Phone Workers Win Pay Raise

PORTLAND (AP)—Negotiators for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. and for the Communication Workers of America Monday reached agreement on a new contract providing pay hikes of \$1 to \$5 for some 4,500 employees in Oregon.

Ronald Hale, a union director, said the increase would average 7½ cents an hour. The union has until June 2 to ratify the agreement which would be retroactive to May 17 and would run until Aug. 20, 1960. Upgrading of workers at Pendleton, Baker and Ashland also is provided in the agreement.

Idaho Match Company Resumes Production

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—About 50 men were back at work Monday as lumber production began on a small scale at the former Ohio Match Co. plant here.

The new owner, Diamond Gardner Corp., said a smaller night shift would be put on next week. About 270 workers were laid off when the plant was sold last month. Many of the men who began work Monday were former Ohio Match employees.

The International Woodworkers of America, which represented the displaced men, said the firm's policies on rehiring would determine the union's stand.

Drunk Charges Hale 4 Into Court Here

Four persons appeared in district court Monday on drunk charges.

James Allen Ronholdt, 21, of Wilbur; Everett Earl Perry, 19, of 655 Whistlers Ln.; and William Curtis Snell, 30, of 4628 N.E. Stephens St., both of Roseburg, all pleaded guilty to charges of being in a state of intoxication upon a public highway.

Robert Herbert Maney, 31, of Oakland pleaded innocent to a charge of operating a motor vehicle upon a public highway while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Ronholdt was arrested by state police about 5:15 p.m. Friday on Driver Valley Rd. about seven miles east of Oakland. He was fined \$45. Perry was arrested by a deputy sheriff Friday on S.E. Stephens St. He was fined \$25.

State police arrested Snell about 3:25 a.m. Saturday after he was found slumped over the steering wheel of his car on Airport Rd., police said. The car parked in the middle of the road, had its motor running and lights on, police added. Judge Warren A. Woodruff fined Snell \$45.

Maney's trial was set for 9:30 a.m. Monday and bail at \$500. He was arrested by state police about 8:55 p.m. Saturday on Highway 99.

A-Powered Plane 'Push' Draws Fire

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Air Force officer's statement that the United States is going to push development of an atomic powered airplane has been challenged from two angles.

Lt. Gen. Roscoe C. Wilson, Air Force Research Chief, said in a speech Friday the last decision by Donald A. Quarles before the deputy secretary of defense died May 8 was to ask President Eisenhower's permission to step up development of such a plane. He said such a recommendation had been sent to the President. The final technical obstacle to construction of a nuclear powered plane—shielding of crew and equipment from radiation—has been overcome, Wilson said.

But a Defense Department public information spokesman said Saturday no decision has been made on expedition development of the plane. He said the matter still is under study and no recommendation has gone to the White House.

Must Be Airborne
And Rep. Melvin Price (D-Ill.) said Sunday "I'm afraid we haven't solved all the problems. I don't think we ever will until we actually get a plane in the air."

Price, as Chairman of the Senate House Atomic Energy Subcommittee on Research and Development, has long been fighting for more speedy development of such a plane.

It appeared, however, that the Air Force has asked the Defense Department to push the nuclear plane project.

Wilson could not be reached for reply to the later comments. Price said he plans to try again to hold public hearings this year on whether the Pentagon is moving fast enough in developing a nuclear plane. The date of the hearing will depend on how quick Quarles is replaced and whether the successor or some other official is designated to handle the atomic plane program, Price said.

Price said he did not believe the shielding mentioned by Wilson had been a serious problem for more than a year.

Washington Man Held In Portland's Death

RAYMOND, Wash. (AP)—Lou T. Glazier, 43, was charged with second degree murder Monday in the beating death of Mrs. Bertina Stephens, 41, Portland.

Bail for the unemployed South Bend logger was set at \$10,000. Mrs. Stephens, who had been visiting friends in South Bend, was brought to a hospital here May 5 and died three days later. The fatal beating apparently occurred May 3, police said.

