## Posse Sidesteps Horseback Mail

In something of a switch on Ichabod Crane's Headless Horseman, the head man of the Oregon State's Posse's Assn. have decided in one case to be horseless.

Some private organizations, such as the Drain Saddle Club, are participating in a centennial activity in which mail will be carried weekly by horseback from Portland to Ashland from June through September. They will meet representatives of the Cottage Grove Saddle Club at Drain at 10 a.m. Saturday, with each horse running one mile. Practically all the members of the Saddle Club will participate, using 21 horses.

A pony express organization has formed in Portland to carry the mail, every week from June through September, and saddle clubs are selling both special stamps and tickets.

In Roseburg, however, it appears to be a horse of another color.

In its state convention at Corvallis, the State Posse's Assn. discussed this particular venture. It decided against participation because of the financial deficit of the operation without the assistance set forth.

The Douglas County Sheriff's Posse, which would be the group to provide a Roseburg link in the chain ordinarily, has adopted the state posse's policies, according to C. Tollefson, captain of the local group.

So maybe this particular mail won't go through — not via horse in Roseburg, anyhow.

## Rancher, Cleric, Optometrist Vie For School Post

Three candidates with wide differences in occupation — a rancher, a clergyman and a professional man — are vying for the five-year term on the Sutherland School Board to be decided in Monday's school election.

The three seek to fill the berth of Delos Atterbury, whose term expires in June. They are Kenneth Knechtel, Sutherland area rancher; the Rev. Lloyd Whitford, pastor of the Neighborhood Church of Christ, Sutherland; and Dr. Max E. Post, Sutherland optometrist.

All three are university graduates. Knechtel received agricultural degrees from Kansas State College and Oklahoma State College, Whitford attended Northwest Christian College and the University of Oregon and Post received degrees from Oregon State College and Pacific University.

Knechtel became president of the Central Douglas County 4-H Leaders two years ago after being a leader for five years. He also is past president of the Sutherland PTA and a member of the Sutherland Lay Citizens' School Planning Committee, the Douglas County Juvenile Advisory Council and a lay committee studying consolidation of Umpqua, Sutherland and Oakland School Districts.

Whitford has been director of high school and elementary church youth camps for six years and has worked in such projects for 12 years. He also has supervised boys' athletic groups in Sutherland and has worked with youth in line with church duties.

Post has been a member of the Sutherland Lay Citizens' School Planning Committee for the past year.

## Invaders Awaiting Panama Rap

### President Promises Only To Spare Lives Of Seized 87 Cubans

PANAMA (AP)—Cuban invaders of Panama who surrendered without firing a shot arrived in the capital as captives during the night in eight heavily guarded buses.

Informed sources said Fidel Castro's Cuban Embassy may seek leniency for the small band who threw themselves on the mercy of the Panamanian courts in laying down their arms.

Hundreds of curious Panamanians silently watched the 87 prisoners — one a woman — marched into jail.

They will be questioned before the government decides what to do with them.

A source with official connections reported anti-government forces operating near the Caribbean coastal town of Nombre de Dios where the main group of the Cuban invaders gave up Friday.

The strength of the rebels was not determined. First reports did not indicate whether they were Panamanians who have been waging hit-and-run attacks against the government for weeks or new foreign invaders.

The back of the Cuban-based expedition was believed broken, however.

The bedraggled band of revolutionists said they came to Panama on being told the country was ruled by a dictatorship — "but we were wrong."

Panama defenses — aided by U.S. planes patrolling the coast — kept on the alert against the danger of more invasions.

President Ernesto de la Guardia has promised only to spare the lives of the invaders without giving a hint of punishment that might be meted out.

De la Guardia has charged that Roberto Arias, scion of a wealthy and politically powerful family feuding with the government, was the mastermind behind the planned revolt.

## State Senate's Tax Bill Given To House

A bill to charge 1/4 of one per cent interest per month on the quarterly income tax installments.

The House had voted to eliminate the installments altogether. This bill now goes back to the House for consideration of the Senate change.

Speaker Robert B. Duncan announced that the conference committee would work all weekend. He said he expects final adjournment of the sessions, already 111 days old, to come by next Wednesday.

## Reductions Moot Factor

House Democrats caused today and expressed their firm opposition to any reduction of the personal exemptions. Their position was strengthened greatly by the Senate's refusal Friday to approve the reduction.

The Senate vote Friday was 15 for the bill and 11 against it. But it takes 16 votes to pass a bill.

Agreement Outlook Poor

Both plans would raise about 11 million dollars, or enough to finance a 310-million-dollar general fund budget. They fall short, however, of the 316-million-dollar budget proposed by the Joint Ways and Means Committee.

Eleven Democrats and four Republicans supported the Senate bill. Eight Democrats and six Republicans voted against it.

The Senate did pass, 25-5, and send to the governor the bill to reduce the tax on capital gains that are re-invested in Oregon. It was described as an attraction for investment capital.

Legislative leaders were optimistic that the dispute between the two houses can be resolved quickly.

He also signed a bill to make it illegal to sell or give cigarettes to any child under 15 years old.

Another newly signed bill would increase the size of the three-member state Parole Board to five members.

And he signed the bill to require deposit of at least a third of the state treasury deposits in independent banks.

SALEM (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the governor Friday a bill to require licensing and regulating of persons who fit and sell hearing aids. Doctors would be exempt.

Sen. Jean Lewis (D-Portland) told the Senate there are many cases of improper practice in the fitting of hearing aids.

SALEM (AP)—A bill to increase state industrial accident benefits six per cent was passed by the Senate Friday and sent to the governor.

The measure is a compromise between management and labor.

SALEM (AP)—The Senate completed legislative action Friday on a bill aimed at litterbugs.

It provides for fines up to \$50 for anyone who leaves trash within 100 yards of a lake, stream, reservoir or pond.

SALEM (AP)—The House passed and sent to the governor Friday a bill to compel operators of dams to post notices downstream

## Psychology Talk Given By Dr. Boyd At Vets Hospital

"One of the prices we pay for conformity is the tendency to solve a situation by placing blame on someone else," Dr. Robert D. Boyd told a Mental Health Week audience at the Veterans Hospital Friday night.

Dr. Boyd, chief psychologist at the Child Guidance Clinic in Portland and an associate professor of psychology at the University of Oregon, went on to say this tendency brings only "guilt and confusion."

Particularly in talking about education and bringing up children, the psychologist explained, people have a tendency to blame parents and educators.

In order to solve problems in this field, Dr. Boyd said, people need to understand the culture in which we live, support realistic changes and support further evaluation and research in the behavioral sciences as well as in the physical sciences.
