UO To View Affairs Of Latin America

WASHINGTON (AP)—The University of Oregon will study problems of economic development in Latin America, it was announced here by Sen. Wayne Morse.

The Oregon Democrat, a former dean of the university's law school, is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee, charged with studying affairs of Latin America.

The study, subject to the approval of the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration, will be undertaken with Morse's subcommittee.

It will cover postwar economic growth in Latin America, human resources and needs, economic development factors and available external resources to assist Latin American development.

The work will be by the university's Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration under the direction of Prof. Raymond F. Mikesell.

Godfrey Enters N. Y. Hospital

NEW YORK (AP)—Arthur Godfrey was in a hospital Tuesday to get ready for an operation scheduled for Thursday.

The 55-year-old television and radio star was smiling but tense Monday as he entered the Harkness Pavilion of Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center.

Asked by newsmen if he was worried over his chest tumor, Godfrey replied: "Sure, I'm worried. Wouldn't you be?"

The operation will show whether the tumor is cancerous.
