

Illinois Cleric Accepts Faith Lutheran Pastorate

Allen Gail Ingebritsen of Moline, Ill., has accepted the call to become pastor of the faith Lutheran Church in Roseburg. He will take over his new post Aug. 2.

His predecessor, Pastor Lester G. Olson, has left to assume the pastorate at Calvary Lutheran Church in Federal Way, Wash. Pastor Olson and Ingebritsen were graduated from college in the same year, 1951.

This Sunday, the Rev. Kenneth Wiege, Eugene, director of the Lutheran Student Assn. at the University of Oregon will handle services at the church. Then, until the arrival of the new pastor, Eldon Bjork, attending Pacific Lutheran Seminary in Berkeley, Calif., will take the pulpit.

Ingebritsen will complete his seminary training next month and will be ordained into the ministry June 21, in Hartford, Conn. Following a few weeks of rest, he and his wife will arrive in Roseburg.

The Rev. Mr. Olson left Roseburg after serving for 3½ years. He came to Roseburg in August 1955 for his first post after being ordained. In the time he was in Roseburg, the adult membership grew from 133 to 296. The baptized membership of the church is 463. The church, located at 1130 N.E. Malheur Ave., may soon be moved to the west side of Roseburg off W. Harvard Ave.

Water Bill Arouses Town

ST. HELENS, Ore. (AP)—This Columbia River community northwest of Portland was up in arms today over a bill quietly and unanimously passed by the Oregon Legislature.

Kenneth Asbury, Yankton strawberry grower, was awarded 100 gallons a minute of water from Milton Creek, which flows right through St. Helens.

During the recent session the bill was described by the author, Rep. Wayne E. Turner (D-St. Helens), as one to right a previous wrong. He was not available for further comment.

Some 60 property owners met recently in a protest meeting, contending the appropriation upstream would seriously deplete the creek within the limits of the community.

"We are going to have another meeting in the near future," said Fred Baseel, one of the property owners. "We probably will hire a lawyer and take the case to court."

Asbury's application in late 1950 for the water was signed and recorded prior to the enactment of a law in the 1951 Legislature prohibiting further appropriation from the creek, Max F. Rogers, deputy state engineer, said.

Baseel's group argues Asbury's water right application had not been perfected, but Rogers said the right was "ready for delivery before the 1951 act became effective, and we don't know why it wasn't delivered."

Local Symphony Billed On Thursday

The Roseburg Symphony Orchestra will round out its 1959 season with a program featuring winners of the annual Young Artists' Auditions next Thursday at the Central Junior High School auditorium.

Barbara Gadow, pianist, and Ruby Ann Vance, soprano vocalist, will be featured soloists. Miss Gadow will play the first movement from Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 23 and Miss Vance will sing "Nocturne," by P. G. Curran, and "Spring Song of the Robin Woman," by C. W. Cadman.

Several orchestral favorites also will be included on the program, including eight movements from Handel's "Water Music" and "L'Arlesienne" Suite No. 1, by George Bizet. The program will be concluded by three Richard Rogers songs, "It Might As Well Be Spring," "Younger Than Springtime," and "I Whistle A Happy Tune."

The orchestra will be under the baton of Robert E. Robins, who directed the group in its successful season opener last February. Starting time for the concert will be 8 p.m.

Oregon Lacks Money To Hire CD Physician

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon has no money to hire a doctor to handle civil defense emergency medical care, so it will have to forego that part of the civil defense program effective July 1.

In the past the medical care program has involved training workers, maintaining 20 portable emergency hospitals, stockpiling supplies and working with physicians and health groups.

The Civil Defense Agency also has had a full-time physician working with the Board of Health, but the recent Legislature reduced that job to non-medical status. The board said it does not have a doctor to spare from its staff.

Auto, Bus Hit; Driver Killed

HARRINGTON, Wash. (AP)—A Greyhound bus and an automobile scudded a half mile west of this section near here Friday.

The driver of the car was killed and more than 20 bus passengers injured, nine seriously.

The big double decker bus bound from Seattle to Spokane rolled down an embankment and tipped over on its side.

