

Drivers Cited After Mishaps

Traffic accidents during the past two days has resulted in two drivers being cited and minor injuries.

A car-truck collision about 10:35 a.m. Monday at the intersection of SE Pine St. and Cass Ave. resulted in the car driver being cited for failure to yield the right of way at a marked intersection.

Cited by Roseburg police was Vaughn Steele, Rt. 1 Box 181C, Sutherlin, who was operating a 1956 model sedan. Steele's vehicle, collided with a 1950 model dump truck driven by Harold William Hooper, Rt. 1 Box 120J, Sutherlin, according to police. The truck is registered to Roseburg Paving Co.

State police today reported three persons were injured in an automobile accident Sunday about 1:45 p.m. on Highway 99 near Boomer Hill Rd.

Verbally cited for violation of the basic rule was driver of a 1941 model sedan, Harvey Preston George, Eugene. Passengers in his car who suffered injuries were Irene Crowner, 41, lacerations on her head, bruised right knee and arm; Beverly Jay, 19, bruised knee, and two-year-old Kimberly Jay, who suffered an injured nose. Two other passengers, Mark Stanley George, 6, and David Eugene George, 4, all of Eugene, were not injured.

The accident occurred when George's car collided with a 1954 model sedan driven by Elmer Arnold Anstine, Albany, state police said.

Longshoremen, Shippers Start Bargaining Talks

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union started negotiations Monday with the Pacific Maritime Assn. for a new contract for 17,000 dockworkers.

In addition to demands for wage increases and improved holiday, health and welfare programs, the union is proposing what it calls a "tax the machine" scheme. This is intended to provide income for men displaced by mechanization of cargo handling.

The present contract expires June 15. Negotiations are expected to be protracted.

McElroy To Remain In Defense Position

WASHINGTON (AP) — Neil H. McElroy said today he will stay on indefinitely as secretary of defense.

McElroy made the announcement to newsmen at the White House with his new deputy, Thomas S. Gates Jr. standing at his side.

They had just conferred with President Eisenhower. "I have suspended my plans for departure," McElroy said. "I don't know when I will be leaving, if at all."

Asked whether that means he intends to stay in the Cabinet indefinitely, McElroy replied that was the best way to put it. Eisenhower Monday picked Gates, who is retiring as secretary of the Navy at the end of the month, to succeed the late Donald A. Quarles as deputy secretary of defense.

Federal Radar Job Stopped By Strike

FALLS CITY (AP) — Construction work on the Laurel Mountain federal radar station project west of here has come to an almost complete standstill due to a strike of sand and gravel workers in the Willamette Valley.

Engineers at the project said no mixed concrete had been delivered to the project since last Wednesday, and that further delay might make it impossible for the radar station to be completed by the target date this fall.

The dispute is over wage provisions. It involves members of the Teamsters Union and firms in Salem, Independence and Corvallis.

The Laurel Mountain station will serve to regulate jet air travel in the western part of the state when it is completed.

The Cascade Employers Assn., representing the struck firms, said it is planning to meet again in Salem tonight to discuss the dispute.

Sixth Graders Introduced To Junior High Program

An introduction for sixth graders to Central Junior High School was included as part of the Central Parent-Teachers Assn.'s last meeting of the school year Monday night in the school auditorium.

Sixth graders were guests. Principal Robert McKee outlined the junior high program to parents and students alike. A panel on "What Teen-agers Think" by eighth graders and a style show on what the typical junior high boy or girl wears were a part of the program.

McKee stated that next year's Central enrollment will increase from this year's average 395 to about 555, and that the teaching staff will jump from 18 to 25. Florence Goff, a former resident of Sutherlin, died in a Corvallis hospital Sunday evening following a brief illness.

The daughter of James and Harriett Balch Cooper, she was born March 11, 1876 at Parrot's Valley, Tenn. She moved with her parents to Oregon at the age of eight, with the family settling at Wilbur, where she was reared and received her education. She attended Wilbur Academy. She was married to Irvy J. Goff Oct. 13, 1898 at Roseburg.

Following their marriage, the couple made their home on a farm located within the present city limits of Sutherlin. Mr. Goff died in May 1932 and in 1941, Mrs. Goff and her daughter moved to Eugene, where they lived until 1943, when they moved to Corvallis. She was a member of the Women's Relief Corps and was past guardian neighbor of Neighbors of Woodcraft.

