Russ Heman of the San Diego Padres gave the Pacific Coast League its first nine-inning no-hitter in nearly 4 years Thursday night, beating the Vancouver Mounties 2-0.

The victory moved the Padres to within one game of the league-leading Sacramento Solons, who dropped a 10-2 decision to the Portland Beavers.

In other league action, the Spokane Indians scalped the Salt Lake City Bees 8-2 and the Seattle Rainiers shaded the Phoenix Giants 5-4 in a 14-inning contest.

Heman, a lanky righthander who pitched for the Mounties in 1958, won his third straight in striking out one and walking one. Erv Palica, the loser, gave up

eight hits, including Rudy Regalado's seventh-inning homer.

Last in '54

The last regulation no-hitter in the PCL came on July 21, 1955, when George Piktuzis of Los Angeles beat San Francisco 2-1. The Beavers got 15 hits in beating the Solons, who sent three pitchers to the mound in an effort to halt Portland. Joe Stanka, the Sacramento starter, was the loser. Heman Reed won it giving up only seven hits in nine innings.

Jim Greengrass slugged out two home runs for the Beavers and Nini Tornay got another for the winners. Clay Dalrymple accounted for both of Sacramento's runs with a two-run homer in the second inning.

Max Surkont, the last of three Seattle pitchers, was the winner over the Giants. He came on in the sixth with the score tied 4-4 and gave up only five hits the rest of the way.

Eddie Karak with two out in the last of the 14th, was batted in by Harry Malmberg's single. Spokane bats rapped out 14 hits off Salt Lake City pitching while Roger Craig, a righthander, held the Bees to seven hits. Craig, in running his record to 3-2, struck out six and walked two.

Al Norris slammed out a two-run homer for the Indians in the fifth inning.

CASEY ON THE RECORD

'Anything Up To Date In LA Or...Makes Always Pays Off'

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Casey Stengel, one of the nation's foremost exponents of obscure rhetoric, was approached innocently by a man with a question.

"Casey," the man said, "you've seen the layout here at the Coliseum. What do you think of it?" The questioner was wise enough to bring along a tape recorder. And here is what Casey said:

"Well, I seen the field. I think it's like every baseball club in the United States. Not saying they'd like to play here. Course, if I was going to be a ballplayer (or) I wanted to own a club I would like a nice new field where it would be more convenient for the players to play more uniform games. "Therefore, I think that's what they're going to have in Los Angeles. . . . Anything up to date in Los Angeles, or in, you might say, California, makes always pays off."

Can't Hit Now

Casey, cornered in the dugout before his Yankees met the Dod-

gers in an exhibition Thursday night, was asked specifically about the leftfield screen. All newcomers are asked about it.

"I'm not concerned about the screen," Casey said. "I can't hit any more. I don't have my glove and I don't have my bat."

"Would the Yankees enjoy themselves here?"

"Well, I don't know — no, it would depend on your lineup. Sometime you've got to play here and you've got to have a lineup of men who can hit that left field, and that's the trouble when you come to a new ballpark—if you've got a ball team that can hit three fields why do you want to have to have men who can only hit one field?"

"Now this is a great place for a pull hitter, if he's a right-handed hitter, or if he's a left-handed hitter and he's a long-distance hitter to left field. That's the payoff for you to pick up those kind of men, but why would you fire a man who would be good in other parks just because he couldn't hit to left field?"

Northwest League baseball fans in Wenatchee went to see a parade Thursday night—a parade of pitchers. Eight of them alternated between the showers and the mound as Yakima defeated Wenatchee 16-13.

And looking at the Salem Senators one begins to think that the pre-season injection of greenbacks into the broke club is all that was needed. The Senators boosted their hold on the league's top spot by defeating the Lewiston Bronces 7-6.

In the other Thursday game, Eugene shutout Tri-City 4-0.

It wasn't an easy victory for the Bears, who got off to a five-run lead in the first inning of a game that lasted 3 1/2 hours and saw the two clubs giving up 17 hits apiece. Yakima won the tilt when Pete Gongola clouted a three-run homer in the 10th but until then it was tough and go.

The Chiefs rallied in the seventh and tied it but the Bears regained the lead in the next inning only for Wenatchee to come back in their half of the eighth frame and advance 12-11.

Yakima got two more tallies in the ninth but the never-give-up Chiefs tied it again in the bottom of the ninth. Three Wenatchee players, Jerry Cooper, Al Owen and Lewis Boulton, came through with four hits.

Wenatchee Manager Dick Wilson entered a protest in the ninth inning when umpire Russ Fischer awarded Wilmer Moton first base because he was hit by a pitch. Wilson questioned the umpire's interpretation of the rules because the pitch had hit the ground before striking Moton.

The Senators rallied in the bottom of the ninth inning with two runs on Joe Wilson's homer and singles by Hank Bivens and Don Gaffney. Pinch hitter Frank Zupo then singled off Bob Wadsworth, who threw wild to first allowing Bivens to score.

Salem's other homerun was a two-run blast in the seventh by Carl Hutzler.

Eugene scored solo runs in the second and fourth inning and added two more in the seventh.

Friday, Eugene travels to Yakima while Salem visits Tri-City and Wenatchee plays host to Lewiston.

Oregon Farm Prices Drop

PORTLAND (AP)—The prices received by Oregon farmers dropped 1 per cent from mid-March to mid-April, the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said.

The crop index was unchanged, but livestock prices dropped nearly 3 per cent. At 261 the livestock index was 2 per cent lower than in April, 1958. At 198 the crop index was 3 per cent above April last year.

Nationally the farm index remained unchanged.

Alaska Accepts November Vote

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)—A November general election was made unanimous in the 49 states this week as a bill was signed changing Alaska balloting from October.

Under the act signed by Gov. William A. Egan, Alaska's general elections will fall on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even-numbered years.

In the past, because of limited communication facilities and difficult transportation problems, Alaska's general elections had been a month earlier.