Visits Set At Benson

PORTLAND (AP)—Three Portland girls and their high school music teacher have won the Oregon centennial song contest.

Their song, "You're in Oregon, My Friend," was introduced in high schools throughout the state.

The winners are Joan Meifert, Janet Campbell and Jan Roberts, who are neighbors in North Portland, plus their teacher, Celia Burley. Miss Roberts is a senior at Roosevelt High School. Miss Meifert and Miss Campbell are recent graduates of that school.

They have formed a professional singing trio, the Whippoorwills. Miss Burley accompanies them.

The judges were Owen C. (Red) Dunning, Joe Dardis and John Richards of Portland, who said more than 900 songs were entered.

"This song was chosen primarily because of its lightness and catchy lyrics and tune. Since we already have 'Oregon, My Oregon' we eliminated songs in the majestic category and chose one that we believe will sell the centennial," Dunning said.

Second place went to a Portland team of Norma Merrill and Eugene Greenfield and third place to Harry L. Meyers, Medford.

The winners will get royalties from performances and recordings of the song.

Berry Pickers To Get Same Pay

McMINNVILLE (AP)—The Oregon Strawberry Council Monday night said pickers this year should receive the same wages they got in 1958.

The council said it will recommend to its member producers that they pay 25 cents a carrier and 3½ cents a pound—plus the same bonuses as in 1958.

At its meeting here, the council also heard a forecast that the Oregon crop this year probably will be five per cent below last year.

17 TB Patients To Be Shifted

SALEM (AP)—Seventeen patients from Eastern Oregon State Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles will be transferred to the state Tuberculosis Hospital here Tuesday. It will be the first step in converting the hospital at The Dalles into a mental institution.

The remaining 30 patients at The Dalles will remain there, as they are expected to be cured by July 1.

The employees at the hospital also will remain there to assist in converting the institution. Dr. James Odell, superintendent at the hospital, will retire July 1.

The institution officially will become Mid-Columbia Home for chronic mentally ill or feeble-minded patients over 50 years old.

Laundryman Wanted

The Veterans Administration Civil Service Board has announced an examination for the position of laundry foreman, with starting wage of \$2.15 an hour.

A minimum age of 18 will be waived for veterans, announced Civil Service examiners at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Roseburg. Information concerning the opening may be obtained from examiners at the hospital or by inquiring about application forms at any post office.

ICEBERGS ADRIFT

HALIFAX, N.S. (AP)—About 200 icebergs are adrift in the North Atlantic east of Newfoundland, scattered across the normal transatlantic route out of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Canada's ice forecasting center today warned shipping to use a route 150 miles south of the usual course.

Mick Rooney Single Again

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Mickey Rooney's fourth wife divorced him today, testifying: "Our home was in a constant uproar."

Elaine Mahken, 29, former model and actress, said of Rooney, 38: "I never knew when he was coming home. Sometimes he would call and say he would be home in half an hour, then he wouldn't be home for at least three hours."

She said he also embarrassed and humiliated her with vile and abusive language, and sometimes left guests in the middle of the evening to go to bed.

Lung Cancer On Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—The director of the Public Health Service National Cancer Institute said today lung cancer is increasing, particularly among men over 45 who are heavy cigarette smokers.

Dr. John R. Heller suggested that a heavy smoker should cut out the habit entirely, or "if he can't quit completely, he ought to cut down as much as he can."

In a copyrighted interview in the weekly magazine U.S. News & World Report, Heller recommended also that an individual who is 45 years of age and over — and "certainly one who is a heavy user of cigarettes—should have his physician check his chest by an X-ray and by physical examination, I would say, at least every six months."

The tobacco industry contends no actual connection between smoking and lung cancer has been established. It is supporting research with the stated aim of determining the facts.

Children Enjoy Work In Spite of Themselves!

