Bait Minnows Can Ruin Waters

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP)—One of the biggest nuisances for conservation men is the spread of what is called rough fish in game fish waters.
Every state has the problem and it is caused both by well meaning

fishermen and those who just don't think or care.
Bait minnows, sold by the thousands can ruin a fishing lake in just a matter of a few years, say the fisheries men.

Pacific Highway Projects Draw Bids

Salem and Portland firms Tuesday entered apparent low bids on two major projects in the realignment of the Pacific Highway in Linn and Lane counties, according to The Associated Press.
The bids were opened by the state Highway Commission in Salem.
Roy L. Houck Sons Corp., Salem, bid \$1,718,220 for paving of 12.52 miles of the Halsey interchange-Lane County line section east of Harrisburg and Halsey.
R. A. Heintz Construction Co., Portland, offered to grade 4.19 miles of the McKenzie River-Willamette River section northeast of Eugene. The bid was \$1,854,672.
The two were among 13 projects for which bids were made. Total cost will be about six million dollars.

These undesirable fish, chubs, carp and the like are usually introduced into the lakes by anglers after they are through fishing.
Here, according to the fisheries biologists, is what happens to a lake when rough fish minnows are dumped in.
A few of these unwanted fish managed to keep from becoming trout or bass food for the first season by hiding where the game fish will not follow.
They may even get together the first year and produce a family numbering anywhere from several hundred to thousands.
When this happens they have a foothold.
The same cover is being used by small trout and for the first few years a lot of small trout end up in the stomachs of the rough fish. On the other hand, few rough fish end up as trout food.

But then things begin to change. In a trout lake the trout spawn once a year. The undesirable species not only lay more eggs but their chances of survival are better. After a few years the young rough fish are everywhere and have thinned out the aquatic vegetation to the point where there is not enough cover or food for the small trout.
After a few more years the newcomers eliminate the trout hatch altogether.
All because a fisherman would rather return the minnows into the water than take them home or destroy them.

DALLAS (AP)—A Boys Baseball League player died Tuesday several hours after being hit in the head by a pitched ball. Philip Johnson, 13, was hit while hitting Monday night. His father said the boy wore his plastic protective helmet inside his cap. Doctors blamed a brain injury.

Hatfield Office Budget Approved

SALEM (AP)—A \$326,468 operating budget for the governor's office was approved by the Senate and sent to the governor.
Gov. Mark Hatfield requested \$343,578. About \$275,000 is being spent this biennium.
The measure also includes an additional \$31,000 for the Committee on Natural Resources.

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Waitress Classes Slated By Schools

Alex Kennedy, director of vocational and adult education for Roseburg schools, announced today that a course in waitress training will be offered beginning next Monday in a move designed partly to boost efficiency in handling the expected influx of summer Centennial visitors.
Kennedy noted that the course, designated as "Food Service Training," has been endorsed by restaurant owners, the Hotel & Restaurant Employees & Bartenders Union and the state Employment Service.
A minimum of 12 must enroll for the course in order for it to be offered, noted Kennedy. Maximum enrollment figure has been set at 18. It will be conducted for a total of 30 hours over a six-week period.
Weekly Monday and Thursday sessions will be conducted from 7:30 to 10 p.m. in the Library Arts Building at Roseburg High School, with Lorraine Gaines as instructor.
An organizational meeting is slated for 2:30 p.m. Thursday at the Umpqua Hotel, said Kennedy. He urged all persons interested in enrolling in the course to attend the Thursday session.
