Whipple Tops Falcons With Two Bingles

The Drain Warriors split a doubleheader with the Elmira Falcons in Emerald Loop play Tuesday afternoon, winning the first game, 6-1 and dropping the nightcap, 14-3.

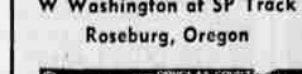

A four-game winning streak isn't much, but in the National League it means first place.

The Los Angeles Dodgers won their fourth in a row Tuesday night, beating Philadelphia 3-1 behind the five-hit pitching of young Danny McDevitt. That gave the Dodgers a half-game lead over Milwaukee although the two clubs are tied percentage-wise (.600). The Braves lost 7-3 to the Chicago Cubs.

St. Louis kept Cincinnati from making it a virtual three-way tie by beating the Reds 7-4. Pittsburgh defeated San Francisco 6-5 in 12 innings.

No one has been able to put together more than a four-game string in the National League scramble. Fact is, only the Braves and Dodgers have won that many in a row. The Braves won their 26.

In five previous tries with the Senators, since he became their first bonus baby in 1954, his total home run output was only 11, his RBI total was 30 and he had scored just 29 runs.

The 22-year-old third baseman, known as a poor-fielding jowler who never had a chance to play behind Eddie Yost, junked Washington's losing skid at three games Tuesday night, driving in five runs with a pair of homers for a 7-4 victory over the Detroit Tigers.

That left the surprising Senators fourth, three games behind Cleveland's first place Indians, who defeated the New York Yankees 7-6. Chicago's White Sox retained second place, 1 1/2 games back, with a 4-3, 12-inning victory at Boston.

Kansas City's game at Baltimore was rained out.

Killebrew, getting his big chance when the Senators traded Yost to the Tigers last winter, now has belted two home runs in four of his last 12 games.

Unbeaten Cal McLish won his third "double" against the last place Tigers, who are 0-4 against the Nats.

Frank Lary had the Senators blanked on three hits until the sixth inning when rookie Bob Allison, who drove in the other two Washington runs, doubled. Killebrew followed with a two-run, 420-foot sock.

Allison's sacrifice fly and Killebrew's second homer put it away in the seventh against Ray Narleski, after losing reliever Dave Sisler (0-1) had loaded the bases with a pair of walks.

Bill Fischer, still unbeaten, won his third with Tex Clevenger's hitless, two-inning relief mop up.

Unbeaten Cal McLish won his fifth for the Indians, who made it with the help of four unearned runs. Rocky Colavito, who had four hits, and Woody Held homered for the Indians against loser Art Ditmar (1-2). Mickey Mantle, Elston Howard and Yogi Berra homered for the Yanks before McLish, 33, gave way to the heat and humidity at New York.

Rookie Jim Perry saved it, blanking the champs on one hit while striking out four over the last two frames.

Cleveland's winning run was set up in the fifth on an error by Berra — who had set a major league record for catchers in his last game with a string of 148 errorless games since July 28, 1957.

All the White Sox runs came on homers. Starting right-hander Dick Donovan hit a two-run shot in the second inning and Al Smith put an end to nine scoreless frames for Chicago with a two-run homer in the 12th off losing reliever Murray Wall (1-1). Rookie Rodolfo Arias (2-0) was the winner, although giving up Jackie Jensen's eighth homer in the Boston 12th.

Sugar Ray Title Return Vowed - If -

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The president of the National Boxing Assn. said today that Sugar Ray Robinson will be reinstated as middleweight champion if Carmen Basilio is willing to fight him here on Sept. 21.

"If there is definite assurance that Robinson and Basilio will fight in the near future," Dr. Ward Wylie said at his Mullen, W. Va., home, "I'm certain the winner would be recognized as the world champion."

Robinson, 39, signed a contract here Tuesday to fight Basilio on Sept. 21 in Philadelphia's 100,000-seat Municipal Stadium.

The big question, however, was will Basilio, the No. 1 middleweight contender, agree to the fight. His camp would offer no assurance that he would and Basilio was unavailable for comment.

The fight would be promoted by Samuel Rose, a city councilman, who was not present at the news conference. He is ill in a hospital.

Robinson would get 45 per cent of an estimated \$750,000 to one million dollar gate and the same percentage of more than \$300,000 in television and radio receipts. Basilio would receive 20 per cent.

By signing, Robinson partially fulfilled a New York State Athletic Commission ultimatum to sign for a Basilio fight by Friday or lose his title in that state.

McMurtry Pounds Win Over Sawyer

PORTLAND (AP) — Irish Pat McMurtry of Tacoma, Wash., is hoping today for another television fight in New York with Nino Valdez. Tuesday night McMurtry won a unanimous 10-round decision here over Garvin Sawyer of New York.

McMurtry said he thinks this qualifies him for another fight with Valdez, who knocked him out in a TV fight at Madison Square Garden last year.

There were no knockdowns in Tuesday night's fight. But McMurtry, who weighed 188 pounds, had his 192-pound opponent in trouble twice.

In the fifth round McMurtry got Sawyer into his own corner and let fly with a left to the chin that had Sawyer reeling. Sawyer slowed down after that. Again in the eighth, McMurtry opened a slashing attack that left Sawyer groggy. But again Sawyer wouldn't go down.

After the bout, McMurtry said he also has an offer to meet Tony Anthony in a nationally televised fight.

But McMurtry said he was not too pleased by his performance in his first bout since he was knocked out by Valdes last December.

"Two weeks ago I was sharp in the gym. Tonight I wasn't," he said. "I don't know what was wrong. It seemed that I was tired out after the fourth round."

During the last two rounds, the slim crowd of 1,195 boomed repeatedly. The crowd paid a gate of \$3,115.

Referee Ralph Gruman scored the fight 99-92. Judge Andy Crabtree had it 98-93 and judge Stan Blank, 98-83. The Associated Press scored it 99-91 for McMurtry.

One of the preliminary fighters was hospitalized after he was knocked out.

Leon Hatcher, 190, San Francisco, was knocked out in the third round of a scheduled six-rounder by Floyd Palmer, 185, Portland.

Hatcher revived slowly in the dressing room, and was sent to Good Samaritan Hospital as a precaution, said Dr. Jack Battalia, the ring physician.

"He was hit a good one and was still a little confused in the dressing room," Dr. Battalia said. "We put him in the hospital just to keep an eye on him. I think we'll release him this morning."

Hatcher suffered no apparent injuries, the doctor said, and the hospital reported his condition today as satisfactory.

Bennie Daniels, who lost his first decision as a starter Monday night, won this one in relief, although roughed up for two runs in the 12th on two singles and three errors. Two of the boots were by Bob Clemente, whose single proved the clincher for the Pirates.
