Car Strikes Truck, Sending Two Passengers To Hospital

A 1957 model sedan driven by Louis Carl Anderson, Umpqua Rt. Box 27, Oakland, received extensive damage Tuesday when it collided with the rear of an unloaded Roseburg Lumber Co. flat bed truck on Highway 99BR about a mile south of Roseburg. The truck was driven by Sixteen Louis Lindberg, Rt. 4 Box 207, Roseburg, state police said. Two passengers in Anderson's car suffered minor injuries and were taken to Douglas Community Hospital where authorities report their condition today as satisfactory. They were Avonna Brewer, 17, and Wanda Joann Mendenhall, 23, both of 1259 NE Walnut St., Roseburg. Anderson was orally cited by state police for violation of the basic rule. The accident occurred, police said, when Anderson's car collided with the rear of the truck which was stopped waiting for a vehicle to make a left turn. Hatfield Flies To Michigan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Oregon's Gov. Mark Hatfield flies today to Lansing, Mich., to address a joint session of the Michigan Legislature.

Hatfield also plans to join Lansing's centennial year celebration — which comes simultaneously with that of Oregon.

Hatfield was in Washington Tuesday for a meeting of the federal-state relations committee of the national governors' conference.

While in Washington Hatfield also urged Republican administration officials to defer action on a proposal to transfer administration of O&C lands.

It has been suggested the O&C lands be moved from Bureau of Land Management jurisdiction to the Forest Service.

"I asked them to delay until we worked out our problems of access roads, division of timber sale receipts and size of timber sales," said Hatfield.

He said such a change would be contrary to the interests of Western Oregon's small and medium timber operators.

Hatfield also conferred with Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director. He told Hershey that Sprague Carter, Oregon director, was in Washington with his assistant, Francis Mason for a week of training.

Roseburg Woman Aided In Search For Family

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP)—Sheriff John P. Leonard of Providence County is being credited with helping an Oregon woman to find the family of the late Irving Brown.

Elva Brown Newbury, Roseburg, sought his aid in determining if any such person or member of his family is living. The sheriff perused vital statistics records, and then asked the Providence Journal, a local newspaper, to help.

It published his appeal. Mrs. Irving Brown of Tiogue Road, Conventry, called and said her husband, Irving, had died four years ago. She recalled his having spoken of other relatives mentioned by Mrs. Newbury.

The Roseburg woman was a cousin of Irving Brown.

Medford Man Named Egg Producers Head; Reports Show Co-op Growth

The Oregon Egg Producers, a co-operative association, elected Dunbar Carpenter of Medford as president for the coming year at the conclusion of the 39th session, an all-day event held at the Fairgrounds Community building Tuesday.

Approximately 180 persons were in attendance from western Oregon cities. Chicken dinner was served at noon.

Carpenter succeeds Kelly Comstock of Portland. Other new officers include Merrill Jensen, Eugene, silver vice president; LeRoy Snyder, Astoria, second vice president, and Fred Peterson, Junction City, secretary treasurer.

Herman J. Stoffel, Melrose, is one of the new directors, representing the Roseburg district. He succeeds Clifford Hess, Garden Valley, who is retiring from a director position after 10 years. He was association president in 1954-55, and has held other executive positions in the organization.

Other new directors are Hubert Esser, Silverton and Ivan Woods, Hood River. Woods was elected to fill the unexpired term of Comstock, who is retiring from the poultry business. Re-elected were Carpenter, Jensen and Peterson, and Harlan Christensen of McMinnville and Howard Hughes, Hillsboro. Two director positions

are as yet undetermined. Positions are for two years.

Five Still On Board
— Holdover directors are A. J. Wilson, Albany; Harold S. Turlay, Warrenton; Edward Elk, West Linn; Joe Toman, Oregon City, and Snyder.

Hess, Comstock and D. L. St. John of Gervais, retiring directors, were presented plaques for their work with the association.

General Manager H. R. Rohe from the Portland office reported volume of business in 1958 totaled 9 1/4 million dollars, with operating

margins of \$452,354. Patronage refunds were returned to farmer members of the marketing and purchasing co-operative at the rate of 7 per cent on all feed purchases, including grains and miscellaneous foodstuffs and 5 per cent on all farm supply purchases. Checks amounting to \$122,269 interest due on capital certificates were distributed at the end of December.

Rohe reported that at the end of the 16-year period, 1943 through 1958, members have received patronage refunds of \$8,426,700, or an average of \$325,000 annually. During 1958 total of 67,207 tons of feed were distributed to the members, a slight decrease from 1957. The dollar volume in the farm supply department was \$391,876, or 14.4 per cent over that of 1957.

Retail Sales Increase
He stated that members marketed 228,237 cases of eggs through the association's retail sales of eggs under Nu Lade brand, an increase of 13,000 cases or 12 per cent over 1957 sales.

Acquisition of branches at Coquille, Bandon and Langlois during 1958 have brought to 19 the number of branches.

William Stanley Saleen, 35, Sutherlin, died at a Roseburg hospital Tuesday, the apparent victim of a heart attack.

He was born at Gage, Okla., Jan. 5, 1924, and moved with his family to Emmett, Idaho, in 1925. He lived there until he entered the U.S. Army in 1943. He served in England and Germany and was wounded during the Battle of the Bulge. He was given a medical discharge in 1945.

Saleen returned to Idaho, where he was married to Rose Marie McCracken on Dec. 23, 1946. He was employed by L&L Lumber Co., Sutherlin, at the time of his death.

Survivors include the widow, Rose, Sutherlin; seven minor children, William, Thomas, Merrill, Danny, Steven, Rosanna and Janet; his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Gibbons, Eagle, Idaho; a grandmother, Mrs. Joe LaMonte, Eagle; four brothers, James, Portland; Merrill, Anchorage, Alaska; and Thomas and Kenneth Gibbons, both of Eagle, and three sisters, Betty Ann McDonald, Birmingham, Ala.; Alfrida Smith, Lakeview, and Susan Gibbons, Eagle.

Funeral services will be Friday at 1 p.m. in the Neighborhood Church of Christ, Sutherlin. The Rev. Lloyd Whitford, pastor, will officiate. Interment will follow at Fair Oaks Cemetery east of Sutherlin. Starns & Little Mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

Five Die As Explosion Racks Hull Of Seaplane

BALTIMORE (AP)—An explosion racked the hull of a seaplane being cleaned with a commercial solvent in a Martin Co. hangar today, killing five workmen and injuring at least five others.

A Martin spokesman said a dozen or so men were bathing the hull of a two-engine seaplane with a cleaning fluid using pressure hoses when a muffled explosion rocked the interior of the hull.

The big hangar, located away from the main cluster of Martin buildings, quickly filled with smoke, but there was little fire after the first flash.

16 Get Death Sentence

BOMBAY, India (AP)—Judge N. V. Rao Tuesday sentenced 16 persons to death for fatally beating three brothers in a dispute over the precedence of bulls in a festival procession.

Witnesses testified the accused surrounded their victims and beat them with sticks. A jury found them guilty of murder, and the judge commented that all 16 defendants were equally responsible.
