

# Voters Approve County Levy, Name Young To Board

Tues., May 5, 1959—The News-Review, Roseburg, Ore. 3

With all but one small district reporting on school votes in Douglas County Monday, it was obvious that the county Rural School District budget had been approved. The vote was on \$634,478.98 outside the 6 per cent limitation in a total budget of \$2,004,590.92. In the 22 of the 23 districts from which results were received, the amount was approved 2,851 to 1,868. Only Ash Valley (Loon Lake) had not reported.

Among the 22 only Riddle and Yoncalla had rejected the budget figure. In the only contested Rural School District Board director race, it was apparent today that Harry Young of Glide had captured the at-large post. In the 22 districts, Young had 1,675 votes to 1,492 for his closest opponent, Fred Booth of Scotts Valley. Running third for the three-year term was Fred H. Nutt of Drain with 363 votes. Young was the incumbent. The other two positions open on the board went to John L. Meier Jr. of Myrtle Creek and James R. Finlay of Roseburg. Meier will represent Zone D (Myrtle Creek, tracts) on the board. He received 478 votes in the three districts. Finlay will represent the Roseburg district which forms a zone in itself. He received 2,019 votes. This is the first time Roseburg has ever had a member on the board.

## Zimmerman Elected

It took only four votes to elect Joe Zimmerman of Tiller to the county's Non-High School Board. Tiller was the only district to vote on a director for the board. All candidates had to be written in. The four write-ins for Zimmerman gave him the job.

At the same time all districts in the county were electing local directors, and all but three voted on local budgets. Reedsport High and Elementary districts and Oakland had already approved their local budgets. Monday four of the districts faced reappraisals of their local budgets because voters rejected the figures outside the 6 per cent limitation. The four were Riddle, Umpqua and both Yoncalla districts. The Yoncalla Elementary District and Riddle also turned down the rural school budget figure.

## Centennial Board Cancels' Copters

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Centennial Commission cancelled a contract with Janrick of Oregon, Inc., to operate a helicopter service at the Centennial Exposition and Trade Fair here this summer. This was because the firm had failed to post the required performance bond, said H. Quentin Cox, Centennial managing director.

The commission directed Jack Snider of Medford to make an investigation of bids for policing the fair.

Snider will look into the accusation by the William J. Burns International Detective Agency that its lower bid for security guards at the exposition is being ignored for a higher bid by the Pinkerton National Detective Agency.

Contracts totaling \$152,000 were approved, most of them for construction work and other improvements at the exposition. In other action, the Commission approved a fire protection budget of \$112,814 for the exposition grounds.

## Freezing Weather Hits Klamath Basin

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—The Klamath Basin was hard hit by freezing weather over the weekend, the county agent's office said. Minimum temperature of 19 above zero Sunday night wiped out many grain fields in the southern part of the basin. Grain was frozen extensively about two weeks ago. Those farmers who replanted at once were hit Sunday night and will probably have to plant again to get a crop this year. Fruit trees in bloom were hurt in outlying areas. There was little damage in town, but suburban Klamath Falls reported a total loss of some apple, prune and peach orchards.
