a lot of experience recently at doing nothing."

It hasn't always been this way for famed "Double X." Once he drew a fat paycheck as one of baseball's greatest hitters — second only to Babe Ruth in total home runs.

He was the American League's most valuable player three times — in 1932 and 1933 with the Philadelphia Athletics and 1938 with the Boston Red Sox. He was named to the baseball Hall of Fame. He earned more than a quarter of a million dollars before stepping down in 1945.

The money and the headlines are gone. He lives in a modest rented home in northeast Phoenix. He is out of a job and out of money.

Sam Provides
"If my brother Sam wasn't working, we wouldn't be eating," Foxx said.

Foxx's financial plight was discovered a year ago when he was found destitute and in debt in Portland.

He got a job with the Red Sox and spent the summer as a coach with Minneapolis of the American Assn. "Those pay days at least pulled me out of debt," he said.

"One month after I arrived they gave me my release," he said. "That left me sitting on a limb. I knew only a few people here. I worked at a job or so. I've had a lot of promises but nothing has turned up."

Few Fungos
"I call around almost every day for a job. Sure, I'd like to get in the scouting end of baseball or maybe radio work, but I'll work almost anywhere I'm able."

Foxx said doctors had warned him to bypass hard labor. "I've high blood pressure," he explained.

"He spends his days around the house. Occasionally he hits a few fungos for the kids in the neighborhood and pushes a rusty power mower around the yard. With him are his wife, two of his three children — Nancy, 17, and Jim, 14 — and his brother Sam.

"I heard a man down at the service station say he might need a helper," he said. "I could pump some gas. A few dollars are better than nothing."

Ire Proves Fatal To Angry Husband

YREKA, Calif. (AP) — Car-ramping anger after a tavern quarrel with his wife cost Carl L. Nelson, 34, of Everett, Wash., his life near this Northern California mountain town Monday.

The Highway Patrol said Nelson and his wife, Marjorie, were drinking with old friends, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kendall, and an unidentified man. Kendall and Nelson were ex-schoolmates in Everett.

A quarrel ensued. Nelson left the room for a few moments and when he returned the others all seemingly were gone.

Believing his wife had left with the rest of the party, Nelson set out in pursuit. A few miles later he caught up with the other car and sideswiped it. Then he rammed its rear. The bumpers locked, and when they jerked free Nelson lost control. His car plunged 100 feet into the Klamath River Gorge.

Nelson never learned his wife was not in the second car. All this time she was back at the tavern looking for him.

The sergeants remained overnight, with Taggart in the Nyssa jail, to search for the missing pistol, which Taggart threw away.

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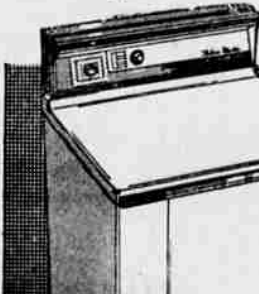
