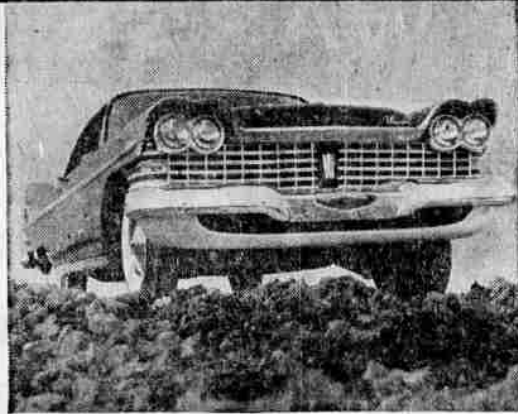

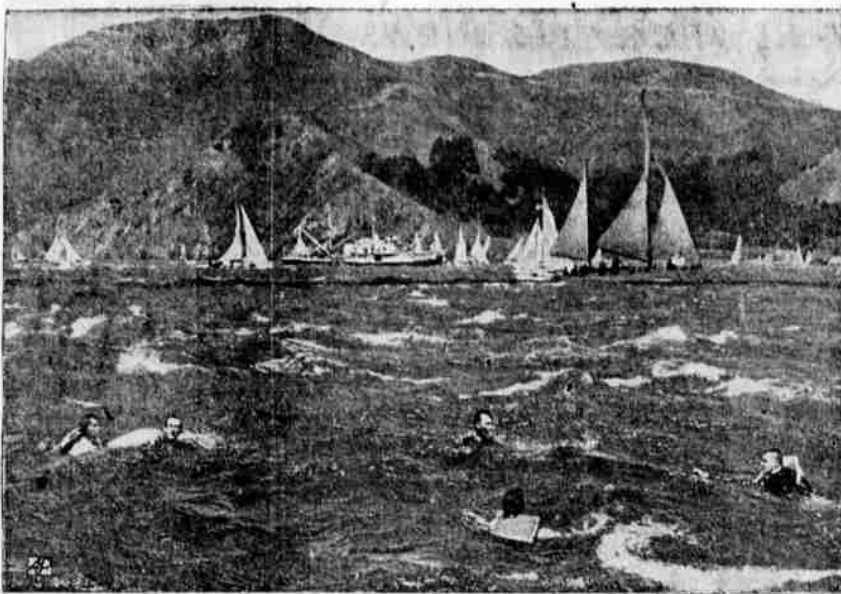

O&C Timber Receives High Bidding

Twelve tracts of O&C timber, containing an estimated 30,494,000 board feet appraised at \$693,684.90, were sold for nearly \$200,000 more than that price in a Bureau of Land Management auction here last week.

The continuing rise in the lum-

ber market was reflected in the price paid for Douglas fir. One company, Nordic Veneer, Sutherlin, paid \$47.50 a thousand for fir

advertised for \$27.65. Two other companies bid over \$40, and the bids of others were above \$30.

Prices paid for the timber totaled \$891,657.15. Nordic's purchase was the second largest of the day. It bid \$282,806.10 for 6,709,000 feet appraised at \$167,140.15. The timber is in the Rock Creek drainage of the North Umpqua watershed.

The largest purchase was by Woolley Logging Co., Drain. The BLM lumped the five tracts as one "sale." The tracts, totaling 13,394,000 board feet in volume, sold for a combined \$339,244.45. They were appraised for \$319,085.40. All are located in the Drain area. Three of the tracts were sold for ap-

Trent Buys Timber

Curtis Trent paid \$86,008.55 for 3,309,000 feet in the Camas Valley area. The timber was appraised at \$65,829.55. Douglas fir, appraised at \$21.75 a thousand, sold for \$30.25.

The other two \$40-plus fir bids were by Stebinger Lumber Co., Dillard, and Morgan & Engle, Roseburg.

Stebinger bid \$44.50 for fir in his tract. The species was appraised at \$24.85. The firm paid \$22,892.35 for 629,000 board feet appraised at \$13,499.65. The timber is near Camas Valley.