"Most of us were asleep when it happened and people just suddenly started falling all over me," said Hershel Haynes, an Air Force captain stationed at Cottonwood, Idaho.

There were about 30 passengers on the bus. Another stage was sent from Spokane to pick them up.

About 15 passengers were taken to a doctor's office here for treatment of assorted cuts.

The accident happened minutes before 8 a.m. on State Highway 7. Officers said the car pulled out on the highway from a side road.

The driver of the car was not identified immediately.

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The Oregon Nurses Assn., District No. 11, has scheduled a dance program at the Umpqua Hotel for Saturday night, May 23, to raise funds to provide scholarships to nursing schools.

The requirement was lifted so that all possible burning will be done before the onset of hot, dry weather. Riddle residents can obtain permits for burning between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. Permits will be required except for covered areas at other times, the chief added.

The rejection came after Dist. Atty. Charles E. Raymond advised them he could find no statute empowering the county to use funds for such a purpose. Raymond said the state has sole jurisdiction in that field.

Schunk wanted the county to pay half of the estimated cost of \$18,596 to create the pollution control agency.

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Poppy Sale Set On May 22-23

Mayor Arlo Jacklin today proclaimed May 22-23 as the dates this year for supporting American Legion and VFW poppy sales programs.

He called on citizens of Roseburg "to recognize the merits of this cause by contributing generously through the purchase of Buddy and Flanders Poppies."

The mayor pointed out the annual sale of poppies by the veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion has been recognized officially and endorsed by the President and the veterans Administration as a nationwide program.

Funds raised through the sale of poppies are used exclusively for the benefit of disabled and needy veterans, and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans.

"This annual sale of poppies is eloquently reflected in the desire to honor the dead by helping the living," Mayor Jacklin said, adding:

"Purchase of these flowers, made by disabled veterans, is mute evidence of our gratitude to the men of this country who have risked their lives in defense of the freedoms which we continue to enjoy as American citizens."

A slight increase in April sales boosted total sales of U.S. savings bonds in Douglas County to nearly \$18,000 over the figure for the first four months of 1958.

Sales last month amounted to \$61,050 in the county, compared to \$26,690 last year. The increase brought total sales up to \$350,612. Total sales as of April 30, 1958 were \$332,907.

Sales over the state are down slightly from last year, with \$13,389,441 reported in 1958 and \$13,004,205 so far this year. However, April sales were up from \$2,684,492 last year to \$2,821,743 in April of this year.

Lawyer doubts validity of room tax proposal.

PORTLAND (AP)—City Atty. Alexander Brown told the City Council here a proposed municipal tax on hotel room rates might be unconstitutional.

Mayor Terry Schunk and Commissioner Stanley Earl proposed the tax earlier this week.

But in an informal opinion Brown said the state Supreme Court ruled in 1952 against a 3 per cent tax on theatre admissions in Eugene. He interpreted that decision as applying to the same field as the proposed tax on Portland hotel guests.

Sudetens Stir Czechs

VIENNA (AP)—The vanguard of some 250,000 Sudeten Germans invaded Vienna today in preparation for a four-day rally that has raised the threat of Communist-inspired disorder.

Led by the Czechoslovak government, the Communists have protested the holding in neutral Austria of the annual convention of representatives of the three million Germans expelled from Czechoslovakia after World War II. The Sudetens formed the Fifth Column spearhead for Hitler's annexation of that country. The convention opens Saturday.

Veterans Incorporate

Articles of incorporation were filed at Salem this week at Reedsport Barracks, 619, Veterans of World War I. Incorporators are Charles L. Beck, M. H. Catterlin and Frank L. Taylor.

The Reedsport organization has been in existence for several years.

Guilty Plea Entered

John Henry Swiney, 1739½ NE Malheur Ave., pleaded guilty in Roseburg Municipal Court Thursday to a charge of operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor. He withdrew a plea of innocent entered April 13. Swiney was sentenced to three days in jail and fined \$150.

