

Rose Show Awards Slated Tonight

The Roseburg Rose Show, featuring presentation of trophies, plaques, certificates and prize ribbons to winners in eight divisions of competition, will conclude at 8:30 tonight in the Roseburg Women's Club Building, 747 SE Mosher Ave.

It is the third annual show sponsored by the Roseburg Rose Society.

Show chairman Jim Loomis said the top award, the Grand Sweepstakes trophy, was to go to the individual rose judged best in Division I. The division is composed mostly of one-bloom and three-bloom displays of tea hybrid tea, hybrid perpetual and grandiflora roses having 18 or more petals.

Last year's winner was Chuck Friday, Roseburg.

A silver engraved plaque was to be awarded to the runnerup in sweepstakes competition.

The exhibitor showing the best six roses, two each of three varieties, was to be awarded the president's trophy. Silver cups were to go to the best six roses and the best shadow box arrangement.

Some 15 other awards also were to go to winners in various categories of competition.

Unfair Count Ended In Industry Strike

SEATTLE (AP) — Unfair labor practice charges which contractors filed against a union in Washington's construction industry strike were dismissed Friday by the National Labor Relations Board.

Thomas P. Graham, NLRB regional director, notified the Associated General Contractors that the charges against the striking Operating Engineers' Union did not merit issuance of a complaint.

The employers have 10 days in which to appeal to the NLRB general counsel.

The charges resulted from the two-week strike that has idled 15,000 workers in the heavy construction industry from Centralia north to the Canadian border and from Yakima and Wenatchee to the ocean.

Employers contended in the complaint filed with the NLRB that the union was seeking exclusive hiring hall arrangements that would be illegal under federal law. The contractors also contended they were not required under the labor law to negotiate with the union for an exclusive hiring hall.

The effect of Graham's decision is to uphold the union position.

Graham's decision apparently does not mean that he holds all hiring arrangements would be legal. His ruling applied only to the specific proposal of the Operating Engineers' Union.

There was no immediate word from the contractors.

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Haney Praises Current Braves

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Manager Fred Haney says his current Milwaukee Braves are better than the ones which won the National League pennant last year.

"I don't like to make comparisons," Haney said, "but at this time last year we didn't have (Bill) Brutton and (Wes) Covington. Both were out with bad legs."

"Another thing, I think we have a stronger bench. Maybe I'm not being fair to the kids I had last year. After all, the bench won the pennant for me, at least defensively. I pulled kids like Mel Roach, Felix Haney, Casey Wyse and Harry Mantilla out of position and they did a heck of a job for me, playing strange positions."

"But I must admit there were times when I'd need a pinch hitter and I'd be afraid to look at my bench."

"It's a lot different this year. Mickey Vernon has done a wonderful job for us and while Stan Lopata hasn't hit yet he's still a threat up there at the plate."

It was noted that in the team's first 32 games, Lew Burdette (10) and Warren Spahn (9) started 19 of them. Bob Rush, for instance, has started only two. So has Juan Pizarro. Bob Buhl has started four. Carleton Willey and Joey Jay, last year's young sensations, have started three and four games, respectively.

"What can you do," Haney apologized, "when you got too many good pitchers? You can't start them all. But the season is still young. They'll all get enough work."

Haney's most pleasant surprise so far has been the hitting of Johnny Logan and Del Crandall. Each is hitting well over .300 and driving in runs.

Wilhelm Almost In Second 'No-No'

BALTIMORE (AP) — "Sure I would have liked to pitch another no-hitter but you have to be lucky to get even one of those."

That was Hoyt Wilhelm's calm appraisal of Jerry Lumpe's lead-off single in the eighth inning Friday night which ruined his bid for a second no-hitter over the New York Yankees since joining the Baltimore Orioles last Aug. 23. The Orioles beat the cellar-dwelling Yankees 5-0.

Lumpe, a left-handed batter, sliced a 1-1 pitch to left field as a crowd of 29,084 first groaned and then applauded for Wilhelm.

"He hit a knuckle ball," said Wilhelm. "I knew it was a hit right away. It was just one of those things."

"I guess one no-hitter is enough for anybody."

The 35-year-old right-hander, who throws knuckle balls about 90 per cent of the time, said he used quite a few fast balls and sliders in the early innings. But in the final three innings he relied almost entirely on the dancing knuckler.

Wilhelm said he was advised by pitching coach Harry Brecheen after the sixth inning to slow down his pace. "I did and I had more control after that," said Wilhelm.

The North Carolinian walked six Yankees, including two in both the fifth and sixth innings, as compared to only 15 for 14-13 innings prior to Friday night.

Wilhelm has pitched five complete games while running up a 5-0 record this season, tying Elroy Face of the Pittsburgh Pirates for the best mark in the major leagues.

But strangely enough, from the time he joined the New York Giants in 1952 until last year, he didn't start a game in the majors.

Since shifting to the American League, Wilhelm has allowed the Yanks only 20 hits and four earned runs in 50 1-3 innings. His earned run mark against all opposition this season is 1.28.

Wilhelm credits Oriole Manager Paul Richards with making him more effective by getting him to hold the ball in his glove to prevent tipping his pitches.
