A tea at the home of Mrs. Horace Berg will follow a business session at the Elks. The event will be in honor of state President Mrs. Walter F. Brown of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Miller.

Climaxing Tuesday's schedule will be a banquet in the Gold Room of the Umpqua Hotel, with Raymond T. Ellickson, professor in the department of physics at the University of Oregon, as guest speaker, discussing "Science and the Citizen."

A half-hour film, "Twenty - four Hours in Tyrantland," starring the cast from the television show, "Father Knows Best," will be shown at the Elks during the Wednesday morning session.

Following a 12:15 luncheon at the hotel will be a fashion show from the Vogue Sewing Contest, with finalists from all districts. Mrs. Morris Bowker will be commentator. The afternoon session will start at 1:30 at the Elks, with Frank Roy, area director at Simmons Institute, speaking on "Human Relations On Parade."

Born in Ancaster, Ontario, Roy lived and received most of his business experience in Canada. He came to the U.S. over 12 years ago and lived in San Francisco and Burlingame, Calif., before coming to Portland about a month ago.

Simmons Man To Talk

Soon after reaching San Francisco, he enrolled in the Simmons Institute and after completing basic advanced and instructor courses, became associated with the institute as a vocation.

Mrs. Carroll, to speak Tuesday, is a graduate of Gooding College, Gooding, Idaho, and has been a teacher of algebra, biology and English in high schools in Montana and Idaho over a 20-year period. In addition to federation work, she has participated in city, county and state affairs. She served as one of 56 elected to the first Citizens' Committee on Education for Montana. She has served, by governor's appointment, on numerous committees, including state Civil Defense Committee, state Committee on Juvenile Delinquency and Keep Montana Green.

Monday's speaker, Prof. Ellickson of Eugene, is a graduate of Reed College and is a member of four honorary societies. He has taught at the University of Chicago, Reed College and at present is professor and chairman of the department of physics at the University of Oregon and was acting dean of the graduate school, 1955-58.

He is the sole or joint author of about 40 reports to Pratt and Whitney, RCA communications, U.S. Signal Corps and the Office of Naval Research.

Music for the convention was handled by Mrs. Clyde Carstens, music and entertainment chairman. During the 8 p.m. reception Monday, a string ensemble group will entertain, under the direction of Mrs. Jack Stumble.

Mrs. Robert Dishman, accompanied by Virginia Young, will sing a solo Tuesday at the 12:15 luncheon at the Umpqua. Mrs. George French, accompanied by Mrs. Paul Geddes, will sing a solo at the Tuesday banquet in the Umpqua Hotel gold room at 7 p.m., and Alice Hamilton will play several piano solos at the business session at the Elks Club Tuesday.

Completing the musical program will be Mrs. Harry Booth, Mrs. W. D. Myers and Mrs. Paul Dillon, offering a trio vocal Wednesday at the noon luncheon at the hotel. Community singing will be held during the convention.

Favored Taxes Allow \$310 Million Budget

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Legislature's Joint Ways and Means Committee is on notice that it must lop six million dollars off its proposed 316-million-dollar state budget because the Senate Taxation Committee refuses to provide enough revenue to support it.

The tax committee voted Thursday night to reduce personal income tax exemptions from \$600 to \$500. This would provide about 11 millions in added revenue, or enough to finance a 310-million-dollar budget.

The Ways and Means Committee, which had added six millions in higher education buildings to the budget to make the 316-million total, now is faced with a demand that it take these buildings out of the budget. The committee probably will consider adding these buildings to the 40-million-dollar bond issue that the Legislature is expected to refer to the people to provide college and institution buildings.

At the same time, the Senate Taxation Committee recommended passage of the three per cent sales tax bill which would be referred to the people in 1960. The whole taxation picture is chaotic. Hopes that the 110-day-old Legislature might adjourn Saturday have almost disappeared.

The Senate voted 19-11 for a resolution to quit at 5 p.m. Saturday, but that is mostly a dream. It will be held up in the House until the work is done.

House members are resentful over the Senate's refusal to return the 3-cent-a-package cigarette tax bill to the House. This is the bill that the Senate Taxation Committee converted into a sales tax.

No one could remember a prior case in which either house ever refused to return a bill at the request of the other house. But the Senate did, 21-6. That quashed the intention of most House members to kill both the cigarette and sales taxes.

If the sales tax is approved by the Legislature and the people, then personal income tax deductions would go up to \$1,500 for single persons and \$3,000 for married couples. The exemptions for each dependent would be fixed at \$800.

But the House members were angered not only at the Senate refusal to send the bill back. A lot of them were bitter about the way the Senate committee butchered the House's entire tax program.

The House had voted to remove most income tax deductions, with a reduced rate schedule. This

would have raised almost 11 million dollars, or the same as the Senate Committee's income tax program would raise.

The House bill to levy a 1 1/2 per cent tax on business profits, with repeal of the inventory tax, apparently is dying in the Senate committee.

While the House voted to eliminate the quarterly installments for payment of income taxes, the Senate group voted to retain them, but to charge 1/2 of one per cent interest per month on them.

And, of course, the Senate committee scuttled the tax of three cents a package on cigarettes and 15 per cent on other tobacco by substituting the sales tax.

Only two pieces of the House program survived the Senate Taxation Committee's onslaught. One would reduce the tax on capital gains, and the other would add an extra million dollars a year to the tax on utilities.

The Senate tax package probably will be considered in the upper house on Saturday. If it is passed,

then it would go back to the House—and probably into a lot of trouble.

If the House 46-13 vote to recall the cigarette bill is an indication, the sales tax bill is headed for defeat even if the Senate votes for it.