HAVANA (AP)—Fidel Castro Jr., 9-year-old son of Cuba's revolutionary prime minister, was under observation of doctors today as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident. The first examination, however, indicated the boy was not seriously hurt.

PORTLAND (AP)—The Junior Chamber of Commerce will hold its second annual tugboat race in the Willamette River at Swan Island Sunday.

Seven river boats will compete. Also on the Sunday program are a tug boat parade, a race of rafts, a fire boat drill, water skiing exhibitions and a Sea Scout whale-boat race.

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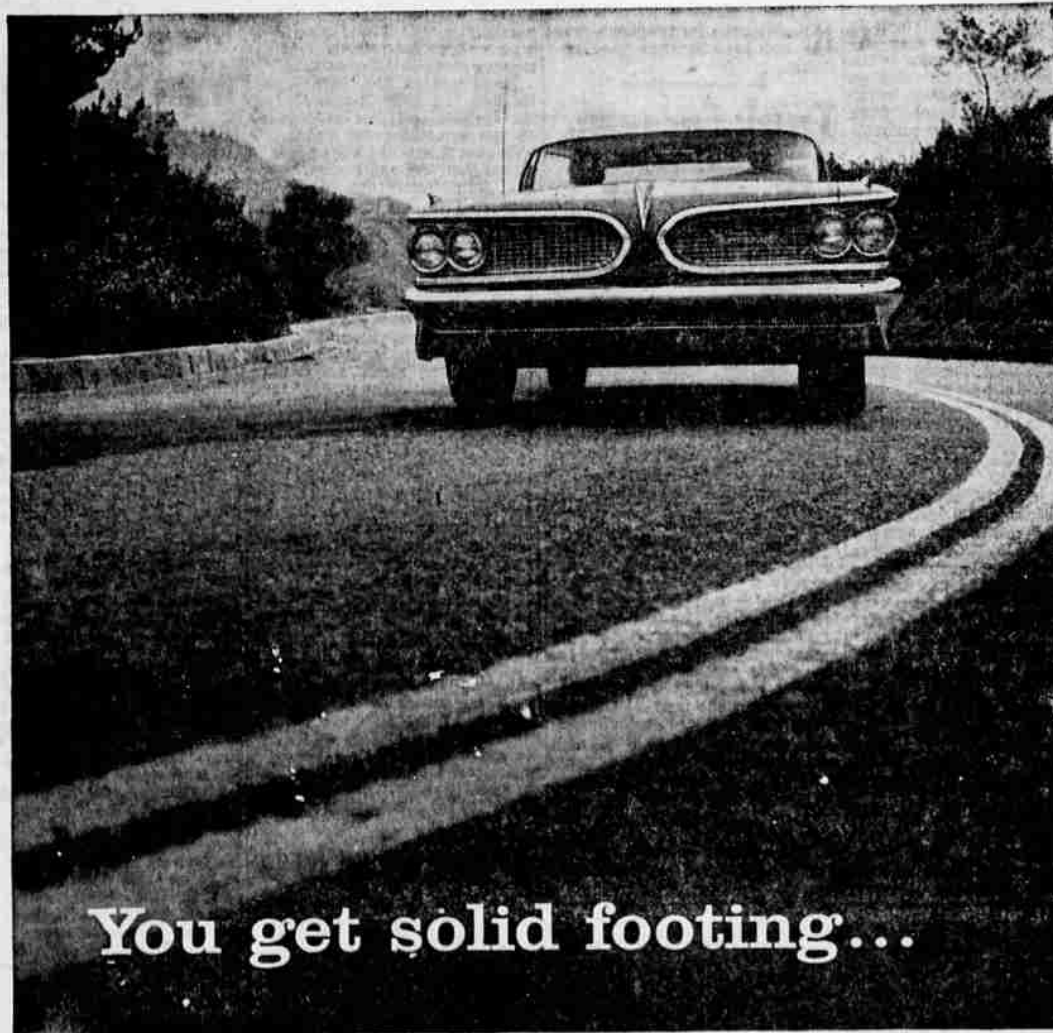
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