The Roseburg firm bought 382,000 feet on Landers Ridge for \$15,568.80. The timber was appraised at \$10,003.80. Douglas fir, appraised at \$26.45, sold for \$41.25.

These were the other purchases: Bohemia Lumber Co., Culp Creek, 3,845,000 feet east of Drain, bid price \$76,266.40, appraised price \$69,969.85. Douglas fir appraised for \$18.85, sold for \$20.80. C&D Lumber Co., Riddle, 1,142,000 feet near Olalla, bid price \$36,808.15, appraised price \$24,829.95; Douglas fir appraised for \$22.45, sold for \$33.50.

Round Prairie Lumber Co., Dillard, 1,080,000 feet on South Myrtle Creek, bid price \$35,062.55, appraised price \$23,326.55. Douglas fir appraised at \$23, sold for \$35.

Eighteen other companies qualified, but failed to enter a winning bid.

Japan Shipped Gift Holstein

PORTLAND (AP) — A pure-bred Holstein bull was loaded aboard a freighter here as a gift from the Oregon Wheat Growers League to Kochi University in Japan. The bull was purchased from the Oregon State College herd to help the Japanese improve dairy breeding in Japan. Dairy and wheat foods figure prominently in Japanese experiments at changing the national diet.

In return Kochi University plans to present the Wheat League with a pair of long-tailed Japanese chickens, for which the Kochi area is famous. The league will turn the fowl over to the Portland zoo.

Indictments Name 4 In Mail Fraud

DETROIT (AP) — A federal grand jury Tuesday indicted four persons on charges of mail fraud in connection with an international attempt to fix newspaper crossword puzzle contests.

Both Portland, Ore., newspapers, the Oregon Journal and The Oregonian, said they were victimized by the plot and four men were arrested in the West Coast city two months ago.

The four indicted here are accused of setting up a dummy newspaper and bank in London, Ont., for the purpose of buying puzzles and solutions from Superior Features Syndicate and General Features Inc., of New York.

The indictment says the answers were then supplied to individuals who were persuaded to enter contests and split the prizes.

The four arrested here are Walter Rex Johnston III, 33, of Detroit; his wife, Ann; George Dingman Jr., 34, Port Stanley, Ont.; and Joseph Dyson, 30, London, Ont.

Arrested earlier in Portland were Billy R. Taylor, 23; Birches Bird, 45; Fitzgerald Beaver; and Royce E. Hubert.

Breakfast Ready For Mothers Day

Mothers will be given a break on Mother's Day in not having to cook breakfast, if they and their families take advantage of the breakfast, scheduled for next Sunday, says William Holborow, general chairman.

The breakfast will be held between 7 and 11 a.m. at Stewart Park. Tickets are now on sale from Lions Club members.

Holborow said that arrangements are being made to accommodate around 400 persons, but that more can be served, and no one will be turned away. The breakfast will consist of ham or bacon and eggs, and all the hotcakes you can eat.

Proceeds will all go toward the club's sight conservation fund, which is reported by Chairman Edell Bryant to be about exhausted. The club buys glasses for children who could not afford them otherwise, and aids in other sight conservation to the extent of their available funds.

Hollywood Fire Kills Musician

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Band-leader Hal McIntyre, 44, died Tuesday of burns suffered in a Hollywood apartment fire.

He was found Sunday huddled under a blanket on the kitchen floor of his vocalist's apartment. Firemen said he apparently fell asleep while smoking.

He started leading a band at 16 and played saxophone and clarinet with the Glenn Miller Orchestra. A native of Kentucky, he is survived by his estranged wife and their two children, living in Cromwell, Conn.

Toll Collection System Contracted For Bridge

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Highway Commission Tuesday awarded a \$201,600 contract for installing the toll collection system at the Interstate Bridge across the Columbia River between Portland and Vancouver, Wash.

The contract went to Teller & Cooper, Brooklyn, N.Y., which submitted the lowest of three bids.

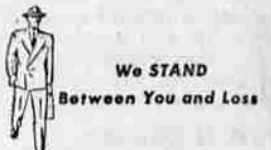
