Prison Assn. Backs Employee

PORTLAND (AP)—Mrs. Claire Argow, executive secretary of the Oregon Prison Assn., was unanimously commended by the group's board of directors in reply to a recent demand for her ouster.

The Oregon United Appeal admissions committee May 7 at Eugene urged Mrs. Argow be ousted and suggested the OPA be dropped from its list of participating agencies.

A special committee report to the admissions committee contended the OPA's program was not in line with the objectives of the OUA.

The action of the OUA was described by OPA President Paul Bender, Beaverton, as unfortunate because it would force OPA to seek funds through an independent drive.

Mrs. Argow said the OPA had not received any word the committee's recommendation had been acted upon by the OUA.

Bender, in a prepared statement, said, "Interference in the decision making responsibility of the agency board introduced a serious threat to the principle of federated giving."

"Outside direction by those who are removed from the work and therefore uninformed can only mean serious if not complete crippling of our operation," he said.

Mrs. Argow was commended by Bender for her 14 years of service with the association and presented a plaque for devotion to duty.

Diluted Ice Cream Leads To Portland Dairy Fine

PORTLAND (AP)—Dist. Judge Ray D. Shoemaker fined Sunnybrook Farms Milk and Ice Cream Co., Portland, \$25 here for selling diluted ice cream. The state Department of Agriculture said five tests from December to March showed the firm's ice cream had less than the required 12 per cent milk fat weight. It said laboratory examination indicated vegetable fat had been used instead of milk fat. W. E. Upshaw, the department's Portland branch manager, said vegetable fat is cheaper.

The indictment accused Patrick David Smith of Portland of killing Mrs. Athene Swetland, 75, with a hammer and knife May 2 at her variety store.
