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Prison Assn. Loses UF Cash

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon Prison Assn. should not be allowed a share of funds raised through the Oregon United Appeal, the admissions committee of that group recommended Thursday.

The committee voted 17-4 after heated debate that lasted nearly two hours. The action was based mainly on a four-page report by a special OUA committee that said the program of the OPA failed to coincide with the purposes of the OUA.

The recommendation, if accepted, would deprive the OPA of its share of the money raised by the United fund group. The OPA this year received \$17,933 and raised \$1,000 on its own.

George Sage of Salem, a spokesman for OUA, said the committee's action reflects the view of local fund organizations that the OPA program fails to accomplish purposes in line with the OUA goal.

However, Paul B. Bender of Portland, president of the prison association, said his group should not "be subject to anyone as to

its personnel and the method of carrying out its program."

The special report to the state United appeal said the prison association must rid itself of its executive director, Mrs. Claire Argow of Portland.

The committee said it could not "visualize a program of the OPA which is acceptable if it includes the present executive director."

The same committee asserted that "an organization with the stated principles of the OPA is valid in Oregon."

Dr. Floyd B. Albin headed the special committee, and the admissions committee is headed by attorney Jack Lively of Springfield.

Crane Slides Into Hole

PORTLAND (AP) — A 40-ton crane slid into a hole in a rain-soaked excavation area Thursday and sent crashing down a 100-foot-long steel boom that missed by inches four workmen.

All escaped injury in the accident at the Exposition-Recreation Center in Portland.

Hit-Run Crash Kills Woman

PENDLETON, Ore. (AP) — A car, struck from behind by a hit-run automobile, plunged down a 20-foot embankment near here, killing one of the occupants and injuring four others Thursday.

The victim was identified by police as Mrs. Isabelle French, 44, of the Umatilla Indian Reservation. The injured were her two daughters, and the two children of one of them.

The car carrying Mrs. French and the four others went off the embankment from Mission Road, and overturned. All in the vehicle were thrown out.

Later in Pendleton, Officer Tony Martinez and another patrolman took into custody Mrs. Veronica T. Jamison, 27, and Mrs. Emma Nita McConville, 38, both of Pendleton.

The car Mrs. Jamison had been driving was damaged, the officers said. She is the mother of nine children and expecting another.

The two women were charged with being drunk in a public place and with disorderly conduct, then bond for each was set for \$1,000 on the charges.

The injured in the car with Mrs. French were Mrs. Amanda Wal-

lanet, 36, Yakima, Wash.; her two children, Stephen, 2, and Pamela, 3; and Mrs. Lydia Joyce Johnson, 38, Yakima.

Mrs. Johnson was driving the car when it went off the bank.

The 2-year-old boy was pinned beneath it, but apparently suffered no broken bones. All were taken to St. Anthony's Hospital, but Mrs. Johnson later was released.

Springfield Flier Fatally Injured

EUGENE (AP) — Springfield flight instructor Robert E. Anderson, 44, who was critically injured in a plane crash east of Oakridge 12 days ago, died today.

Anderson and two other persons were injured April 26 when their light plane crashed in the Cascade Mountains in a snow storm 15 miles east of Oakridge. The plane was en route from Reno to Springfield.

Anderson suffered head and chest injuries and had been listed as unconscious and in critical condition since rescuers found him in the plane's wreckage seven hours after the crash.

Pilot Clinton H. Abnet, 23, Eugene, who survived the crash and walked out of the mountains for help, and Mrs. Nadine Allen, 37, Springfield, are in satisfactory condition at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.