She is survived by the daughter, Harriett Iris Goff, Corvallis; one sister, Mrs. Mary Dewar, Reedsport, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services are scheduled for Thursday at 10 a.m. at the chapel of McHenry Funeral Home, Corvallis. Graveside services will be at 2:30 p.m. Thursday at the Fair Oaks Cemetery, east of Sutherlin.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Stephen L. Richards, 79, of the first presidency of the Latter-Day Saints (Mormon) Church, died today.

The death came from a heart ailment. He was stricken this morning and died moments after arrival at the Latter-Day Saints Hospital at 7:55 a.m.

Richards was sustained as first counselor to Church President David O. McKay April 9, 1951. He had been a member of the church's Council of Twelve Apostles (ruling and executive body) since Jan. 17, 1917.

CHIANG TO SERVE AGAIN

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—President Chiang Kai-shek, 72, is reported to have left the door open for a third six-year term when his present one expires next May. Nationalist China's leader was said to have told his Kuomintang party that he had no desire to make the Communists happy by quitting the presidency.

Atlas, Polaris Launchings Fail

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — An Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile ruptured in a brilliant burst of orange flame and a Polaris test rocket petered out shortly after they were launched Monday night.

The mishaps were the latest in a series of troubles for the Atlas and ended a streak of two straight successes for the Polaris.

The 80-foot Atlas made what appeared to be a smooth liftoff at 11:30 p.m., but 80 seconds later the huge rocket exploded with a roar that resounded over the Cape.

Five hours earlier the Polaris sped aloft in its eighth flight test, but the solid fuel missile's second stage failed to ignite.

PORTLAND (AP)—A fire which began at Lancaster, S.C., on May 6 and traveled clear across the country to Portland has been put out.

The fire was in a sealed railroad box car carrying 53 bales of cotton. Firemen said it smoldered inside until it ate through two-inch plank flooring Monday.

Damage was estimated at \$2,350.

Employers To Meet

PORTLAND (AP) — The Cascade Employers Assn. says it will meet tonight in Salem to discuss a labor dispute that has tied up sand and gravel firms in Salem, Corvallis and Independence.

The association also reported that talks with the Teamsters Union still have not solved the dispute.

Teacher's Pay Raised

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland school teachers won a \$300 annual pay increase Monday night.

The school board voted the blanket increase and set the starting pay at \$4,300 and maximum at \$6,600 for those with bachelor degrees. Holders of master's degrees would start \$200 higher and go to a top of \$7,000.

First OK Given Strauss

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lewis L. Strauss' nomination to be secretary of commerce won Senate committee approval today by a 9-8 vote.

The committee action sends the nomination on to the Senate for a recommendation for approval. A Senate vote may come later this week.

Merlin Logger Killed

GRANTS PASS (AP)—A logging accident claimed the life of Joseph Milton Pennington, about 37, Merlin, Monday night.

Pennington died in a hospital here of injuries suffered when a freshly bucked log fell onto him.

Liquor Seen Source Of Death Of Couple

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — The deaths of a Tacoma Army major and his wife were not caused by botulism and investigators now are studying a keg of tequila, Pierce County Coroner Frank H. James said Monday.

The liquor Maj. Robert Baker, 42, and his wife, Betty Jean, 35, drank shortly before their deaths. April 25 showed presence of lead when tested by University of Washington experts, James said. The lead apparently came from the lining of the keg which held the tequila.

The Bakers were first believed to have died of acute food poisoning but an analysis of food they had eaten—including olives bought in Mexico—revealed no botulism.

Officials said some of the tequila was given to a animal, who became drunk but did not die. The coroner said the next step in the investigation will depend on an analysis of the major's stomach and other tissues being made by the Army in California.

Foul play, James said, has not been ruled out but no action will be taken until answer is received from the Army authorities in California.

State Veterans' School Aid To End On June 30

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's educational aid for veterans of World War II will end June 30.

Veterans who want to take advantage of the state aid must enroll in school or college before that date. Those now taking them will be allowed to finish them.

There is no deadline for veterans of the Korean War. The benefits range up to \$50 a month.

PTAs To Rate Television

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—The National Congress of Parents and Teachers next fall will begin screening television programs as a guide for parents.

Rating will be published in the organization's monthly magazine, National Parent-Teacher. A similar rating for movies long has been a feature of the magazine.
