

'Travels' Novel, N. Y. Paper Winners Of Pulitzer Prizes

NEW YORK (AP) — The 1959 Pulitzer Prize for fiction was awarded Monday to "The Travels of Jaimie McPheeters," by Robert Lewis Taylor.

The drama award went to "J.B." by Archibald MacLeish.

The gold medal for meritorious public service in journalism was awarded to the Utica (N.Y.) Observer-Dispatch and Utica Daily Press for their campaign against local vice, gambling and corruption.

The international reporting prize went to Joseph Martin and Philip Santora of the New York Daily News, for their account of the downfall of the Batista regime in Cuba.

The other journalism awards were:

National reporting — Howard Van Smith of the Miami, Fla., News, for his account of the cleanup of a Florida migrant labor camp.

Local reporting — Miss Mary

Lou Werner of the Washington, D. C., Evening Star, for a story at edition time; John Harold Brislin of the Scranton, Pa., Tribune and the Scrantonian, for a story involving no deadline.

Editorial writing — Ralph McGill of the Atlanta, Ga., Constitution.

Cartoons — William H. (Bill) Mauldin of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

News photography — William Seaman of the Minneapolis Star.

Besides the drama and fiction prizes, these literary awards were made:

History — "The Republican Era: 1869-1901," by Leonard D. White, with the assistance of Miss Jean Schneider.

Biography — "Woodrow Wilson, American Prophet," by Arthur Walworth.

Poetry — "Selected poems, 1928-1958," by Stanley Kunitz.

The Pulitzer prize for music went to John La Montaine for his "Concerto for Piano and Orchestra."

House Beats State Building Bond Bill

SALEM (AP) — A 40-million dollar bonding program for state buildings which would have been extended over a ten-year period was defeated 33-25 by the House Monday.

The Senate-approved measure, which would have been on the 1960 ballot, was for construction at state institutions and for higher education and state office buildings.

The Legislatures would have allocated funds for each biennium. Twenty-one Democrats and four Republicans supported it and 10 Democrats and 23 Republicans voted against the measure.

Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) told the House that Oregon's buildings needs in the next decade would total 217 million dollars, and that taxes would have to be increased greatly to provide a pay as you go program.

Rep. Doug Helder (R-Salem) said the bond proposal would be "mortgaging the future," and would shift the Legislature's responsibilities "to our children, who are the taxpayers of tomorrow."

Credit Women Plan Breakfast

Roseburg's Credit Women's Breakfast Club, an affiliate of Credit Women's Breakfast Clubs of North America, is holding its annual "blossom" breakfast Wednesday at 7 a.m. at the Umpqua Hotel.

Prof. Edward W. Reed, head of the department of finance and business economics at the University of Oregon, will be the featured speaker. He will talk on the "Evaluation of Credit Risks."

Prof. Reed, who holds a doctor's degree from the University of Illinois, is a graduate of the Banking School of the South, Louisiana State University. He has taught at the universities of Illinois, Louisville and Arkansas, and is a former president and director of the City National Bank, Fort Smith, Ark.

He is a member of the National Board of Field Advisers for Region XII, Small Business Administration, and of the American Economics Assn., American Finance Assn., and Western Economic Assn. He is the author of articles and monographs in the field of finance.

Photographer Faces Embezzlement Rap

An information charging 38-year-old John Hughes, Sunnyvale, Calif., photographer, with embezzlement was filed Monday in Circuit Court by Dist. Atty. Avery W. Thompson.

Hughes was picked up here by sheriff's deputies recently on a complaint signed by Gale Jakel, manager of Necchi Elna Sewing Circle, Roseburg.

The store manager alleges Hughes converted a \$214 check to his own use on Sept. 11 of last year, collected from Charles R. Patrick on a conditional sales contract. The check was drawn on the South Umpqua State Bank and cashed by Hughes, according to the charge.

Haled before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff, preliminary hearing in the case was continued until May 11.

Roseburg Firm Wins Glide School Project

The Glide School Board Monday night awarded a contract for construction of a multi-purpose room at the Glide Elementary School to Murphy Construction Co., Roseburg.

News-Review correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby reported the board accepted the firm's bid of \$118,750 for the structure.

