

Hatfield Okays Reorganization

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield signed into law today a bill that will permit him to propose sweeping reorganization of Oregon's administrative agencies.

The bill authorizes him to submit a reorganization plan to the 1961 Legislature. Each house will have 45 days to consider his plan. The Legislature would have to accept it or reject it, since it would be barred from making any changes in it.

Hatfield has until 5 p.m. Friday to act on bills passed by the Legislature. He has signed 541, vetoed 12, and has about 150 to go.

Other bills signed by the governor today:

House Bill 33—Permitting the public utilities commissioner to inquire into the management of motor carriers. He already has this power over railroads and utilities.

HB 508—To assess all property at true cash value beginning in 1963.

HB 616—Providing the machinery so that counties can adopt home rule.

HB 623—Setting up a special education program for children with unusually high intelligence.

HB 662—Permitting divorce courts to make investigations into family situations where children are involved.

HB 675—Increasing salaries of district attorneys.

HB 1005—Appropriating 55 million dollars for higher education operating budgets.

HB 1094—Appropriating 40 million dollars for operation of state institutions.

Reported Crash Was Old Story

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—A report of a crashed plane prompted an air search Sunday in Oregon. It turned out to be a plane that went down months ago, one authorities knew all about.

The Civil Air Patrol here said it received a report Sunday that a private plane spotted the wreckage along the banks of the Imnaha River.

A CAP plane was dispatched from Enterprise, Ore., and later found the wrecked plane lying on its back.

Eugene Traols, a CAP official here, said the wreckage was that of a private plane that went down last fall without loss of life.

The wreckage is about 20 miles upstream from where the Imnaha flows into the Snake River, and due west of Joseph in Oregon's extreme northeastern tip.

Frank Joseph Morris Jr.

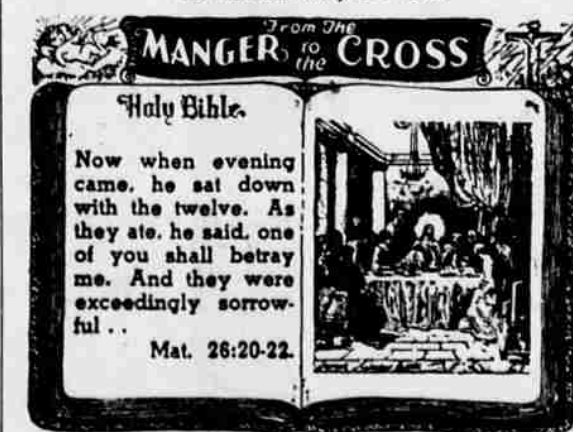
Frank Joseph Morris Jr., 50, died Saturday in a Roseburg hospital following a prolonged illness.

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Flames Destroy Tillamook Mill

TILLAMOOK (AP)—Damage is estimated at \$25,000 from a fire that started with a boom and was spread by wind through the Beuhner Lumber Co. here Saturday.

It left 70 persons out of work. Burned were a planer mill, two dry kilns, lumber in the yard, a cooling shed, filing equipment, a machine shop, yard office and a boiler house. Hot weather and explosively dry dust, along with the wind, were blamed.

Tillamook firemen were aided in fighting the blaze by firemen and equipment from the state Forestry Service, the Naval Air Station south of Tillamook and the Crown Zellerbach plant. An investigation was started.