"Children are born knowing how to play, but they must be taught to work," explained Carmy Lyle the other day. I was looking at the lists of work she makes out for her boys each day and pins to the kitchen bulletin board. - 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons grated orange rind
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

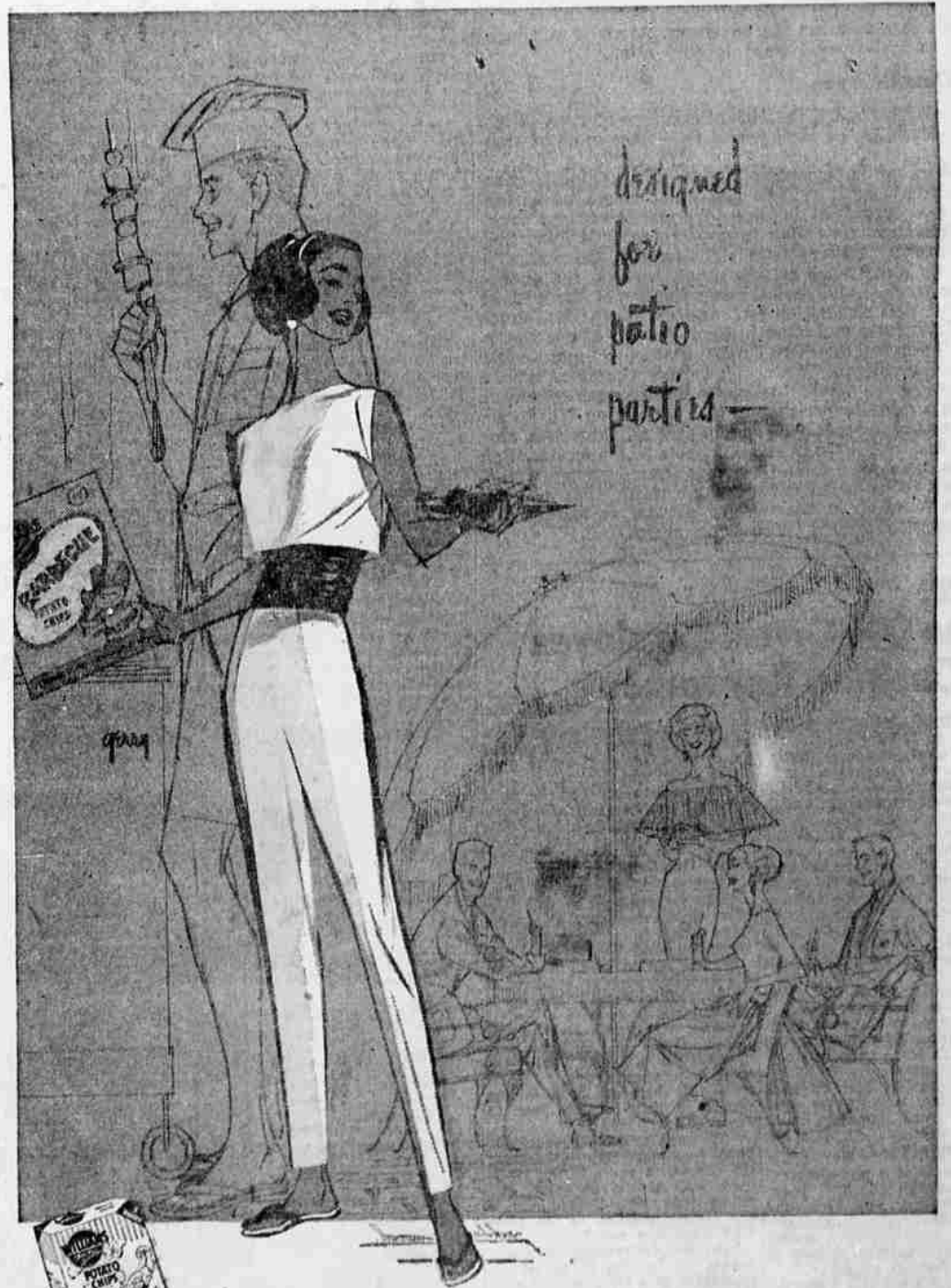