Earlier the board at Glide had rejected all bids because they were far above the amount budgeted for the job. Eugene architects Drisco and Mizel altered the plans and bids again were called for.

Two other bids were received on the Glide project, according to School Supt. Harry Harvie. They were Ausland Construction Co., Grants Pass and Jack Mathis, general contractor, Roseburg.

Ike Sees Hope For Later Summit Meeting

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower said today a summit conference will be a foregone conclusion if the foreign ministers conference opens the way to easing East-West tensions.

The President also told a news conference once again that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is the only man who can deal authoritatively for Russia.

Eisenhower was asked how much progress there would have to be at the Geneva foreign ministers conference beginning Monday to justify a later meeting at the summit.

The President replied that he wasn't in a position to give a specific reply, but does hope for some progress at Geneva.

Any development there which gives enlarged hope for decreasing East-West tensions would mean, Eisenhower said, that a later summit session was a foregone conclusion.

The conference brought these comments from Eisenhower on other matters:

Steel — In the long run, the United States can't stand idly by and do nothing about any new wage-price spiral which might stem from the industry's negotiations with its workers.

Eisenhower said anew that he deplores the idea of any government intervention or move to control wages and prices as contrary to the American system.

But he added emphatically that all 175 million Americans are vitally interested in this situation and are not going to stand aside and see themselves hurt.

Driver Meted 30 Days In Jail

Robert Francis McBee, 29-year-old Eugene resident, was sentenced to 30 days in county jail and fined \$100 Monday by District Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

He entered a plea of guilty to driving a motor vehicle with a suspended operator's license. The judge noted McBee had a long record of traffic citations.

The Eugene driver was ticketed May 1 on U.S. Highway 99 south of the Sutherlin cutoff.

A Wilmington, Calif., motorist, John Neil Brown, 39, drew a five-day jail sentence for a similar charge brought by the state police.

A 50-year-old companion from the California city, Arthur Westcott Kilton, was fined \$15 for misusing an operator's license. He had loaned his driver's permit to Brown.

Both men pleaded guilty as charged. They were arrested on Highway 99 north of Rice Hill on May 3.

William Jennings Wellborn, 30, of Eugene pleaded guilty at his arraignment to being drunk on a public highway. He was arrested May 1 by state police near Sutherlin. Judge Woodruff fined Wellborn \$25 and costs.

Motorist Found Dead

CANBY (AP) — An 80-year-old motorist from Salem, E. H. Randall, was dead when taken from the wreckage of his car after it hit an overpass abutment on Highway 90-E, one mile south of here Monday.

The possibility that Randall, of Route 4, Salem, may have died of a heart attack will be investigated, police said.

Jackson Takes Office

SALEM (AP) — Glenn L. Jackson, Medford, appointed to the state Highway Commission last week, was sworn in Monday in Gov. Mark Hatfield's office.

Jackson succeeds Robert B. Chessman, Astoria publisher.

School Recall Attempts Fail

School recall elections failed in two Oregon towns Monday.

At Monroe, where a fight built up around whether a teacher—who is mayor of the town—should be allowed to smoke, the incumbents won handily.

At Brooks the recall failed in a 3-2 vote.

Monroe's Mayor Stephen A. Beck, a teacher and basketball coach, said earlier this spring that his contract had not been renewed and he charged this was because he was known to smoke cigarettes. A recall was started against two board members and Beck ran against a third for a place on the board.

Chairman Walter Hubbard withstood the recall in a 356-120 vote; Elmer Sankey was retained, 351-115; and Beck trailed member Andrew Brandt for election, 349-113. A fourth board member, Ralph Hull, retained his position 376-89 over Elbert E. Dixon, who had supported Beck.

At Brooks, where a rift developed over the handling of school affairs, the recall of Harry C. Bosch failed 94-66 and that of Philip Beilke failed 94-63.

Never Enter A Room With Words On Your Lips

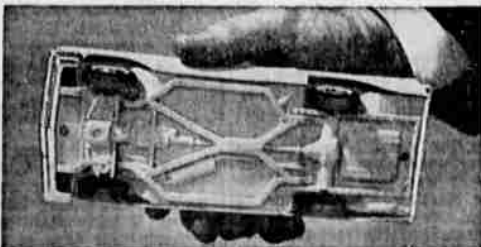
