LEBANON (AP)—The Lebanon City Council this week accepted the resignation of Chief of Police Ned Crippen and appointed Karel Hyer, assistant chief, to the post. Crippen resigned effective June 1. He told the council he plans to devote his time to operation of a service station and a sporting goods store he owns here. Crippen has been chief of the 13-man department the past five years.

Forest Lab Fund Urged For OSC

WASHINGTON (AP)—An appropriation of up to one million dollars was urged Tuesday by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) to build a forest biology laboratory at Corvallis, Ore. The laboratory, Neuberger told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee, would provide research to overcome insects and disease which annually destroy the equivalent of 24 billion board feet of timber. The senator said Corvallis, because of its nearness to Oregon State College, would be an ideal site. He also urged an additional \$669,990 for Bureau of Land Management timber sale administration to permit the sale of the full allowable cut on O&C lands.
